Seasonal safety tips

As the festive season is now upon us, opportunist thieves will be preparing to take any advantage to steal goods. With us being busy getting ready for the celebrations we are perhaps not as security conscious as we usually are.

Protect your home

- Make your home look occupied. Burglars do not want to be seen or disturbed. Convincing them that someone is inside is undoubtedly the best deterrent.
- Make sure that you lock all outside doors and windows and, if you have a burglar alarm, make sure it is set (even if you only pop out for a few minutes).
- Use automatic timer-switches and low energy bulbs to turn your lights on when it's dark. You can convince any potential burglar that you are at home by having plug-in timer controls for lamps.
- If you are out you could also arrange for your curtains/blinds to be closed in your absence for lamps.
- A plug-in timer for the radio would make it sound as if you're at home. Tune the radio to a station that has more talking than music.

Protect your car

- Car crime is often thought to be committed by sophisticated high-tech criminals. In reality most of the crimes are opportunistic. Thieves simply wander around looking for any item left on show and then steal it by smashing a window. Similarly, older cars with no additional security devices are stolen using basic techniques, whilst more modern cars tend to be stolen by first stealing the keys.
 - Always keep your vehicle locked (including windows) even if you only leave if for a few seconds.
- Get into the habit of not leaving any items in your car. The cost of replacing a broken window is often far more than the value of goods stolen. If you can, take your belongings with you, rather than leaving them in the car or leave them at home.
- Don't leave keys in a coat pocket and leave the coat unattended.
 And be aware of dropping keys into bags or briefcases where they might remain visible.

Have fun but stay safe

Organise how you are getting home from a party or night out at the beginning of the evening and arrange to travel home with a friend.

- On a night out always leave your drink with someone you trust; don't share drinks and never accept a drink from a stranger. Don't get so drunk that you don't know what you're doing or where you are. Stay in a group with your friends and avoid walking home alone.
- · Always use licensed taxi firms and never accept a lift from a stranger.
- Avoid carrying unnecessary amounts of cash and watch where you leave your purse/handbag.
- If you have no option but to walk home alone, stick to well-lit main roads and avoid shorts cuts. Let someone know you are on your way home, what route you are taking and how long you will be. Walk confidently and avoid wearing earphones which could prevent you from hearing somebody approaching.
- On public transport try to sit close to the driver or attendant, avoiding an empty upper deck on buses or empty carriages on trains.

Revd David Anderton, the Team Vicar writes...

A few years ago a friend of mine was in a Sainsbury's store in November and in the reduced goods bin he found a nativity set. Why, he wondered, was this set such a bargain during what should have been the prime selling period for such an item? On closer inspection he discovered the reason – the set was missing its Jesus in the Crib figure!

Christmas is a time for celebration, it is one of the major festivals of the Christian church. God made us to be a people of celebration. It seems to me that the best celebrations are about stories. When we celebrate someone's birthday we rejoice in another year in the story of that person's life. When we celebrate a wedding anniversary we rejoice in the story of the love shared by husband and wife. When we celebrate just for the sake of having a good time then there is, I believe, an emptiness about it.

So it is with Christmas. If we take out the Christ story from our celebrations, then like the nativity set without its Jesus figure it loses its value. Below you will find details of services at All Saints' through Advent and Christmas and I warmly invite you to join us to celebrate the Christ story.

I would highlight the Christingle service on Sunday 12th December @ 5pm, when we will be joined by the school choir. Come to receive and light a traditional Christingle and sing some familiar carols. 1ST CODDINGTON SCOUT GROUP

Over the last 12 months the Scout Group has seen the arrival of new leaders with myself taking over as Group Scout Leader. We have new leaders in Beavers and Cubs providing an air of change which has brought with it some new ideas.

The Beavers have been working on Challenge Badges and have visited the Air Museum and the Police Station. The Beavers have also been learning some basic Scouting Skills in the way of knots and putting up Tents. There have been indoor and outdoor games and activities based around the recent Football World Cup.

The Cubs have also been working on Challenge Badges and visited the Police Station. With new leadership in place we have been able to arrange for the Cubs to have a weekend away at PGL at Caythorpe Court Multi-activity Center. Just before the summer we attended a county water activity day at Holme Pierrepont where great fun was had by all.

The Scouts have been on 3 camps this year. A weekend at Walesby Forest at the end of April, a week at Kelham Hall for the Czech exchange camp and finally a few days during half term at the Peak Gateway Caravan Park in Derbyshire. The Scouts have been shooting with Air Rifles and learning cooking skills amongst other things. Our Explorer section went to camp with the Scouts at Walesby, took part in an International night where they sampled foods from around the world and have been taking part in activities with the 7th Newark Explorer Unit.

Our Duke of Edinburgh Unit has seen 12 people complete Bronze level, 4 people complete Silver level and 7 people complete Gold level challenges and expeditions. During the summer we had a clear out day where a few parents came along to help tidy up the grounds and prepare for the disabled access that we are hoping to put in at the front.

Some major repairs have been completed to the building when the roof was found to be leaking, we have to rebuild the chimney to the right of he building as it is dangerously unstable and have the usual rotting window frames. This has left us very short of funds so we are bringing back the quiz nights. If you have any of the old favourites you would like to see us bring back please let me know.

Our list of people wanting to join the group is very healthy and we have been looking at opening up a second Cub Pack to help with the amount of interest that we have. The only stumbling block is finding someone to actually run the section – If you know of anyone please get in touch.

Our Web site never really got off the ground so I took the bull by the horns and put the new site together. You can find us at 'www.coddingtonscoutgroup.org.uk'. Having identified that things can be done better I have signed up for a course to learn how to do it properly and will be improving and expanding the site as time allows and my skills improve. Once I have finished my course I am considering doing projects for the community. Again, if you have any ideas get in touch.

For a number of years the group has been running the '200 Club' which helps us to raise funds for the group and recently paid for the repairs to the roof. The 200 Club is a lottery which is drawn monthly and only costs £10 per year. The application form can be found on the Web Site or contact any of the group leaders who will pass your details on.

Our premises comprises one main activity hall, one smaller meeting room and a reception area. We have a kitchen and male and female toilets. 

Missed Appointments at the Collingham Medical Centre

Many people know that public sector budgets are under real pressure at the moment – and the NHS is no exception. This does mean even at our local community level that we are constantly reviewing how our resources are used and whether they are in the right place at the right time.

Take the issue of people who do not show up for the routine appointments they have booked. In 1999, there were 99 missed appointments across the whole year. Our recent audits show how this has become a much bigger problem:

Month	Missed GP Appts	Missed Nurse Appts
July	71 (>11 hrs)	95 (>26 hrs)
August	64 (>10 hrs)	81 (23 hrs)
September	68 (>11 hrs)	106 (>31 hrs)

In just three months, more than 100 hours' worth of appointments were missed! Think of all the other patients who could have benefited from those appointments, if only the people who'd booked them had cancelled.

Research carried out by our text messaging service shows that 80% of missed appointments are due to forgetfulness or patients simply feeling better. This increases waiting times for others.

Help us to improve this situation. If you can't keep an appointment at the Medical Centre which you have pre-booked, please let the team know as soon as possible so we can offer it to someone else. We all have a responsibility to use our public services wisely.

It's more important than ever that we manage appointments effectively, because we will be having a smaller nurse team over the coming months (until August 2011).

To help improve our services, we will send you a free reminder via text before your appointment. Should you no longer need your appointment, early cancellation will enable us to provide care to someone else.

We currently hold only 29% of our registered population's mobile telephone numbers, so over the coming months we will be working to collect more. Your support would be greatly appreciated in sharing this information with us.

Help us to keep your NHS healthy! Thank you.





CODDINGTON HISTORY GROUP

Coddington History Group

1906 Captain John Somerled Thorpe

"Captain Thorpe again killed a prime Scotch bullock and, with his usual generosity distributed it among the widows of Coddington and the workmen on his farm and estate.

On Wednesday evening last Captain Thorpe and Mrs Thorpe entertained the servants and their wives to a dance, there being about 70 present." Source: -The Newark Advertiser January 3, 1906

The Senior Citizens of Coddington Christmas Lunch

In the early 1980's the late Dick Gray & his wife Dorothy decided that it would be a good idea to provide a Christmas lunch for Coddington pensioners. Dick for most of his life was very involved with the village hall, so he arranged "Bingo" nights in the village hall to pay for the meals.

Dick agreed with Lester George (he had recently purchased the Dice House on Main Street and renamed it the "Inn on the Green") to provide a Christmas lunch which would be paid for by the funds he raised. This continued for about two years until Lester George sold the "Inn on the Green" and the new owner quoted a much higher price.

Dick & Dorothy decided that the lunch, turkey salad (Joyce Allen cooked one of the turkeys) would be served in the village hall. Eventually after a few years the scouts led by Michael & Angela Keeley cooked a meal and served it at the village hall starting in 1993.

The Scouts.

Angela Keeley writes – "Dick Gray spoke to Michael Keeley (the leader of the scouts) saying that it was getting hard work doing everything for the meal. He was getting too old but enjoyed raising the funds with the Bingo nights. Michael and Angela agreed to help and suggested getting the Scouts involved. The first year 3 turkeys were cooked by Michael Keeley, Dorothy Gray and Joyce Allen. The potatoes were donated by Bernard Allen, the sack full of Carrots and Brussels were donated by Austin and Michael (Banks Greengrocers, Balderton).

The Helpers were: - Angela and Michael Keeley - Cooked potatoes and carrots

Jane and John Collier - Pigs in blankets

Kate and Neil Fuller - Preparing vegetables

David and Jane Hedge - Cooked Brussels sprouts

Peter Robinson Snr - Served the drinks

Serving on tables were Scouts and Ventures, plates and cutlery was hired/table covers and crackers bought.

The first year there were 104 meals, less in years 2, 3, 4, (about 80) David Hedge approached Staythorpe Power Station for the loan of their heated cabinet to help keep the food hot, it was a large cabinet and they also lent the large trays to go with it. Later they said we could keep it!!!

The W.I. took over the providing of the meal in 2000, when Angela and Michael, Jane and John Collier retired from the Scout committee as their children had all become too old for Ventures.

Dick Gray then asked the WI if the would provide the lunch, this was agreed along with the funding by "Coddington United Charity" in 2000.

The first occasion that the WI did the hot Xmas lunch was on the 9th January 2000. Eithne Thompson was President of Coddington WI and the lunch was organised by Gill Southgate in the village hall. Gill Southgate writes:- "I was the first WI member to take over the organization of the Senior Citizens lunch and during my 3 years the menus varied, but the homemade vegetable soup to start was always a winner and was kept by popular demand. Amongst the main courses were Pan fried Turkey Breast in bacon, mushroom and white wine sauce and Boeuf Bourguignonne, and the desserts were also varied with Pavlova and Apple pie being favourites. There was always the cheese course to follow and to finish the meal, a mince pie, (well it was Christmas!) or a chocolate with a cup of coffee for those who had room! Entertainment was also provided for some years and I remember clearly Craig Baumber, a Magnus Swing Band member, coming along with his electric keyboard and singing to us all. Entertainment or not, everybody would enjoy the atmosphere and most importantly, the company of other village members thanks to the generosity of the "Coddington United Charity" (now called the "Coddington Trust Fund") and the hard work of the WI members".

Gill Southgate became President of the WI and Jill Parker organised the meal for three years in the village hall;

Jill Parker: -"All I can remember is fighting with the electricity which kept going off; having what was obviously the first attack of appendicitis the very weekend of my first year & the fact that I couldn't have cooked this meal

without the help of Mary Mollson & the cooking facilities in her "Cottage". Also how fantastic the helpers always were.

For the lunch on the 11th January 2004 the menu was: - Vegetable soup; Boeuf Bourguignon, creamed potatoes, carrots, beans, petites poi's, Yorkshire pudding; desert was Pavlova; cheese and biscuits followed by coffee and after eight mints. Sherry, wine and beer were served, 60 people attended.

For the lunch on the 9th January 2005 the menu was: - Vegetable soup; Chicken Marengo, creamed potatoes, mixed vegetables; for desert trifle or mince pies followed by cheese board, coffee and mints. Sherry, wine and beer were served to 60 people.

For the lunch on the 8th January 2006 the menu was: - Vegetable soup; Boeuf Bourguignon, creamed potatoes, carrots, beans, petites poi's, Yorkshire pudding; desert was Pavlova; cheese and biscuits followed by coffee and after eight mints. Sherry, wine and beer were served to the 66 people who had lunch".

In 2007 Christine Carr was the WI President and Nora Reed organised the lunches in the Community centre on the 7th January 2007 for 71 people, 12th January 2008 for 68 people, and 10th January 2009 for 62 people.

Nora Reed: -"I agreed to help organise the lunch for the retired people of the village, I gathered plenty of willing helpers to provide a roast, it was a challenge but I was willing to give it a try. I chose the Community centre for the venue mainly for the space and kitchen facilities, I was so pleased, it proved to be a success and for three years I really enjoyed seeing so many village people tucking into a real roast with the trimmings.

The vegetable soup continued to be a winner as the weather was always cold in January. Roast pork, vegetables, potatoes, sausage stuffing and fruit crumble to follow, mince pies and Quality Street washed down with beer, wine and coffee. We continued to have financial help from the Coddington Trust Fund without this it would have been impossible to provide this quality food and entertainment. There were various friends who came forward to sing to the guests which was always appreciated".

After three years Nora handed over the organising of the meal to Marilyn Membery.

The WI committee decided that the lunch should return to the Village Hall, the original date set for the meal was the 10th January 2010 unfortunately Coddington village had a very heavy snow falls in January so the lunch was rearranged for the 14th February. Whilst cooking the lunch on the day Marilyn had second thoughts as the fuses on the electricity kept cutting out.

The meal was vegetable soup, pan fried chicken breast in sauce and mixed vegetables, desert was fruit crumble followed by coffee. Sherry, wine and beer was served to the 50 guests. The next lunch funded by "Coddington"

Trust Fund" will be served at the village hall on the 16th January 2011 organised by Marilyn Membery. Due to the poor cooking facilities at the village hall the WI have decided to purchase a new cooker for the village hall which will be installed before the lunch.

As there were too many volunteers from the WI to name everybody it would be wrong to mention individuals.

Chairman's Report AGM 2010

As we are now entering our fifth year here, I feel that we are now coming to a cross roads in our development, so please allow me to retreat slightly so we can get a better perspective

.Coddington Community Association (CCA) was formed as a registered charity, with its trustees, by Newark & Sherwood District Council, Coddington Parish Council, various local groups and interested individuals, with the intention of *improving the conditions of life of the parish and its surroundings*. Money was raised from a variety of sources, including public bodies, sale of community assets and donations and used, following a consultation exercise with the community, to build our community center. As a condition of raising the money, a viability study was prepared, a business plan produced and a preliminary constitution prepared jointly between both parish and district councils. I have copies of these documents should anyone wish to see them.

Plans were made, land was purchased, contracts were placed culminating in this building, which was occupied by CCA in Sept. 2006, using a forty year "peppercorn" tenancy, subject to a maintenance assessment every seven years.

Since then we have had a mixture of triumphs and tribulations:

Our triumphs:

We are still in existence!

We have largely met the objectives of our constitution.

We are solvent (just) and will probably meet our maintenance obligations in year seven

We have strengthened our team by appointing a salaried caretaker and clerk. This has enabled us to meet our statutory obligations with regard to the center, improve the appearance of the center and help our financial control.

We have bought capital equipment e.g. Furniture and cleaning equipment We have identified and increased storage space, although there is still a shortage.

Our tribulations:

The micro sewerage works has a running cost of £2,500/ annum, £50/week, and in four years operation has cost £2,500 in repairs. We have received a verbal estimate of £16,000 to make it function correctly.

The sports hall floor costs £1,200/ annum, £25/week to maintain, cleaning costs additional.

Car Park. We receive constant complaints about safety, overcrowding and the dangerous access. The surface was incorrectly installed (report Hanson

Formpave Pg19) and is rapidly deteriorating. Litter and interference with center users, abuse from drivers. Disability areas ignored. We do not receive any funding to operate this car park and its use should be restricted to users of the center only.

Tribulations continued:

Showers and changing areas, The center was required to move the changing lockers to changing rooms. The center is required to maintain the showers, including legonella testing although they are not used.

The overhead heaters within the sport hall are unsuitable for badminton and potentially dangerous.

The Parish Council is divided over their commitment to our constitution, although they were part authors. Their expressed opinion is that precept (local rates) can only be spent to the benefit of those who reside in the parish of Coddington. Had this opinion been expressed when the feasibility studies were performed it is unlikely that the center would have been built. The Parish Council withdrew from funding our insurance, without notice, on the grounds that we did not need the money. They did not ask for any information with regard to our finances. This was contrary to the agreed business plan. They have provided very minimal assistance with maintenance, e.g. grass cutting. The lack of funding from the parish council is reflected in the high costs to our users.

Relationships with the adjoining school are poor. There is no cooperation over the problems they cause with car parking, and although £8,000 was spent by ourselves to improve the schools access to the center, no usage has materialised. There was no consultation on their proposed building plans.

The drainage dyke between the school and the center requires cleaning to avoid flooding the school/ center. Access is limited and nobody seems to be responsible.

We now have problems with the boiler.

We require more trustees!

To continue with my travelling theme, where are we going to? This is difficult because the Parish Council has yet to produce any plans for community development... so we have no directions. So I see three options To continue as we are...which is too expensive,

Seek renegotiation of the lease, with the Parish Council funding in accordance with their business plan, but there would be a risk of loosing the asset. To seek a transfer of assets, in accordance with N&S DC policy "Asset transfer" but who would want an asset which is so expensive to operate without major works.

CHRISTMAS BIN COLLECTION ARRANGEMENTS

In order to keep costs to a minimum, Newark and Sherwood District Council is changing the way it tells residents when their bins will be collected around the Christmas holidays.

In previous years refuse collectors placed stickers on wheeled bins with information about changes to Christmas collections.

Instead of stickers, this year the council will be publishing the changed dates through the local media, on the council's website and through the council's residents' magazine, Voice, which is delivered free to every home in the district. The winter edition of the magazine will be delivered to homes at the end of November and readers will be able to cut the dates out and keep them on their fridges or notice boards.

The council's cleansing and recycling manager, David Fox, said: "We're always looking at ways of reducing our costs and we feel this is one area where we can make a saving, but still get the information to our residents effectively using different methods.

"We'll be sending these dates to all local village newsletters, as well as publishing them in the local press and Voice magazine. The dates can also be checked on our website at www.newark-sherwooddc.gov.uk/waste or by calling our customer services team on 01636 650000."

Residents should still leave their bins out as normal on the bank holidays of Tuesday December 28, 2010 and Monday January 3, 2011.

Annual bin calendars will still be published in Voice magazine in November so residents can still keep abreast of which of their bins will be collected and when throughout 2011. Residents can keep and refer to this table over the Christmas period. Unfortunately, the council is unable to return to collect any bins not presented for collection.
