The areas I will be responsible for now include Barnby in the Willows, Beacon Hill, Coddington and from Winthorpe roundabout through Collingham out to Harby. I will be committed to working within your communities throughout my 'Beat' and will work alongside two Police Community Support Officers (PCSO's).

Myself and PCSOs Harriet Samson-Bailey and Mike Munro make up the Collingham, Coddington and The Meerings Safer Neighbourhoods Team. The PCSO's have come to the team with great enthusiasm and they are looking forward to patrolling alongside myself in and around the Beat area and attending your local meetings when possible.

At the moment the team is committed to tackling local Anti-Social Behaviour issues and Incidents of Criminal Damage, along with vehicle nuisance problems, which includes off-road bikes and the theft of lead and copper from local churches, homes and building sites.



People often take their heritage for granted, and forget to look at all the fascinating details that make their home area unique. For fun, we thought we'd challenge residents and visitors to identify 35 cryptic pictures of Coddington village. Quiz sheets have been on sale this summer at a number of public events and we hope that you have enjoyed puzzling over them – either at home or in the company of others at the pub!

We selected a very worthy winner – Mr John Rollins – who tramped up and down the village determined not to be beaten. John returned a perfect answer sheet and received his prize at our September meeting - Well done!

We have posted answer sheets around the village, but for those of you that missed them

- 1 Chapel House, former Methodist Chapel on Chapel Lane
- 2 Stone wall of former outbuilding of Charity Farm, Chapel Lane.
- 3 Sunnyside Farm, Main St sash window and slate bay window roof.
- 4 Old Manor Farm which dates to 1713 porch and plaque
- 5 Porch of Brownlow's House, 19 Brownlow's Hill.
- 6 Tiled overporches. Post Office Row.
- 7 Stone steps The Old Bakery, 35 Main St.
- 8 Coddington United Charity Almshouses, chimney and gable end taken from Beckingham Rd.
- 9 Monument near west gate of churchyard, to Mrs Mary Anne and Colonel James Thorpe.
- 10 Marble Monument on the church West wall to John Somerled Thorpe, who died in 1916 serving on the Somme.
- 11 Part of the top of the tracery from the main East window, the Chancel, All Saints Church (window adjacent to Chapel Lane).
- 12 The National School, now the Scout Hall green iron tie-bar and the top of carved stone inscription.
- 13 Tarred wall and window of Coddington Windmill, Balderton Lane.
- 14 Chequered brickwork the Inn on the Green Offices (between the Laurels and the Maltings), The Green.
- 15 Coddington Community Centre brickwork pattern.
- 16 Boundary feature wall skirting huge trees, Parkwood Lodge, Newark Rd.
- 17 Willowdene, No 15 Beckingham Rd distinctive crowstepped porch.
- 18 The Maltings, the Green access door just below the eaves and distinctive low level windows.

- 19 Plough set on gravel, front garden of Bonny Bridge, Newark Rd.
- 20 Boundary walls with diamond pattern, Hilltop House, Balderton Lane.
- 21 Laburnum Lodge, 141 Newark Rd.
- 22 The Lodge, No 32 Newark Rd octagonal chimney stacks.
- 23 Old decorative railings behind pillar box, next to the Lodge, Newark Rd (no 32?).
- 24 Decorative wheel against pale brickwork of 17 Parkes Close/ Ross Close.
- 25 39 Main St, (opposite the Plough) shuttered windows and chequered brick-work.
- 26 Lilac Cottage, Balderton Lane porch overdoor, circular window and dovecot box.
- 27 Finial of post, electric sub-station on Newark Rd near Beaconsfield Drive.
- 28 Coddington fish pond taken from Beckingham Rd.
- 29 Converted barn, Hilltop Farm, Balderton Lane brick and stone wall with dovecote openings.

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CODDINGTON BELLRINGERS Outing 2007.

This years outing was on the 29th September and took us to the Northamptonshire area, taking in six ringing towers. The coach picked up at Sutton, Coddington, & Balderton, before heading south on the A1. We managed a three quarter full coach of ringers & friends from Coddington, Winthorpe, Newark, Balderton, Fulbeck, Southwell, Carlton-le-Moorland, Wragby, & Grantham. Our first tower of the day was Deene Park, and even after a detour we arrived in good time, but unfortunately our church key holder didn't turn up and after several phone calls to other possible key holders within the village we had still not gained entry into the church. The decision was then made to move onto the next tower, this was a shame because St. Peters, Deene doesn't get rung very often and our contact had told me they sounded and rang well.

Bulwick was the next tower five minutes up the road and when we arrived we only waited a couple of minutes before the key arrived. Our contact was most concerned that we had been let down at our first tower, and told me the ringing guild would need to be informed after she had explained about issues surrounding the spare keys. I left that one with her.

Fortunately the bells of St. Nicholas, Bulwick were a pleasure to ring, which helped us back to enjoying the day ahead.

Market Harborough was our lunch stop, but once again we were made to detour and with additional roadworks we arrived late. After lunch we had several further delays before we got to our third tower at East Farndon. In fact the afternoon ringing at all the towers was severely hampered by the time lost in getting to East Farndon. I contacted all the key holders at the churches to follow who were very understanding about our predicament and so the timetable was re adjusted as best we could.

At East Farndon our contact was making good use of his time waiting for us to arrive by doing some repairs on the roof of St. John's. The bells here also went really well which helped produce some good ringing.

On to Lubenham next where the coach driver found the village streets a bit of a handful, but he managed to get parked outside the church after some tight squeezers. The bells here were located on a balcony floor, which meant the ringers could be viewed from the ground floor. The ringing session went well, even though one of the bells was only ringable by ringers with experience because it was damaged.

The next tower was St. Andrew's Arthingworth we arrived here after a wrong turning a little later than anticipated but the ringing made up for the delay.

Because of the roadworks at Market Harborough and Corby we decided to go on to our last tower on a different set of roads. This worked great on paper but in reality it became yet another disaster. Firstly we joined the right road but found we were travelling in the wrong direction, after about ten miles we came off at a slip road where we were able to double back. We thought that was it, surely nothing else could happen, but as we headed up the A6 we were flashed by at least three cars coming in the opposite direction. Then we came to a standstill on a long bend and in the distance stood a broken down articulated lorry carrying a massive crane, blocking the road in both directions. The traffic took their turn to pass the obstacle by using the grass verge. As the coach got closer it became obvious it would not get through. Luckily the lorry was on an incline and its driver and his mate decided to let it move back down slope to make more room. This worked so off we went again on to our last tower even later than arranged. The ringing didn't let us down, and we came away from All Saints, Easton on the Hill ready for a nightcap.

Skillington was our planned refreshment stop, where we had three quarters of an hour in one of two pubs to end the days excitement.

We arrived back at Coddington at quarter past nine it had been a very trying day as organiser but still enjoyable, (I think.)

CODDINGTON HISTORY GROUP- The Year That Was

2007 has been a very busy fourth year for us. As well as our monthly talks, annual open day and various public displays we have just completed our second Local Heritage Initiative project. This generous grant allowed us to publish the book 'Views of Coddington', produce the 'Coddington Heritage Cube' for children at the village school, and significantly expand our website (as well as covering some of our running costs such as ink and laminating materials).

Since we formed we have been collecting information, photographs and skills towards this two and a half year project, which has really stretched us. We hope that you all liked our book and that it will encourage you to go through your cupboards and spare rooms. We are sure there is enough material in the village to keep the group going for decades – so please keep it coming!

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<u>Coddington History Group</u> Morgans Close, Ross Close, Parkes Close, Thorpe Close

The area on which **Morgans Close** now stands was formerly a grass field on which Fred Hollingsworths horses grazed until 1959 when the close was built by Coleman's builders from Balderton on behalf of Newark District Council. The first families moved into the newly built houses in 1960, surrounded by open fields that later became Parkes Close, Ross Close and Thorpe Close.

The occupants at that time were: (starting from the bungalow on the LHS of the road) - Bill & Edith Lee, Lizzie Slack (mother of Nancy Sleight) & her son Jim Priestley, half sisters Bella Earl & Lil Checkley, Mr Robb & daughter Nellie, Kath & Horace Robinson, Ivy & Jim Lambert & family, Joan & Bernard Curtis & family (Mrs Curtis became warden at Well Green), Marg & Bob Checkley & family, Ruth & Tom Robinson & family, Mrs Butler.

On the RHS: - Hazel & Colin Horton & Perry, Charlotte & Cyril Hackett & daughter Patricia, Kath & George Arnold & family, Valerie (nee Knott) & Geoff Johns & family, Yvonne & Tom Knott & family, Wendy? (Nee Franks), Jean & Charlie Tomlinson & family.

In 1960 Coleman's built Parkes close then in 1962 Humphries builders of Balderton built Ross Close and afterwards also built Thorpe Close. The estate roads were named after prominent villagers: -

Morgans Close was named after Henry Morgan; he was born in 1845 and christened on the 16th July 1845 at Saint George church, Leicester his parents being Thomas and Ann Morgan. Henry married Sarah Anne (b.1845 Northampton) in 1866 and as far as we are aware they had no children. Henry learnt the drapery trade in Leicester and came to Newark as head assistant to Messrs. Wright; the Stodman Street tailors of that day. He subsequently commenced business on his own account, following John Hage, hatter, in the shop that was subsequently occupied by Mr. R.J.Hambling. On the 1881 census Henry and Sarah lived in Barnby Road, Newark where his occupation is given as tailor/woollen draper.

Whilst in Newark, Henry was a keen church worker, and superintendent of the Parish Church Sunday School and he was also a member of the Philharmonic Society.

After a period of successful trading, Henry, acting on the advice of his doctor retired from the business and lived for a time at Fiskerton, before moving to the "Old Vicarage", Beckingham Road, Coddington in about 1899. On the 1901 census he was living with his wife Sarah Anne in Coddington and his occupation was given as "Living on his own means". Henry was keenly interested in all the world of nature, his chief hobby being his large garden. This was his special pride, and deservedly so, for the display and profusion of flowers and fruits in their seasons was a delightful sight, and his interest remained unabated until he died. On the 1st August 1901 at the village flower show Henry was a very successful competitor, winning no fewer than eight firsts and five seconds.

Henry took a great interest in Coddington parish affairs. He was chairman on the Parish Council, a Trustee of Coddington United Charity, a School Manager, and to the forefront in running the Flower show.

At one time, his smart turnout, pony and trap, was quite a feature in the village and Newark, and he constantly wore a choice flower in his buttonhole. He was very alert and had a good sense of humour.

On the occasion of their Diamond wedding day, Mr and Mrs Morgan received a letter from the King and Queen: Buckingham Palace 15th February 1926. "Dear Sir, The King and Queen are much interested to hear that you and Mrs Morgan have recently celebrated the sixtieth anniversary of your Wedding day, and I am desired to convey to you Their Majesties' sincere congratulations and best wishes on this memorable occasion, together with the hope you may long be spared to each other. – Yours very truly Clive Wigram".

Sarah Anne Morgan died on the 9th February 1927 in her 82nd year and was buried in Coddington churchyard. Henry was by now aged 82 and he had a house-keeper named Emma; in his garden he had a flagpole and he hoisted the Union flag on his and the King's birthday. Charlotte Hackett remembers him as a very kind nice gentleman, in those days there was no National Health Service and the majority of people who lived in the village could not afford to go to hospital but Henry Morgan would sign a "Recommend" form which enabled you to go free of charge. Henry died on the 8th June 1940 in his 95th year.

Parkes Close, was named after Samuel Parkes and his son Fred. Samuel Parkes married Emily Henton at Coddington Parish church on the 6th December 1883. he was employed as a miller's man aged 22, and his father John was a groom. Emily aged 25 was a sewing mistress at the school; her father Thomas was an agricultural labourer. Four of their six children were baptised at Coddington church: - Fred 17th March 1893, Elsie 27th March 1995, Lily 24th April 1896 and Alfred 4th June 1899. On the 1901 census they lived at the Red Lion public house and Samuel's occupation was publican and farmer aged 38, his wife Emily aged 42, children Annie 17, Maggie 13, Fred 8, Elsie 7, Lily 5 and Alfred 2. The earliest record in Cooks Trade directory of Samuel Parkes was as the publican at the Red Lion in 1892 and the last one in 1942. Samuel Parkes was a real character, for example, he had a tall silk hat and when it was closing time, he would not call out or ring a bell, but simply put his hat on and everyone knew it was time to go home. His son Fred Parkes was a small farmer who lived at 79, Beckingham Road in a very small house that had no modern facilities. Fred farmed various fields in the village, one was the grass field across from his house on which Parkes and Thorpe Close were built; in this field were an orchard, his farm buildings, and a modern house that was occupied by Mr Fryer who retailed milk in Newark. Mr Fryer delivered his milk from two large cans balanced on his bicycle which was no mean feat as he had an artificial foot that meant he could only pedal with one foot

Ross Close. Mr George Ross was the eldest son of Mr George Ross of Stubton and in 1873 he married Sophia a daughter of Mr Allen, Harrowby Hall,

Grantham. They immediately came to Coddington and George commenced farming on his own account. During the next 42 years of strenuous work he met with a great measure of success.

On the 1881 census **Mr George Ross senior** was 36 years old (b. 1845 Scopwick, Lincoln) and farmed 209 acres employing 5 men & 2 boys. His wife was Sophia aged 39 (b. Harrowby, Grantham) their children were all born in Coddington and baptised at Coddington church: - Sophia Ann 1st March 1874, Nellie 27th February 1876, and **George Allen 17th February 1878**. In 1894 George snr. was a farmer, maltster, tax collector and highway surveyor, he rented some of his land from James Thorpe - Drove Lane East farm and Home farm.

George was very interested in the welfare of others in the village and was very involved with the well being of the parish. George was a member of the Parish council immediately after the Parish Council Act came into force, he was also a long serving trustee of Birch's Charity and for many years was a member of the Newark Rural District Council, of which body he was chairman for a year. He was a school governor and on the 26th March 1883 he was party along with James Thorpe, Godfrey Tallents and William Daybell to dismiss the school headmaster John Roberts and replace him with Joseph Chauntry Hunt. George snr. was very involved in the social life in the village and on the 1st August 1900 his barn was used for the annual village flower show. In religion he was an ardent Churchman and was a people's warden, he was a member of the Diocesan Conference for the Newark Rural Deanery, and a regular attendee at the meetings. He was a staunch Conservative and a strong supporter of the Coddington Habitation of the Primrose League. For nearly 30 years he belonged to the Newark Squadron of the Sherwood Rangers Yeomanry, principally at the time when Colonel James Thorpe was the captain of the local men. He was a fair shot, and was an exceptionally good swordsman.

George Ross died on the 11th May 1915 and his wife Sophia on the 7th July 1916. At the village school **George Allen Ross** in January 1884 passed in 3 subjects and received good attendance award from 1886 to 1892. Leaving school he went to Trent College before working with his father on the farm and by 1916 he ran the farm and was assistant overseer and tax collector in the village.

George A Ross was co-tenant with his father of Manor Dairy farm and at the Thorpe Estate sale of 1918 whilst living at The Gables, Church Lane he purchased lot 5 Home (later named Hall) farm 136 acres (£6,100) lot 8 (£875) and four cottages lot 36 for (£300). George Allen married Althea and they did not have any children. George was the godfather of Edward Charles Patchet Daybell (father of Hugh). In 1937 George Allen Ross decided to retire so Mr Arthur Geeson became a tenant at Hall Farm. George Allen Ross lived at the "The Old Vicarage" on Beckingham Road after Henry Morgan died until 1950 when he purchased "The Old Parsonage" Newark Road where he remained until he died on the 12th of December 1952. An obituary for **George Allen Ross** stated that he was a member of the choir for 69 years, a lay reader and was clerk of Coddington village parish council before becoming chairman from 1945 until 1952 and was a past chairman of Newark Rural District Council. For many years he was

Clerk to the Birch's Charity and a member of the board of Guardians. He served on the Newark Internal Drainage Board and the Notts. Agricultural War Committee. In both wars he was a member of the Special Constabulary. For a long time he was a manager of Coddington school and he was a former governor of the Lilley and Stone Girls' High School, Newark. His wife Althea died on the 10th March 1955 aged 76

Thorpe Close, currently we are not aware of which member of the Thorpe family Thorpe Close was named after - it could be any or all of those detailed below:

Col. James Thorpe 28th August 1823 Newark – 13th July 1902 Coddington. James lived at "Beaconfield Hall" he changed the name of the house to Coddington Hall, he owned over 50% of the land and property in the village including the land on which Morgan's Close was built. His life story was published in CCN September 2006. Three of his eight children are: -

Captain John Somerled Thorpe M.C. The 2nd son christened at Coddington Parish Church on the 30th March 1873. After his father Col. James Thorpe died he took over the family business and lived at Coddington Hall. John Somerled was a Captain with the 2nd Btn.Scots Guards, and was killed at the Somme in France on Friday 15th September 1916, aged 44, while temporarily acting as commander. It was after John Somerled's death that the family decided to sell the estate in 1918.

Col. Harold Thorpe D.S.O. The 3rd son b. 17th April 1875 Coddington died 1st December 1953 Coddington. In 1902 he inherited from his father "a specific share in the business". In World War 1 he became a Colonel and earned a DSO in the Sherwood Rangers Yeomanry. When he retired from the army he was a farmer at Coddington Moor and in fact he owned some of the land that Morgans Close was built on. From 1928 he is listed as a justice of the peace.

Brigadier General Gervase Thorpe D.S.O. The 5th son of James & Anne Thorpe was born on the 10th June 1877 in Argyll. He was a Brigadier General in the Argyll & Sutherland Highlanders; Gervase Served through Boer war and was severely wounded at the Battle of Paardeburg.
