PARISH COUNCIL ELECTIONS

The Parish Council Elections are to be held on Thursday 7th May

Any villagers wishing to stand as a Parish Councillor is invited to obtain nomination forms and further information from the Parish Clerk, Mrs Ruth Tysoe.

The completed forms need to be completed and returned to Kelham Hall by noon on Monday 6th April.

Details of those standing for election will be published prior to the election - so you will all have ample opporunity to see who your new Parish Coucillora may be - so make sure you vote for the candidates of your choice by turning out to vote.

THE ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

The Annual Parish Meeting takes place in the Village Hall on Tuesday 14th April at 7.60pm. All villagers are invited to attend.

Following the meeting the Parish Council will hold a further meeting to conduct its ordinary business.

PROPOSAL FOR CARAVAN PARK CODDINGTON HALL GROUNDS

A further Public Meeting to consider revised proposals for the proposed caravan site by Colsk Developments was held on 26t February at 7.30p.m.

The only changes to the original plan appeared to we the deletion of a car park adjacent to Old Hall Gardens, and by moving the owners house nearer to the formal gardens of the Old Hall.

Since it appeared that something like half the 15 acre site was subject to tree preservation orders and the owners house and personal grounds amounted to a further acre of land, this meant that approximately 6 acres of land were available for siting 75 caravans/tents/motor home pitches mainly in an area adjacent to Old Hall House and Old Hall Gardens.

On this occasion Colsk Developments showed a video of the site alleging that much of the debris was caused by people tipping rubbish on the site. Film was shown of the remaining celler debris of the Old Hall itself and items which had lain on the site for a considerable time. A war time open blast shelter was depicted as a crumbling building whereas in reality it had been reclaimed by nature with trees and vegetation growing out of it.

Much play was made by the developer of the safety aspect for children yet at the same time his revised proposals showed that he intended to use a large surface of concrete (from an original wartime building) as a safe area to instal a childrens playground with swings climbing frames etc.

It was also noticeable that the applicant was unwilling to take the advice of the Council's Planning Officer with regard to preventing vehicular traffic using the southern loop road (facing Old Hall Gardens /Parklands Close) and passing through areas under Tree Preservation Orders.

Additionally the applicant seemed unwilling to take advice with regard to the planting of a tree screen on the southern area of the site where it is at its thinnest.

The question of traffic problems and road safety in the vicinity of Old Newark Road, was also raised by members of the audience and the Parish Council.

At their subsequent meeting, the Parish Council raised no objections to the proposal as revised.

Because of the timing of the Public Meeting, during half term, only some 50 members of the public attended of whom some 7 were still totally opposed to the proposal for a caravan site. There were also a considerable number who still held serious reservations about the scheme.

The scheme is due to go before the Planning Committee on Thursday 31st March at Kelham Hall at 5.30p.m.

At its meeting on 3rd March the Parish Council voted to give a donation of £25 each to the Mother & Toddler Groups held at Harvey Avenue (Beaconsfield Community Centre) and at the Village Hall.




CODDINGTON CULINARY CONCOCTIONS

The Parish Council wish to make all the residents of Coddington aware of the footpaths within the Parish Boundary (thin solid line).

Path 1 leads from Balderton Lane by the Windmill and down to the A1 where it now ends. Originally it led to Clay Lane and Newark.

Path 2 leads from A17 and joins a bridleway from Vale Farm to Folly House but turns off, cuts across a field to Coddington Plantation, and then across to Corporation Farm/Grove Cottage to Barnhy in the Villows,

Paths 3 and 3a leads from Chapel Lane in front of the Church Cottages across the A17 to the corner of Drove Lane.

Path 4 used to lead from Drove Lane, then went across Winthorpe Airfield to Winthorpe Village. Footpath 4 was closed by the Air Ministry when the air field was opened and will change again when the Coddington Bypass A46 -A17 link is built.

Country footpaths are normally just tracks and can often be muddy in winter and bordered by vegetation in summer.

"A landowner or tenant farmer may plough a footpath or bridleway in the interest of good husbandary where it crosses arable land. He may not plough a footpath or bridleway running alo: g the headland of a field, nor may he plough any part of a byway. When ploughed he must make good the surface, normally within two weeks, or he can apply to the Highway Authority for a temporary diversion".


