Preventing Vehicle Crime

Vehicle thefts and thefts from vehicles are crimes of opportunuity. One-fifth of motorists say that they regularly leave their cars unlocked, meaning that a lot of vehicle crime could easily be prevented.

Below is list of tips that may help to outwit the thief.

Please remember, vehicles are never totally secure, so any item left in your vehicle can be taken by a determined thief. The following measures should be considered in order to minimise the risk of your property being stolen:-

Securing your vehicle

- · Always lock your vehicle and remove the key from the ignition when it is parked, even if it is on your driveway or you're paying for fuel at a garage.
- · Never leave car keys where a thief could easily reach them, such as on a key hook by a door, as these may be stolen via your letter box.
- Keep keys out of sight or locked in a cabinet especially at night.
- · Fit an immobiliser or an alarm or use a steering lock to deter criminals from stealing your vehicle.
- · Keep a list of serial numbers for electrical items in your car, such as the radio and satellite navigation systems. This will assist the police in returning the items to you if they are stolen and recovered.
- · Consider attaching a lockable wheel nut to each wheel to prevent them being taken.
- · If possible, when parking on your driveway, lock your gates or consider fitting a driveway security post in front of your vehicle.
- \cdot Have your vehicle's registration number etched on to its windows and lights.
- · Consider fitting a tracking device to your vehicle that can be activated if it is stolen. This will assist the police in finding it.

If your car stereo has a removable front, make sure you remove it each time you park your vehicle.

Consider fitting anti-theft number plates to avoid criminals using your registration number and if possible, fit a lockable fuel cap to avoid losing your fuel.

· If you have a garage available use it to keep your car out of sight. Thieves also steal parts from unattended vehicles for scrap metal e.g. exhaust systems.

Avoid keeping important vehicle documents in your car. If your car is stolen the criminal could use the documents to sell it on.

- Never leave anything valuable, or anything that might contain something valuable, on display. This includes jackets and loose change left in an ashtrays. Even if you don't have anything stolen, the cost of replacing broken windows or locks can be well over £100.
- · When parking overnight or for a long period out of a garage, try to leave your vehicle in well lit area.

What to do if your vehicle is broken into or stolen

· Report it to the Police by ringing 0300 300 9999, or if a crime is in progress, a life is in danger or the offenders are nearby, ring 999, and be able to quote your vehicle's registration number.

Avoid touching areas of the vehicle where the offenders have been and if possible, keep the vehicle dry and under cover.

THE DEMISE OF THE VILLAGE POST OFFICE AND STORES

It is topical I know .Constant newspaper articles about how many post office closures there are per month or per year whichever suits the writer at the time.

I wonder how any of you reading this consider whether your local post office is vulnerable. Many people ask the question of me 'I hope they're not going to close you down?'

I try to explain that to my knowledge there is no agenda that I know of that includes closure of any post office, let alone this one.

What you do read or hear about, however, are post office closures even in this rural area. This as I understand it is mainly due to a sub-postmaster retiring or deciding to sell up. You may well ask why doesn't someone take the business on?

Well now you come to the crux of the matter. Mostly this is because a stand-alone post office in a rural location does not present a realistic business opportunity for anyone to 'buy'. Remember the prospect of owning a business is to make a profit and certainly enough to make a living wage. Most, if not all, of the closed post offices will be because they do not present a viable business opportunity.

Post Office Ltd may say that they would like to keep a post office open but really it is not down to them. They are not about to invest any of the limited investment funds in a post office just in order to maintain a local amenity.

Let me make it very clear your post office remains open because we have a viable retail business to support a post office on the premises. No other reason. If the retail business declines to a point where it is no longer viable the post office goes with it.

I hope this helps the community understand the importance of support not only for your post office but also the shop.

Revd Sylvia Joyce Stevens 1941-2010

Many of you will have known Sylvia who died in Beaumond House on 22nd November 2010. Sylvia retired from parish life in north Nottinghamshire to live on Claricoates Drive in Coddington in 2003. Although retired she remained very active, as a member of the All Saints' Church, taking services and contributing in many ways and she was also a valued member of the Women's Institute branch. I know many people got to meet Sylvia when she was out walking her dog Pickles.

Unfortunately, soon after her arrival in the village she was diagnosed with cancer which spread to her bones, but she faced her illness with great courage, staying as active as she could as long as she could, and through it all maintained her strong faith in our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. She said that her body was like a tulip bulb and on the last day when all will be resurrected she will grow as the Sylvia Tulip which she was sure will be Red and Yellow!

A Service of Thanksgiving for Sylvia was held at St Giles, Balderton on 1st December, perhaps the worst day during the snow! Despite even many local people being unable to get there were still a good number in church and I'm sure on any other day it would have been overflowing.

Sylvia touched in a deep way the lives of all she met. To Sylvia everyone was made in the image of God, and she really treated them as such. I wanted to share with you some words of appreciation in a letter I received from an old friend of Sylvia's:

'I thought I'd just like to drop a line of appreciation and gratitude to you, to Coddington parishioners and Sylvia's neighbours for the friendship, help and support you so generously meted out to her... clearly she was most fortunate in the place where, and in the people among whom she chose to retire.'

We recorded Sylvia's service, and if you would like an edited CD copy of this please let me know.

Finally I just like to express once again my gratitude, and I'm sure those of many others, to all at Beaumond House who have supported and cared for Sylvia during her illness and who made her last days so comfortable. No words can ever manage to express that deeply enough.

ALL SAINTS' CHURCH CODDINGTON

Revd David Anderton, the Team Vicar writes...

Question: what have the following phrases in common 'salt of the earth', 'the powers that be', 'suffer fools gladly', 'a leopard cannot change his spots'? Answer: they all have their origins in the King James Bible and this year marks 400 years since its completion, the third officially sanctioned English translation of the Bible. There are many events, national and local that are occurring to celebrate this so keep your eyes and ears open. See www.kingjamesbibletrust.org for more information.

One of the reasons for translating the Bible into English was so that ordinary people could read the Holy Scriptures and decide on matters of faith for themselves rather than rely on scholars of Latin, Greek and Hebrew to tell them what to think. But of course an English translation was only helpful if you were able to read, and 2011 also marks the 200th anniversary of free education provided by the Church of England. To celebrate this, a special candle is travelling around all 70 church schools in the Diocese of Southwell and Nottingham. It will be at Coddington School on Wednesday 26th January when a special act of Collective Worship will be held. On Monday 26th September our Bishop, Rt Revd Paul Butler, will be visiting the school and he will also tell the story at our Little Fishes group that day.

Looking back, I know Christmas must seem an age ago, but below you'll find a report on the services. I'd like to make special mention of the Carol Service. When Mike Bache went to turn up the heating in church for this, he discovered the heating oil we'd expected hadn't been delivered and the church was perishing cold! When asked, Maggie and Mike Clark willingly opened up the community centre and allowed the service to take place there. Again we had a good turnout and enjoyed a wonderful warm celebration. My sincere thanks go to Maggie and Mike, and to Sheila and Mike Bache who ran round preparing for this service while I finished taking a service at St Leonard's.

Finally, the 28th February to 13th March is Fairtrade Fortnight – All Saints' Church Council committed itself to becoming a Fairtrade church at its last meeting, so I'd encourage you to look out for special events and promotions relating to this.





Building Repairs

We received financial assistance from local organisations which has helped us maintain our funds for this years group activities.

We also need to start replacing windows as there are some frames which are in a very bad condition. I am finding that local builders seem reluctant to quote for work, I wonder if they do not want the work or do they expect us to want the work doing for nothing.

I would like to say that I do not expect people to work for nothing, all I ask is for a reasonable quote bearing in mind we are a local charity working for the community.

Please get in touch if you are a local builder and interested in quoting for some of our building repairs. We do have a number of projects which need to be completed.

Fund raising

In November we had a Quiz Night which was very successful. We raised £350 towards new equipment for the Duke of Edinburgh Award Schemes.

We are planning more of these events for the coming year to raise money for the building repairs and replacing some of the other equipment the group has which is in need of repair. We are planning for the next Quiz Night to be around the 2nd July, keep checking the web site for more information.

It has been a little while since the pages of Village News bit of an update. The club is from a team of middle aged members. Over the last two



Coddington Cricket Club graced and we thought it was time for a now in its 6th year and has grown men to a club with over 70 years our junior section has

grown beyond our belief with over 50 boys and girls between the ages of 5 and 11 now very much part of the club. We can also boast 10 junior coaches who over the last 2 years have given up valuable time to help develop local youngsters not just in cricket skills, but in personal development as well.

Villagers maybe aware that we use to play our home matches at Brant Broughton and more recently that we were looking to develop our own ground on Drove Lane. However, the high financial costs associated in turning a field into a cricket pitch were just too much for such a small club.

We knew back in 2009 that we need to start a junior section to ensure the longevity of the club. But Brant Broughton was too far away for youngsters to travel for coaching sessions and with Drove Lane a distant dream we were struggling to launch the junior club. We approached the school & Mr Daykin kindly lent us the school playing field so that we could run our first sessions. However, the interest among the village youngsters meant that we quickly out grew the space provided at the school and a plan B was needed if we were not to lose any momentum. With the Drove Lane development proving too costly the club had reached a cross roads where development was being restricted due to lack of space.

As we approached the end of the summer in 2009 we were approached by Winthorpe Cricket Club to share their ground on a long term basis. Winthorpe also only had one senior team and the ground was really being under used. As with all of these decisions a vote needed to be put to our members to carry the proposal. After a unanimous agreement development plans were put into place to maximise this opportunity.

We expanded the junior club and now run two Kwik Cricket teams and an Under 11s hard ball team that is about to enter the Newark Colts league this summer for the first time. We had some great wins at both Kwik Cricket and hard ball against some well established local teams. We also decided that we would take juniors from a very young and we have successfully run balls skills courses centred around the game of cricket for Year 1 and up. This has allowed children to develop their co-ordination skills alongside their fitness and bring out the sport person in all. The great thing is that starting at this age more girls want to be involved and once started there is more chance of keeping them within a sporting environment whether that is cricket, tennis, football, hockey, rugby etc. This summer we will have one and hopefully two female coaches which we are hoping will encourage more girls to join and we can then look at starting a girl's only team.

The culmination of all this hard work with the junior club was that 14 junior members were invited to play cricket on the outfield of Trent Bridge during the lunch break of the Test Match when England entertain Pakistan last July. From Coddington School playing field to Trent Bridge in two year was a magnificent achievement.

Coddington Cricket Club may not be the oldest or biggest club in the area but we are the fastest growing and we have done this in a very short space of time. Long term development plans are in place to ensure that there is always a cricket club providing competitive and social cricket for all in Coddington & Winthorpe. As part of this process over the past 3 months committee members have been working nonstop to raise funds through grants so that an outdoor practise net can be built to further aid the clubs development. I am pleased to announce that the target of £12,000 has been raised and work will begin in early spring on the bay in time for the new season.

Coddington Cricket Club is not just about the success of the youngster the senior team has been well established in the local friendly league for 6 seasons now. Results are mixed, players come and go but having fun and enjoying the game and the social side of cricket is our main aim. Last season we saw our average age drop when players aged between 10 and 16 started to come into the team and add some much needed young legs and ability. Over the past few seasons we have made many friends with the teams we play who come from Yorkshire, Lincolnshire and Nottinghamshire to enjoy our famous teas.

As with any club we are always looking for new members for the junior club and the senior team. In fact we could really do with a few more players for the senior team! Please see our ad elsewhere in this publication. You don't have to any good, just want to play hard but fair, get involved with the banter and enjoy a nice Sunday afternoon out in the local countryside. If you fancy coming long to a few winter net sessions you are always welcome. These are held in Lincoln between 9pm and 10pm on Thursday nights under the watchful eye of Mark Fell Director of Cricket for Lincolnshire.

We meet at outside the Post Office each Thursday and travel on mass to Lincoln. 

CODDINGTON HISTORY GROUP

The Large East Window of All Saints Church Coddington

You will remember (or even better, still have to hand) the Coddington Community Calendar for 2010. The cover had a picture of All Saints Church's greatest artistic treasure – a large 1865 stained glass window by the firm of Morris Marshall Faulkner & Co. The 3-light window sits beyond the screen and choir benches, behind the main altar with its patterned reredos and wall-panelling and Morris settle. Each light has a fleur-de-lis shaped top, with three rows of simple tracery above. If you look closely you can see that the stonework still bears the remains of painted and stencilled decoration from a more colourful Victorian past.

The window was designed at the start of their long careers by William Morris and Edward Burne-Jones, two of the most famous decorative-art designers and painter of the Victorian era. Church goers can see the window and the church's other glories every Sunday, but anyone can visit when the church is open for village events, or by appointment with the church warden (ring S Bache on Newark 674741). Coddington's set of Morris glass is important because it contains both very early and mid-period glass.

The E-window is dedicated to the late James Thorpe who had brought his family to Beaconfield (Coddington Hall Estate) and died shortly afterwards in 1843. At the very top of the tracery nestles a seraph angel with two pairs of wings - one wrapped around him like a fur coat. The two outer lights contain six full length figures of saints - St Peter, St Stephen, Mary Magdalene, St Paul, St James the Greater and Martha. The central panel is devoted to a Crucifixion scene, but below that there is a small and extremely beautiful Annunciation, in which the angel Gabriel tells the Virgin Mary that she is to become the mother of the Son of God.

When the window was designed and installed in 1864-5 the church had just been demolished and rebuilt on its original foundations. Before rebuilding, the church and churchyard had been in a dire state 'buried by the accumulated soil of past centuries' according to the Newark Advertiser reporter on May 18th 1865. The work had been achieved by the combined energies of the new vicar Rev. Dolphin, churchwarden and village 'squire' James Thorpe and the local community, under the direction of rising London-architect G F Bodley. The old tower had been encased in new ashlar stone, the floor level had been raised by four steps, and Bodley had promised that 'the ancient windows and every detail of value will be carefully preserved and built up in the new walls'. The E-window, however, was reportedly new stonework.

In 1865 only two of the three stained glass windows ordered from the Firm later known as Morris & Co had been installed. Costs were running at £600

(about 50%) over budget, so the small tower window of St John the Baptist and the reredos had to wait until 1869 when more money had been raised. Many other features that we know today, such as the organ, oak panelling, the chancel screen and the South-aisle stained-glass windows were yet to be added.

The window lets in plenty of light and the figures stand out clearly against quarries subtly-patterned with yellow silver-stain. Yellow and green predominate but touches of red appear in the haloes of the figures and in the blue and red robes of the mourning Virgin Mary. In 1865 the Newark Advertiser reporter commented 'The painting, though in the opinion of many somewhat colourless, is exquisitely soft and delicate, and the glass is of a much more transparent type than that of the old-established firms.'

The designs used in the E-Window

When I first started looking at the work of Morris & Co in the church I soon realised that the most popular stained-glass designs were re-used many times up until the 1920s. I wanted to find out about our designs: what they meant and the other windows where they appeared - the rest of this article is about this.

The Crucifixion design in the centre by Edward Burne-Jones shows Christ on the cross with two mourners – his mother Mary and St John. The design has the reference BJ126a, but at Coddington the angels which appear in many versions are not included, giving an uncluttered and beautifully naïve effect. It is the design first used at Amington Church in 1864 (for which Burne-Jones was paid £8) and adapted for St Edmund's Hall Chapel, Oxford in 1865. The cartoon was also used at Catton in 1866, St Winifreds, Hayward Heath in 1867, Llandaff Cathedral, Cardiff in 1867, St James Brighouse in 1870, Haltwhistle in 1872, Ponsonby, Meole Brace, the Vanderpoel window Saugerties New York in 1874, the Gordon Chapel Fochabers, Moray in 1876.

These particular mourning were first used in the St Edmund Hall College Chapel Crucifixion. As far as I know, our Mary (looking down with hands clasped high, in anguish or prayer) has only been used three times – and the third window at Haywards Heath was destroyed in 1962. The St John design has been used at least eleven times - both with this crucifixion design in the churches listed above and with other designs (as at Troutbeck 1873, and Llantrisant 1874). Above the cross are the sun and moon ('sol' and 'luna', which refers to the dual nature of Christ - the sun his divinity and the moon his humanity). In the Amington Crucifixion and in windows at Low Catton and Brighouse (now at Cliffe Castle Museum) these same symbols are carried by angels.

The small Annunciation panel (BJ120a) appeared on the Coddington Picture Cube, produced for children at Coddington School a few years ago.

Burne-Jones set the scene in a garden with the Virgin seated on a bench, hands crossed on her chest, and head bowed in acceptance at the angel Gabriel's news. The Virgin's features and hair may have been modelled on William Morris's wife Janey. The poses of the figures are similar to those in many famous renaissance paintings – the Virgin's in paintings by Fra Angelico and Gabriel's kneeling pose in paintings by Leonardo Da Vinci, Botticelli and Ferrari. Latin speech scrolls and a vase of Madonna lilies separate the figures. The design was first used at Brighton (Church of the Annunciation) in 1865, then at Coddington (1865) and Haywards Heath (1868, now destroyed), before being showcased in Morris's first American commission, the Vanderpoel Window in Trinity Church Saugerties, New York.

The left hand light of the window contains the figures of St Peter, St Stephen and St Mary Magdalene, each standing on a flowery ground. St Peter and Mary Magdalene are designs by William Morris himself, whilst St Stephen is by Edward Burne-Jones.

St Peter, dressed in Bishop's robes and carrying the keys of Heaven and Earth, is a self-portrait by William Morris (WM173a), designed and for Middleton Cheney's E-window 1864-5 and used at least 16 times more. Early uses of the cartoon are at St Nicholas Beaudesert in Henley-in-Arden 1864-5, here at Coddington 1865, All Saints church, Jesus Lane, Cambridge 1866. Other uses include a tile panel at Peterhouse College, Cambridge and stained glass at St Ladoca, Cornwall 1869, St Andrew's Minley, Hampshire c1870, Wooley St Peters 1871, and Christ Church Southgate.

Burne-Jones was paid £2 2s for his design of St Stephen (BJ149a) the first Christian martyr – you can see the stones used to kill him and the martyr's palm in the design. It was first used in 1864 in a window at Bradford Cathedral (which cost £300) then in Coddington, All Saints Jesus Lane Cambridge 1866, Llandaff Cathedral Cardiff 1969 and Bloxham 1869.

Mary Magdalene (WM171) carries a wreath and the perfume bottle she used to anoint Christ's feet. The cartoon was designed c1863 for St Martin on the Hill Scarborough – that window also included the Virgin Mary with Lilies that appears in our beautiful Coddington triple window. This Mary Magdalene design also appears at Dalton, and Harris Manchester College Oxford. The right hand light of the window contains the figures St Paul, St

James the Greater and Martha - the designs are all by William Morris himself, and none of them seem to have been used very often.

St Paul (WM70a) was first used in 1864-5 in St Giles Camberwell – in this window it appeared with the St John the Baptist design used in Coddington's Tower window. St Paul was also used at Wooley St Peter in 1871.

St James the Greater (with pilgrim's cap and staff and associated with the shrine of Santiago de Compostela) was probably chosen to honour the family

name of the Thorpe patrons. The design (WM179a) was probably the one referred to in Morris's account book 'received £2 each for designing a beastly James and Jude' for Bradford Cathedral in 1864 (which reminds us how young and unworldly these young men were then). I haven't yet found any other uses of the cartoon.

Martha, Mary Magdalene's more domestic sister with her keys and raised apron, is design WM263 according to the acknowledged Morris glass expert Sewter. The design was later adapted to become 'Autumn' in the 1873 series 'The Four Seasons' which can be seen at Birmingham Museum and elsewhere. There are other depictions of Martha at Bradford Cathedral 1863 and Antingham St Mary's 1865, but these use a different cartoon by Rossetti. Our Martha might therefore be the first and possibly even the only use of this design in a church setting.

If you have access to the internet you can find information about the church on Coddington History Group's website (http://www.coddington.org.uk/) and also pictures of the church and many of the stained glass windows mentioned on the photo-sharing site 'flickr'. The best place to look is the specialist flickr groups ('William Morris and Friends,' Edward Burne-Jones' and 'Bodley and Garner').

Morris and Burne-Jones were portrayed as minor characters (with much artistic licence) in the television drama series about the Pre-Raphaelite painters, 'Desperate Romantics'. Many books have been written about Morris and Burne-Jones, but for detailed accounts of their lives there are excellent paperback biographies, which could be obtained from the Library service:


