
Dear Reader,



6 p.m. CHRISTINGLE SERVICE. This service includes a candlelight procession and is for the whole family. Last year it was most impressive. Please come along.



BEACONSFIELD YOUTH CLUB, CODDINGTON

Shadow Exercise - October 27/28th 1990

Our Youth Club entered two teams for the Shadow Exercise in Clumber Park. Shadow is an overnight navigation and initative test for groups of young people, demanding a spirit of adventure, skill, enthusiasm and the ability to work together as a team in difficult circumstances. Although Shadow is run as a competition, the most importantnaspect is taking part and pitting oneself against the elements and testing abilities to deal with unusual situations as part of a team. Before the teams could be accepted, they had to be tested and assessed in First Aid and map reading and navigation. Both teams (5 members in each) passed. In all, 129 teams took part and the Coddington teams finished 44th and 96th. Both teams were presented with a certificate which takes pride of place in our Youth Club.

Leisure Service Transformer Bus

Groups of young people from the Youth Club have taken part in threee adventure weekends in Nottinghamshire and Derbyshire. Activities included rock climbing, absailing, canoeing, mountain biking, art work, drama, hiking, photography and video making (a display of which, is on show in the Community Centre). supervised by were weekends and qualified experienced Youth Worker instructors, who participated in all the activities.

Mini bus outings have also been organised either for the day or evening in cooperation with the Youth Service, ie., ice skating, cinema (Nott'm), rock climbing (Derbys), white water rafting (Holme Pierrepoint), and swimming (at Rushcliffe).

The age group for our club is 11 upwards - presently we have 50 members, with many more coming of age to join. Membership is 50p, with an entrance fee of 20p per night. We have members from Newark, Balderton, the village and the Harvey Avenue Estate. Members are allowed to bring guests.
