

A note from the Headmaster of the GROVE SCHOOL



I am pleased to report that all have settled in well and are joining in all the sporting and musical activities as well everything else, including, of course, their lessons!

One of the highlights of this term is our Carol Service which is held this year in Balderton Methodist Church at 7.30 p.m. on Monday, 16th December. All are welcome and I can promise you a memorable occasion if you come. Next term during the last full week of March, we shall be putting on a spectacular Dance production in the School Theatre. <u>Scouts</u> The Six a Side team won the District Football Competition in September and went on to the County Championships. This was played at Worksop where they won the County Shield.


WELL DONE LADS

CODDINGTON CHURCH

The estimated budget for our Church of All Saints for 1992 is listed below, which as you see shows a considerable deficit. It is unfortunate that whilst we have a band of loyal people helping both financially and physically, there are just not enough supporters to enable us to pay pur way.

WE do not wish to hide the fact that fund raising activities could be expected to reduce that deficit, as would donations which we have been most fortunate to receive in the past. But none of that can be guaranteed, and even with it there would remain a substantial shortfall.

Inflation has meant that the Church of England is no longer able to support the Clergy's costs as before, and the burden falls increasingly on parishes.

If we fail to pay our dues we are likely to lose our resident vicar and see a curtailing of services.

We appeal to you for regular support. Is it worth perhaps £1.00 per week to you to fully maintain the Church of God in Coddington?

A Cotinton Survey

(From the 11th Century), as interpreted by Dr. Robert Thoroton in

"That Part of this Township reckoned with Newark, and more especially Soc to it, paid the Geld as two Carucates but the Bishop of Lincoln had two Manors here besides, one whereof Uluric had, before the Normans came, and paid the Tax or Geld as one Bovate. The Land was two Bovats. There afterwards the Bishop had half a carucate and one acre of Meadow. This in the time of King Edward the Confessor was 40s. Value, when King William's Survey (the Domesday Survey of 1086) was made 20s. Another Bugo had, and was charged for it to the Public Tax at two Bovats and a half. The land whereof the Conqueror's Time was certified to be half a carucate but was waste: Botild held it, and it was 2s. value, there was two acres of meadow. Here were two otherr Manors likewise of the fee of Bishop Odo of Bayon, one of which <u>Uluric</u> had, before the Conquest, was taxed at three bovates and a half for it. The Land being found to be twelve Bovats. There Losuardus the Man (or Tenant) of Bishop, had two Villeins and four Bordered with one carucate the tree acres of Meadow. In the Contessor's Time this was 20s. in and Conqueror's 10s. Value. Another Manor Leuric had, before the Norman Invasion, rated at five Bovates to the Dane-geld. The Land two Carucates. There Ouchell under the Bishop had half a Carucate and four sochnmen on four Bovats of this Land, and three Borderers with half a carucate and five acres of Meadow."

All wonderfully clear and explicit!! Perhaps a glossary might help:

"Bovate", sometimes called an oxgang, which is the amount of land one ox could plough in one year. Depending on the system of tillage acres.

"Carucate", sometimes called a ploughland, and this was the amount of land that could be ploughed by one plough (with its team of eight bovate - between 80 and 144 acres.

"Geld" was a tax on land in late Saxon England, paid originally as "Maror"

"Manor" - a unit of territorial organisation, usually associated with the medieval feudal system. The holder of the Manor had the right to exact certain fees and fines from occupiers of land.

"Villein", in common usage was a peasant or serf who was bound to a lord and who paid for lands either in rents or service and dues to

"Bordar" - these were villeins of the lowest rank who rendered menial services for a cottage held at the will of the lord.

A "Socager" held the tenure of land through certain services to the
