RETIRING CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

For the very last time, I am giving a report to the Village as I have served my time as Chairman.

The village has continued to be a pleasant place to live and is as active as it ever was. The main addition that has been made is the construction of a climbing stones arrangement that was requested by the teenagers since they had nothing to do. Jane Hedge and Wendy Parratt headed up the necessary arrangements between the village and the local council and our thanks must go to them for what has turned out to be a successful addition to our facilities.

Last Christmas was somewhat spoiled by the foul weather which prevented the erection of the tree at the Community centre and, therefore, the carols round the tree was a write off.

The result of the bad weather was that the PC decided to purchase 3 hand pushed grit spreaders for the village along with a supply of grit. These are situated in the three main areas of the village.

More mundane matters include our attempts to influence the Core Strategy put forward by the NSDC. Efforts were put by Mary Molloson and myself at the meetings in Kelham Hall and we await any results but we don't hold our breath.

Finally, Jane Hedge was re-diagnosed with her cancer and started treatment on Christmas Eve and is doing well all things considered. I went to the doctors as I had a bit of cold and, after X-ray, was told I have Lung Cancer. We have resigned from the Parish Council immediately to take our level of stress down and so that we can concentrate on our treatment.

We both thank the PC for the opportunity to be part of the village decisions and wish you all the best for the future.

ON THE BEAT WITH PCSO 8128 MIKE MUNRO

Thefts from garden sheds have shown a recent upturn as avid gardeners are using their sheds to store more and more tools and equipment such as lawnmowers, power tools along with their garden furniture.

Shed security is just as important as securing your home. Thieves consider sheds as soft targets, as these are often flimsy timber buildings out of sight at the bottom of the garden, which can hold many hundreds of pounds worth of goods. **Sheds are not the best places to store valuables.**

As sheds and garden items are often left insecure many insurance companies are refusing to pay out when care has not been taken to make these items safe. Many insurance policies also do not cover items left outside the house.

Often the items stolen are virtually untraceable once sold on at car boot sales, other cash-in-hand venues or through Internet auction sites.

Garden and Shed Security Advice

With the lighter nights, now is the time to make sure that your garden along with your shed is secure. Here are a few tips that you may have over looked:

- v Are your fences and gates in good state of repair?
- v Do your gates have a good quality lock on them?
- v Do you have security lighting? If you do, is it aimed at the house? Do not just light up the garden; make sure you are illuminating the areas where a criminal may gain access to your property. Thieves do not like to be illuminated
- v Secure those cherished garden ornaments and furniture. Also secure your wheelie bin; burglars have been known to move bins to stand on to gain access to first floor windows. They have also used bins to take away your property.
- v Are there any overgrown areas where someone could hide? Cut it back so that you can see what is going on.
- Has the shed survived the Winter/Spring without damage, which could help a thief gain access? If not, don't delay – fix it now.
- v Are the shed doors secured? Shed doors are notoriously easy to get into so strengthen the door and frame if you can. Fit an additional padlock using a good quality hasp and staple and even think about replacing the hinge screws with coach-bolts. Thieves will take the time to unscrew the door hinges in order to gain access.

- Are the windows secured? Use a window lock on opening windows. Fit a strong grille or heavy wire mesh.
- Use an alarm.
- Does your insurance cover the shed and all the equipment you store in there?

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CODDINGTON LORRY WATCH

How Will It Work?

- * Local observers note details of vehicles that may be misusing the route
- * Details are then handed to the parish co-ordinator for administration or sent through to Trading Standards online using Nottinghamshire County Council website which has a dedicated Lorry Watch section. http://www.nottinghamshire.gov.uk/home/business-economy/tradingstandards/lorrywatch.htm
- * Co-ordinator sends hand written details to Trading Standards. Trading Standards enforce the weight restriction on behalf of Highways.
- * Trading Standards will then use the information as intelligence and coordinate our future Enforcement action accordingly.

Exemptions

Some vehicles are permitted to use weight-restricted routes and these may include:

- * Vehicles loading or unloading within the restricted area
- * Emergency vehicles
- * Vehicles in the service of the local authority in pursuance of its statutory powers or duties in connection with premises along the restricted route
- * Building and industrial demolition operations
 Public utility services along the route

ALL SAINTS' CHURCH CODDINGTON

Revd David Anderton, the Team Vicar writes...

To describe someone as evil seems commonplace in our modern media. Tabloid headlines often call murderers and paedophiles "pure evil", a strange combination of words when you stop to think about it. Many of the news reports following the death of Osama bin Laden described him as the 'personification of evil'. Is it true that a human being can be nothing but evil? Slice them any which way you like and to the core all you find is evil?

This is to say more than someone is very wicked. It is to say that they so embody evil they are unable to take moral responsibility for their actions. In fact perhaps we are trying to say that they are not a human being at all. That allows us to separate us from them, to say that they are in some way fundamentally different. And perhaps it also allows us to treat them in a way that we would never consider treating someone like us.

Alexander Solzhenitsyn, the great Russian novelist and Soviet dissident who suffered years of imprisonment under harsh conditions once wrote: "If only there were evil people somewhere insidiously committing evil deeds and it were necessary only to separate them from the rest of us and destroy them. But the line dividing good and evil cuts through the heart of every human being. And who is willing to destroy a piece of his own heart?" Despite suffering dreadful evil at the hands of his captors, Solzhenitsyn could still see the good in their hearts and the evil in his own, and know that both he and they were human.

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

CODDINGTON HISTORY GROUP THE FORMATION OF CODDINGTON W.I.

The Founding of the Women's Institute.

The W.I. movement was formed in Stoney Creek, Canada in 1897, when Adelaide Hoodless addressed a meeting for the wives of the members of the Farmer's Union. It was set up to revitalize the rural communities and to encourage women to become more involved producing food for the First World War.

On 16th September 1915 the first British meeting was held at Llanfairpwll on Anglesey in North Wales. By 1916, 40 W.I.'s had been formed and Lady Denman was appointed chairman.

That the minutes of the WI show the Coddington ladies were very active supporting the original ethos of the Canadian Founders. The following records are the main resolutions and achievements from 1934 to 1954.

Coddington Women's Institute is founded.

On Wednesday February 7th 1934 a meeting was held in the Methodist School Room to discuss the desirability to form a branch of the W.I. at Coddington. Mrs Davies, Voluntary County Organiser came from Southwell to explain the objects of the W.I and the manner of forming a branch. Those attending were: - Mrs Barker, H.Kelham, Beet, Margerisson, Burgess, Mumby, Campion, Naylor, Cargill, Richards, Clarke, Robinson, Ross, Handbury, Henton, Simpson, J Hollingworth, Hough, Ingram, Thorpe, Jackson, Thurtle, J Kelham, Winfield.

The Misses Gomer, M Sharpe, Simpson, M Simpson.

Mrs Thorpe then proposed and Mrs Barker seconded that a branch should be formed. The resolution was carried unanimously. A further meeting was arranged to be held on Tuesday February 20th 1934 at 7pm all who wished to join would be enrolled as members.

February 20th 1934 at the Methodist School Room, 26 ladies attended. Mrs Thorpe proposed and Mrs Simpson seconded that Mrs Davies should take the Chair. 12 members were elected to sit on the committee. It was proposed by Mrs Ross and seconded by Mrs Hollingworth that Mrs Thorpe should be elected as President of

the branch. Mrs Winfield – secretary, Miss Gomer as Treasurer. The second Tuesday of the month at 7.pm was chosen as the meeting day to be held at the Methodist School Room.

May 15th **1934**: -The Institute gained second prize of £1 for "Tray of Produce" Class at Newark Agricultural Show, this money was added to 17s 9p raised from guess the weight of the cake in order to buy a pianoforte.

August 14th: - A second hand piano was purchased for £10. It cost £1 to repair. The president announced that they were to purchase a small pig for which tickets could be available.

September 11th:- It was announced that the profit from the Pig Tickets was £2.6s.3d, only it did not say who had won the pig!!!! **1935:** - Whist drive and Dance to be held to raise money in aid of

Old Folks Tea. The date for the old folk's tea was to be held 29th January, open to people of 65 and over, widows and widowers.

July: - A suggestion box question was "Could the WI help in any way to have the Council houses built".

September: -The President said that the Church Council was doing all it could to raise money to repair school playground and asked if members could help in any way.

It was decided to hold a concert to aid the Playground Fund. It raised £4.0s.3d.

1936 January: - Old Peoples Tea arranged to be held in Day Schoolroom followed by a concert. Folk dancing was enjoyed at the end of the meeting

February: - Birthday Party was held; 34members each bringing a friend, enjoyed entertainment provided by Newark and Collingham members. Songs, folk dancing and a sketch April.

Mrs Campion gained a Red Star [90%] for her Bottled cherries, a Green Star [83%] for her bottled pears.

September : - Dressmaking course proposed to begin in January 1937.

1937 April: - A proposal was made by Mrs Hough that enquiries should be made to see if the WI as a body would be able to erect lamps at church gates as a Coronation Memorial.

July: - Mr Rick gave a cost of two electric lamps for the church gates. It was decided that the WI could only afford one lamp.

November : - The estimate for the lamp was accepted.

1938 April: - The Roll Call "What I dislike about our village" was answered by members.

The replies were as follows, bad sewage system, lack of houses for big families, the refuse dump and dark streets.

October: - A whist Drive and dance was to be held in November the proceeds were to go to start the Village Hall Fund.

1939 January: - A gift of 15cwt of coal donated by Mr Bailey was to be distributed to the elderly of the village.

September: - A short meeting to discuss our future plans, due to war breaking out, was held in the Men's Institution. It was decide to hold meetings at 2.15 to 4pm.

A Whist Drive and Dance to raise funds to send parcels out to the boys of the village

December: - Meetings now moved back to evenings.

1940 : - It was decided that the Old Folks Treat should be a concert with refreshments.

More wool was distributed for knitting for the troops. A number of letters were read out from members of His Majesties Forces who had received parcels from the W.I.

February: - 30cwt of coal was ordered to be sent to the 30 old folk in the village.

Four parcels were sent from the Comforts Fund to Norman Fryer, John Naylor, Richard Hall and Charles Richards.

June : - A parcel from the Comfort Fund was sent to Edwin Thompson.

September : - Fund raising for a W.I. Ambulance Fund was discussed. Meetings were again moved to afternoons. Three parcels were sent this month to Jack Burgess, Frank Till and Mr Beacroft. The piano was sold for £3.0.0 which was forwarded to the Spitfire Fund.

December : -It was decided to send each man in the Forces from Coddington a 5/- Postal Order and a W.I. Christmas Card.

1941 February: - A party was held for the soldiers of the Searchlight Unit. 33 men attended including the Officers.

Lieutenant Millar thanked the W.I. on behalf of the men. A box of cakes was sent to the men left on site. Money was raised to give each man a packet of cigarettes.

March: - Two parcels were sent to men in the Forces. One to Harold Thompson who has joined the Air Force and the other to J

Goodband, who has joined the Royal Navy. Each parcel contained – 1 pair of socks, 1 handkerchief, 1 tablet of soap, 1 shaving brush, 1 Gibbs dentine, 1 writing pad with envelopes and a 5/- Postal Order

May: -Mr Owen Taylor gave a demonstration of how to put out an incendiary bomb using sandbags and a stirrup pump.

The President asked for Volunteers Hand Force to help local farmers with their work.

W.I. ladies could obtain one and a half pounds of wool to knit for friends and relatives in the Forces.

1942 : - A change of meeting day was necessary as the Scouts now used the National School on Tuesday evenings.

September : - It was discussed that the W.I should assist the cutting up and preparation of food for the Land Girls at Coddington Moor. It was decided to formulate a rota of members to undertake these duties.

October : -W.I. discussed the planning of the new houses for the village. The main concerns were better sanitation, plenty of storage room, light and airy rooms and playgrounds.

1943

February : -The Birthday Party was held on February 13th. The children sat down to a very scrumptious tea and afterwards enjoyed games and competitions. Peggy Campion and Peter Johnson thanked the members for their kindness in giving the children such a jolly party.

April : -A letter was read asking us to carry on the good work of jamming as 300,000 tons of jam was needed this year. This was agreed to do. A request was made to the members to collect nettles and foxgloves as they were important for medical purposes. This was agreed to.

August : -Mrs Lee of East Stoke, who went to the Institute Meeting in London on behalf of our and her members reported how thrilled the ladies were when the Queen came unexpectedly.

A doll donated by Mrs Winfield raised £2.11.8d for the Prisoners of War Fund.

December : -This was a busy month and £14-11-4d was raised for the Forces, Mrs Hollingworth sent a very pretty brooch for fund raising for the Village Hall Fund. 375lbs of jam was made at Preservation Centre and 160 meat pies are distributed each week.

Mrs Daybell started to distribute Orange Juice and Cod Liver Oil, 30 bottles a week to families.

1944 July: -A letter of sympathy was sent to Mrs Albert Thompson, whose husband died from wounds whilst fighting in Normandy. The Garden Fete held to raise money for the Village Hall Fund, £135 was given to the fund. A letter was received from Madame Dash thanking the ladies for the gifts sent to the Women of France.

1945

February Ninety one children and twenty members attended the Birthday party on 17th February .**March**: - Quite a few articles were brought for Women of France. The Preservation Centre will be open for any surplus fruit.

June : - Thank you letter from Madame Dash for the gifts sent to the Women of France.

July: -£8.15s.3d was raised for Orphans of Europe. Mrs Hollingworth offered to collect clothing etc. for Appeal for Children of Holland. The ladies were asked to knit as fast as possible the wool they had in hand. 60 garments knitted for Orphans of Europe. Parcels sent to Help Holland Fund and Women of France. Lady Sybel Argles will open the Garden Fete, Rosemary Geeson will present the bouquet.

August The Garden Party raised £100. The first consignment of goods sent to Help for Holland.

1946 January: - The decision was taken to have the Birthday Party for WI members alone this year. The competition was an article made from a Flour sack. It was noted that 3 tons of Dandelion roots were needed for medical purposes and Mrs Hough agreed to be responsible for the collecting.

February : -Roll call Question was "What I have that my Grandmother went without". The winner of the flour bag competition was Mrs Boswell 1st, Mrs Sharp 2nd, and Mrs Dutton3rd. Mrs Sharp gained a RED Star 85% in County Flour Bag Competition. Christmas Gifts to go to Boys in the Armed Forces.

July: - Whist Drive for Village Hall raised £3.13.10d.

September : - Good Entry for garden produce for Harvest Collection, Winner Mrs Burgess, 2nd Mrs Margerrison, 3rd Mrs Thompson. Produce to go to St Catherine's House

October: -Whist Drive raised £8.1.1d for Hospital for Sick Children. Balance from Preserving Fund to be divided between District Nursing Fund, £10 and £11.18. 4d to Village Hall Fund. It was recorded that 60 garments were knitted for Orphans of Europe, parcels of garments and household goods were sent to Help Holland Fund and Women of France. Parcel received from Assoc of Australia. A draw was made for the items the following ladies received, Dripping - Mrs Geeson, Honey - Mrs Milnes, Tin of Milk - Mrs Simpson Dried Fruit - Mrs F Hollingworth, Tin of Meat - Miss Gomer, Jelly - Mrs Winfield. A second parcel received from Assoc. of Australia, Honey - Mrs Woodhouse, Jam - Mrs Bagguly, Dripping - Mrs Friend, Marmalade - Mrs H Walster, Dripping - Mrs Coddington, Tin of Milk - Mrs Nelson.

A visit to the Sugar Beet Factory to be arranged by Mrs J Hollingworth.

December: -The whist drive will support Aid to China, Merchant Navy and School for the Blind.

Members were asked to bring cottons, wools, pins and needles to go to Friends Relief Services.

1947 : - This year the meetings were organised as they had in previous years, there were fund raising events in support of the Village Hall Fund, interesting speakers and the social half hour at the end of the meetings featured either a sing song from the Twice 44 Song Book or a produced drama. Outings were organised to Derbyshire and also to the Little Theatre Nottingham to see "The Young Mr Barrington". The best darned sock was won by Mrs Geeson.

Mrs Yeomans was presented with her prize as competition winner for 1947.

1948: - A parcel was received from Canada but there was no mention of what it contained. Again a draw was made to share the gifts. Outings were arranged to The Ideal Home Exhibition, Stratford upon Avon and Hunstanton. A second parcel arrived from Canada. Denman College is first mentioned and a whist drive was to be held and a parcel costing 6d. to be brought to meeting for selling and proceeds to go to Denman College Fund.

The members decided that Christmas gifts of toys should be collected and taken to Cottage House Balderton Children's Home.

1949 to 1952: The secretary was instructed to fill in the Village Questionnaire suggesting improvements should be made to Better Bus Service, Street Lighting, School Lavatories and a stamp machine at the Post Office. Mrs H Walster gave an account of her course at Denman College. Produce was collected and sent to St Catherine's House. It was decided that members of the Men's Institute and husbands be invited to the birthday party along with two members from each town groups and East Stoke. Mrs Winfield retired as president at the Birthday party and was given a pottery jug of flowers. For quite a few years parties for children were held. During these years the group did dramas, and entertainments for the last half of the meetings.

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
BEST KEPT VILLAGE COMPETITION

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CODDINGTON HISTORY GROUP

Thanks to all of you who came to our exhibition in May – 'though why the first rain for months had to come on that day I don't know! However, there was not much and it did not spoil the day. In addition to people from London, Surrey, Norwich and Yorkshire we set a new record for the furthest travelled as someone came from New Zealand! In addition to Fred Reed's magnificent "village timeline" which went all the way around the scout Hall we had displays about the village in 1885 and the 1940s, village weddings, the church, the Enclosure map, photos of the village events for Charles & Di's wedding in 1981 and for William & Kate's recent wedding, and many more.

We had been very lucky to be contacted by a descendant of the Young family who had given us a transcript of a diary kept by Edward Young when he travelled to Australia to take part in the Gold Rush and we put this on display along with his letters to and from Coddington at this time. I was very pleased when the lady who contacted us actually came along bringing the originals for us to see along with a painting by Olive Lee nee Young – we have already got copies of some of her work. She also brought an *original* deed dated 1764 which conveyed a cottage in Coddington from the late Benjamin Bowman to William and Sarah Woollas – Sarah being his daughter. I hastily scanned it for our collection.

We also had a new feature on "Art in Coddington" and were most pleased with the number and quality of the items loaned which looked great displayed on the choir stalls in the church.

Hopefully some of you saw our display of our Sunnyside Farm survey in Newark library which ran for a month.

In June members are invited to join us on a Farm Walk with Bernard Allen.
