


Over 55's Leisure Group is awarded Grant

Chairman's Report

Now that The Christmas and New Year celebrations are over it is back to the normal routine for most of us including your Parish Council

The new Community Centre is being well used and apart from a few teething troubles seems to be liked by all those making use of the facilities

The Parish Council held their January and February meetings in the Community Centre and have tested out the facilities. It has been decided that to obtain the best results from the Hearing Loop installed in the building we will need to purchase two extra microphones to connect into the loop. This should enable anyone using a hearing aid to hear all the proceedings

The Parish Council is proposing to use the facilities of Newark & Sherwood D.C to produce a village web site and more information will be published in the next C.C.N.

This year is Election year when all members of the Parish Council come up for re-election, unfortunately this has meant that the Parish Council has had to make provision in its precept to cover the costs imposed on us by N&SDC in the event of more candidates putting their names forward than there are places available on the Parish Council. At the present time the Council is allowed 10 members. In the event that only 10 or less candidates put their names forward there will be no need for an election and the money allocated will be carried over

As a lot of you may be aware I walk my dog on a regular basis in the village and have noticed that most of my fellow dog walkers are very conscientious and clear up after their dogs, however I have noticed that in some cases this is not happening. As there are now more children walking to school I would ask that we keep our streets clean for people to walk

COMMUNITY POLICING

A new member of our team joins us very soon, at the end of February hopefully, he is my long awaited PCSO, (Police Community Support Officer), his name is Mike Munro, I have known him and worked with him in the Newark area for many years, he is a well experienced chap as he has a history of being a member of the Special Constabulary for many years. Mike is training at the moment and during February he will have a period of 'on the job training' being tutored by an established PCSO and then he will be let loose on you all shortly after that. Like me, he will be based at Newark Police Station, then come out to the villages from there. Our shift pattern will be almost the same so we should be able to cover more of the massive area we are responsible for during our tour of duty. Watch out for him, he will be wearing the normal police uniform with a blue cap band and blue epaulets.

Now for some news from a newspaper from Dubai.

Police have reported nearly 7,000 traffic offences in five days. The local traffic police were forced to use new stiff procedures to curb violations.

They issued 6,996 traffic fines from Nov. 1st to Nov. 5th 2006. The offences include: speeding (4,059 offences), jumping red traffic signals (352), obstruction (341), driving on the hard shoulder (225), reckless driving (206), and lane violation (410). There were four people killed on the road during the previous week. A police spokesman stated that 693 minor accidents a day occurred in the third quarter of 2006 this year, which is 62,342 in total. I'll never complain about my workload again!!! (RW)


<u>A Thank You</u>

The Collingham Rural Advice and Resource Centre started in 1989 in response to a survey by Notts Council Welfare Rights Department which identified a need for an independent advice service in this part of Nottinghamshire.

In the last 7 years the service has grown substantially, we saw over 1500 clients last year. We are open 3 days a week, Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays, 9.30am - 12.00pm is an open surgery where you just walk in without an appointment, 1.00pm - 5.00pm we do appointments and home visits.

The range of subjects we cover includes claiming welfare benefits, debts, housing and council tax benefit, consumer issues, neighbour problems, local issues, etc. If there is anything we cannot advise on we will refer you to the appropriate agency.

Everything we talk about is covered by our confidentiality policy and is also free of charge.

A measure of our success is that we raised over 1/4 of a million pounds in benefits for our clients last year. The villages we cover are Collingham,

Coddington, Winthorpe, Holme, Langford, North and South Scarle. Besthorpe, Girton, Spalford, Wigsley, South Clifton, North Clifton, Harby and Thorney. We will also see people from other locations who visit the centre.

Mothering Sunday

In the modern world many old customs and traditions have been overwhelmed by brash commercialism.

An example of this is Mothering Sunday, which is especially relevant to Coddington and All Saints Church; the following is taken from "A Church Guide" writen by Michael Bache.

CONSTANCE PENSWICK SMITH - (1878-1938)

Constance Penswick Smith came to Coddington, Nottinghamshire at the age of 12, when her father the Reverend Charles Penswick Smith was appointed Vicar of All Saints' Church Coddington. Constance was the 3rd of 7 children, and from an early age asserted her independence. Of the seven children, it was Constance who struck out on her own and made a career outside the family circle.

She travelled to Germany and spent two years working as a governess before returning to Nottingham and finding employment as a dispenser with the eminent skin specialist Dr Thomas Mallett in Park Row. She became friends with Ellen Porter who was Superintendent of the Girls Friendly Society Hostel in Not-tingham.

One day in 1913, Constance read an article in the evening news, which outlined plans by an American, Anna Jarvis from Philadelphia to introduce an American festival into Britain to celebrate "Mother's Day", which was to be established on the 2nd Sunday in May. Constance realised that despite having a similar sounding name to Mothering Sunday, it would not have any of the Christian values, which made Mothering Sunday so special. She began to devote her life to re-establishing the true Christian celebration of Mothering Sunday in a campaign, which was to last for 30 years.

Working with her friend Ellen, she set up her headquarters at 15 Regent Street in Nottingham and designed Mothering Sunday Cards for school children to give to their mothers. She wrote plays and articles to promote interest and made a collection of appropriate hymns for use on the day. First she approached the Mothers Union, but as much as they approved of the idea, they thought that the custom had been dead for so long that a revival was virtually impossible.

She refused to be discouraged. In 1921 she published a book on Mothering Sunday in which she drew together alt her findings about the ancient custom from across the world. She also founded "The Society for the Observance of Mothering Sunday".

At first her movement was rejected by many established religious societies, but gradually the clergy did become interested, particularly Rev Killer of St Cyprians in Nottingham, who used the hymns that Constance had selected.

Constance went to live in Rev Killers' parish, and when the new St Cyprians church was dedicated in 1936, a canister containing orders of service, and other material was placed beneath the altar.

Other early converts to Constance's movement were her 4 brothers who had all taken holy orders and were each conducting Mothering Sunday services in their own churches.

Constance Penswick Smith died in 1938, at the age of 60 and was buried at Coddington next to her father. Her friend Ellen Porter, who later carried on the work of the Movement from her home in Marston Road, Nottingham, died in 1942 at the age of 74.

So, if you should be passing the school and you notice people on site at unusual times, please give the police a ring.

In addition, if you have any information which may help, please contact either the police or the school. Any such information will, of course, be treated in strict confidence.

I know you will share my dismay, but if we don't put a stop to this problem, it will spread and become a very serious problem for the whole community. After all, if these people are capable of wrecking and setting fire to children's toys, then they are capable of just about anything.
