I would like to thank those who helped with the erection, decoration & dismantling of the Village Christmas tree at the Community Centre, particularly Bernard Allen for transport; Paul Cobb, Mick Lord, Andrew Barber for decoration & Lighting; Jane Hedge & Mike Clarke for dismantling & removal. Without these people the tree would probably not have happened. The Carols Round the Tree was also a great success despite the weather intervening & I enjoyed the family atmosphere in the centre.

I hope that our church will put on another Club & Society Decorated tree festival again. It was very pretty & gathered together the various groups that are active in the village.

The New Years Eve party at the Centre was a success. Unfortunately my wife & I could not attend but I have been reliably informed that every one enjoyed it. Whilst dispensing thanks, I would like to thank Bernard Allen for the planting of a long but essential hawthorn hedge on the north side of the allotments. This will give protection from the bitter winds to those that work the allotments.

I was pleased to attend the 55' Club Marathon Bowls Tournament in the Centre. This was in aid of the Beaumond House Charity. I have no idea how much was raised but I think the sum will be printed elsewhere in this magazine. Well done. Finally I have just received a report from one of our Councillors about footpaths.

'During the recent cold snap it has been good to see birds feeding on the berries of garden shrubs. My message this month is for the younger readers and is about

Stranger Danger.

What is a Stranger?

What do Strangers look like?

Would your children know what to do and what not to do if a Stranger approached them?

Most people are nice but there are some people who hurt children; there are very few but we still need to be aware that they could be about. A stranger could be a man or a woman, a boy or a girl who you have not met before. They look no different to anyone else. You cannot tell if they are bad or good.

MY ADVICE

Always

- say **NO** to a stranger.
- play with your friends and when playing away from home, look after your younger brothers and sisters and friends.
- tell your parents or responsible adult where you are going, whom you are going with and what time you will be back.
- return home by the agreed time.
- warn your parents, teacher, police officer or responsible adult that you know, if a stranger approaches you.

Never

- walk off with a stranger.
- go near or get into a strange car or van, whatever the stranger says.
- take sweets or presents, even if it is something you really want.
- go off on your own.

What can I do

If a stranger does scare you, or tries to touch you in ways that make you feel uncomfortable...

YELL tell them 'No' or 'Stop'

RUN get home as quick as you can. If you can't get home, go somewhere you know will be safe, like your school a friends house or a police station.

TELL your parent or teacher or someone you can trust right away

How loud can you YELL ?!

make sure anyone who scares you finds out!

Hello everyone



PARISH SURGERY

THE CHURCH YARD

Within the next couple of months it will be the gardening season once again and that means the churchyard will soon be needing attention. Last year, with a lot of hard work from our helpers, the churchyard looked spick & span but to keep it looking so tidy, we do need the help of volunteers. The main grass & trees are being attended to, but the grass is cut on a part-time basis so extra help would really be appreciated. GRAVESTONE MAINTENANCE

If you have family buried in the churchyard, do you realise that it is your responsibility for maintenance of the plot, and in particular the safety of the headstone. We would like to point out that over the past week three headstones were found to be unsafe and have had to be laid down.

Regulations issued by the Diocese are quite strict in terms of safety, and over the next few months a full survey will be done to identify those headstones which the PCC consider to be unsafe. The families will be contacted and they will need to follow set procedures to make them safe.

NEW VICAR AT CODDINGTON

In April we welcome our new team vicar, Rev'd David Anderton. He is currently the Curate in the Hucknall Team Ministry, is married to Emma and they have a 3-year old daughter, Martha. Rev'd Anderton also has two stepsons, Adam and James. Rev'd David will be the Team Vicar of All Saints', Coddington and St Leonard's, Newark.

The New Pastoral Team will be four Anglican churches, St Mary Magdalene, Christ Church, St Leonard's and All Saints' working together in partnership. The Team will have one Team Rector, two Team Vicars, a Team Curate, seven readers and six active retired clergy.

We are very much looking forward to welcoming Rev'd David to our village.

CHRISTMAS SEASON

Every year the church looks beautiful at Christmas time and this year it looked a picture for our Christmas Tree Festival. The whole community came together to produce beautifully decorated trees for the festival and the church looked lovely for the Christmas services.

It was a magnificent success and we would like to say a very big thank you to all those who played a part. We have been approached by several people to have another festival next December. It has been decided that this will go ahead and we will publish details later in the year.

CANDLEMAS and CHRISTINGLE SERVICE and THE CHURCH OF ENGLAND CHILDREN'S SOCIETY

Despite the snowy Sunday evening on 1st February, just over 130 adults and children came to celebrate Christingle and Candlemas. The service was led by our Lay Reader, Mike Bache and as always, it was a lovely service; the church was lit with lots of candles and when the lights were turned down, it looked really magical.

We were really pleased to welcome the Coddington School Choir. It was so nice to see children filling the choir stalls and their singing was beautiful and the Christingle Song sounded lovely. We were also pleased to welcome Heather Ureche from the Children's Society who came to talk to us about their work.

Mrs Peggy Harwood is our Children's Society Representative for the village and because of her enthusiasm and dedication the amount of £1,100 was raised last year for the Society. Thank you very much indeed Peggy and well done! The collection from this years' service and children's collecting candles was £152. We don't yet have a final total but it will be published in the next CCN.

JUMBLE SALE 14TH MARCH

We are having a Jumble sale in the village Hall on Saturday 14th March from 1.00pm to 3.00pm. There will be lots of bargains on sale so do come and have a good browse!!

MOTHERING SUNDAY 22nd March

We are very proud indeed at Coddington to celebrate this special day because the resurgence of Mothering Sunday is entirely due to Constance Penswick Smith and her friend Ellen Porter. Constance came to Coddington when her father, the Rev'd Charles Penswick Smith was appointed Vicar at All Saints'. She read about plans by an American lady to introduce 'Mother's Day' to Britain. In America this is held on the 2nd Sunday in May, but in Britain it was to be on 4th Sunday in Lent – officially this is Mothering Sunday. Constance realised that despite having a similar sounding name to Mothering Sunday, it would not have any of the Christian values which made Mothering Sunday so special. She devoted her life to re-establishing the true Christian celebration of Mothering Sunday and died in 1938 at the age of 60. She is buried at Coddington next to her father. Her friend Ellen carried on the work of the Movement and died in 1942 at the age of 74.

At All Saints' church a special Mothering Sunday service is held, each year, which involves giving praise to the Mother Church. The custom of 'clyping' the church is observed when the congregation walks around the outside of the church while singing 'We love the place, O God', or forms a circle of embrace inside (depending on the weather). It is a really happy family service when posies of violets or primroses are symbolically given by the children to their mothers. After the service, simnel cake is offered for refreshment which young girls working in service used to take home for their mothers on this day.

We are having a Coffee Morning from 10.30am to 11.30am, there will be plants for sale, a raffle and a cake stall. Do come and join us for a cup of coffee and a natter!

SPONSORED WALK 6th JUNE

A sponsored walk is planned for 6th June. The route is to be finalised, but it is hoped that we can start from Coddington, and it will be a circular route which will take in St Leonards. Further details will be available at a later date

THORPE OAKS PLAY AREA

Some while ago we took our grandson to the kids' play area on Thorpe Oaks.

It wasn't so long after the slide had been replaced because some idiot thought it would be a good idea to set fire to it.

When we got there we found about eight teenage youths draped all over the new slide (including the roof) with some using the larger swings.

I have to say that they weren't doing any harm and I had no problems talking to them. Our grandson wasn't bothered either and just got on with playing, but I can see that some children might be put off by older and bigger kids.

There is a sign that states that the play area is only for children up to the age of 12yrs but for some inexplicable reason this is not at the entrance to the fenced area but about 20 metres away from it.

When we did get into the play area, I thought the surface area was a disgrace as it was a mix of poor grass, potholes and plastic mesh.

Since then I noticed that the vast majority of other kids play areas managed by Newark and Sherwood District Council have superb all-weather rubber matting and are far more inviting and safe for young children.

These include Newbury Drive, Sherwood Avenue and Laurence Street, so I wrote to the relevant department at Kelham Hall, only to be told that the cost of resurfacing Thorpe Oaks area would be very expensive and that there was no money available.

So I wrote <u>again</u>, and this time to Jim Besson, the Community Services Manager, and sent in some photos that I had taken.

I was quite surprised to receive a very encouraging email that says:-

"Dear Mr Southgate,

I have now received your photos.

I have passed the pictures to my colleague, Philip Beard, Parks and Amenity Manager, and we will be looking at our finances during the forthcoming budget round to see if we can replace the current surface. In the meantime we will take steps to repair the damaged and uneven areas.

Yours sincerely Jim Besson

True to his word, the potholes have been repaired and the matting re-secured but I think it would now be a good idea for the community at large to keep an eye on this and see what actually gets done!





CODDINGTON HISTORY GROUP

CODDINGTON CRICKET CLUB

From an old Coddington Choir Cricket Club scorebook, kindly supplied by Mavis Kirton. It records the performance of the team during the years 1947 – 1953. The team largely comprised boys from Coddington Church choir and after a short time boys from Coddington Youth Group.

In their first match of 1947, Coddington batted first, scoring 40 runs.

Their opposition, Newark Parish, scoring only 15 runs, thanks to the excellent bowling of John Kirton who took 7 wickets for 5 runs. In the next match Christ Church scored 36 runs, Coddington scoring only 15, with seven players getting a duck, however John Kirton took 8 wickets for 13 runs.

In all, eight matches were played in 1947, (one stopped due to rain).

In seven matches, John Kirton bowled 55 overs and took 36 wickets for an average of 1.8 runs. Ray Vessey was their best batsman, however he only played in one game, making 26 runs not out. Tom Campion battled in all eight matches, for an average of 12.28.

1948 saw the team play eight games, winning five. Once again, the best bowler was John Kirton, with 24 wickets for 54 runs. Tom Knott closely followed him at 26 wickets for 84 runs; Tom Campion was the best batsman, making 81 runs at an average of 13.5.

Unfortunately, from 1949 - 1953, the date of each match was not recorded in the score book, so it is impossible to give statistics, but it is notable that John Kirton and Tom Knott continued to bowl extremely well, and that the outstanding batsmen were Ken Maltby, Ron Walster and John Kirton.

Names of the players in the Choir/Youth Group team: David Andrews, Keith Bakin, Ken Bailey Derek Bowman, George Bradley, John & Tom Campion, Cyril Checkley, Keith Coalby, Charlie Fixter, Alan Geeson, Gordon Gibson, John and Terry Hallam, Richard Hall, Ken Hazard, Alan Heath, John Hollingworth, Colin Horton, Derick and John Kirton, Tom Knott, Vic Lale, Ken Maltby, Frank Oxley, Alan Rawlinson, Geoff Sleight, Colin Smith, Ray Smith, Ray Vessey, George Ward, John and Ronald Walster.

Several of these played for the senior team when they were old enough but many left the village, the following played for the senior team over the years: - David & Mick Andrews, Ken Bailey, Arthur & Derek Bowman, Frank & Ted Daybell, Peter Campion, Charlie, Fred & John Fixter, Alan Geeson, Jack, Terry & John Hallam, Harold & Tony Handbury, Derek Kirby, Derek & John Kirton, Bernard Mastin, Bill Phillips, Ken Spicer, Owen Taylor, Edwin, Harold & Frank Thompson, Denis Thorpe, Fred Tomlinson, Derek Tysoe, Michael Usher, Jimmy & Tommy Wright.

A problem for the team was that the majority of its players worked on the land, and that haymaking and harvest clashed with the middle of the cricket season, often leaving them with only eight or nine players.

The club first played on Hollingworth's field behind The Green, and then moved to Mr.Geeson's field on Drove Lane. Unfortunately, when this field was sold to Charlie Wooliams, they had to leave. The new pitch was on one of Frank Daybell's fields on Balderton Lane. Terry Hallam was one of the members who on Boxing Day 1962 or 1963 prepared the wicket.

John Hallam recalls that during the short time he played for Coddington (starting an apprenticeship with Ransome & Marles in 1953 meant he then played for them), he opened the bowling with Fred Tomlinson, the Captain was Owen Taylor, and that playing on the Drove Lane pitch had its problems! Before play could commence the electrified wire fence around the square had to be removed and a very large roller had to be pushed up and down the strip and then the lines marked out. As Mr.Geeson used to graze his cattle in the outfield, they had to be very careful where they trod!

Nevertheless, he remembers they had some wonderful games, a wooden hut served as a changing room, pavilion and tearoom. Very little preparation was carried out on the cricket pitch in those days, but John remembers volunteers having to spread a very large lorry load of marl, by shovel and wheelbarrow!

Alan Geeson said that in the 1950's Coddington had an excellent team often travelling by bicycle, matches were played against Weston, Sutton on Trent, Leadenham, Brant Broughton, Kelham SSM among others.

Bernard Mastin recalls that Coddington had a very good cricket team in the mid to late 1950's, playing on Frank Daybell's field. The Captain was Frank Daybell, Owen Taylor vice captain the opening batsmen were Bernard Mastin and Harold Handbury or Bill Phillips, Harold Thompson; John Kirton spin bowler, David Andrews fast bowler. Other members of the team were: Mick Andrews, Derek Tysoe, Derek Bowman and Derek Kirton. Derek Bowman or Derek Kirton took over as wicket keeper after Bernard retired from cricket. Harold Thompson made 100 runs at Coddington against Beckingham & Derek Bowman made his 100 at Winkburn. Eva Handbury (widow of Tony) tells us that her late husband made 50 runs on the Clumber Park pitch; Harold Handbury was a left hand batsman and right-handed bowler. There was only one volunteer grounds man, Derek Kirby, and Eva thinks that this was the reason the club dissolved.

The umpires at the time were – George Roland Walster, Bernard Wilby and Bob Everett. As a young lady, Christine Usher (nee Handbury) was scorer for the Choirboys team and the seniors.

Christine recalls the teams playing on Hollingworth's field (behind The Green), before moving down Drove Lane to Geeson's field. The senior players

then being Frank and Ted Daybell, Pat Hough, Bill Phillips, Arthur Bowman (opening bat), Jimmy Wright (fast bowler), Owen Taylor, a good all-round cricketer (Captain). In the mid-1940's, Maurice Leyland came to Coddington and played against the RAF. He autographed the scorebook (does anyone know or have any ideas as to where this and other score books may be?). Christine recalls having tea on the pitch at Hollingworth's field and at Drove Lane.

Peter Campion remembers a walnut tree on the pitch in Hollingworth's field. If you hit the tree when batting it counted as 2 runs. Peter only played for the senior team for a few years, as, in common with so many village boys, he was called up for National Service, in 1946, after which he played for Newark teams. He remembers the Rev. Cyril Bulley (a brilliant, kind and enthusiastic man), starting the Youth group, the Cubs and the Scouts and encouraging all members to take part in sport – football, cricket, tennis etc. Owen Taylor was wicket keeper for the senior team before Bernard Mastin.

John Kirton recalls tea was generally taken after the first team had batted at the village hall. Players walked along the public footpath, over the main road and on to the path again in front of the Almshouses. Among the ladies who helped provide tea were: Mary Handbury, Annie O'Brian, Mary Mastin, Joyce Phillips, Doreen & Mary Tomlinson.

Gill Burgess was the main scorer when the club played on Balderton Lane, she said Colonel Edward (Teddy) Tallents was the clubs President for many years and he attended most matches and as he had a car he kindly volunteered to take Gill to away matches. Gill recalls her mother Lilly saying that in the 1930's Coddington had a ladies cricket team, as we have a photograph we know some other members of the team were: - Annie Dernie, Mary Hough, Ivy Henton, Eleanor Ashton and Eddie Simpson.

Newark Advertiser informs us that in July 1939 Coddington CC scored 63 runs and Balderton Scouts 80 runs. The Coddington players in batting order were: Harold Thompson, Robert Kelham, John Naylor, Patrick Hough, Eddie Thompson, Frank Daybell, Herbert Maltby, Harold Handbury, Thomas Vessey, Bert Coddington and Jimmy Wright – a very fast opening bowler! Other people who played in matches in August 1939 against Beckingham and Balderton were: - Fred Fixter, Frank Thompson, B. Thornhill, Tommy Ward, Charlie Henton, Reg Leader, Owen Taylor, Frank Daybell, E. Barks, and H. Barber.

During the autumn of 2005, in the wake of England's Ashes wins, Lee Parsons and friends re- formed Coddington Cricket Club. The intention was to have a recruitment drive, and see if there was enough demand and interest in the village to sustain a new cricket team.

Since that night, at the Inn on the Green, many players have been recruited, and the club have secured a couple of shirt and sweater sponsorships. Among the activities organised to raise funds have been: a huge family day – a successful

wine tasting night, a couple of race nights and a Ceilidh. At the end of last summer they had completed their 3rd season.

The club is active all year round. In summer there are twice monthly friendly games played at Brant Broughton, and in winter they practice at the Indoor Cricket Centre in Grantham. Social events take place throughout the year. They have recently introduced 'Kwik Cricket Club' aimed at local youngsters and involving Coddington C. of E. Primary School. Their aim for the near future is the development of a new pitch on Drove Lane.
