#### Coddington Emergency Plan

What would Coddington do if the "Lockerbie" disaster happened to us?

This was the question put to P.C. representatives at a recent meeting organised by the County Council Emergency Planning Group. It was stated that at Lockerbie there was an emergency plan and that lives were saved by prompt action and information passed on to the Emergency Services.

The County Council has advised all Parish Councils to prepare an Emergency Plan.

#### WE NEED YOUR HELP.

We would like to create a directory of skills and equipment, found in the village, that could be made available to the Emergency Services.

Information Required, eg.:

<u>Skills</u> - builders, electricians, plumbers, etc., doctors, nurses, first aiders, etc., cooks, caterers, radio enthusiasts, etc., etc.

<u>Equipment</u> - buildings (as emergency centres), sources of fresh water, vehicles (4X4, tractors, etc.), fuel sources, power generators, heating/lighting equipment, spare accomodation, tents, camp beds, chainsaws, jacks, ropes, scaffolding, tarpaulines, etc. Cooking equipment, first aid supplies, mobile phones, P.A. systems, etc.

These are just a few of the listing of suggestions. If <u>YOU</u> have any skills or equipment that would be helpful in an emergency PLEASE advise the Parish Clerk or any Parish Councillor. Our intention is that the Plan be reviewed each year and shared by the Village Community.

#### CODDINGTON PARISH COUNCIL REVIEW

Nottinghamshire Consultative Draft Minerals Local Plan : A public meeting was held in the early spring at Coddington Village Hall to discuss the proposal regarding the sand and gravel allocation of 240 acres between Drove Lane and Stapleford Woods. Following this meeting, the Parish Council resolved that it strongly objected to the allocation at Coddington of the site for sand and gravel extraction. These objections have been lodged with Nottinghamshire County Council.

#### Stapleford Woods :

The Parish Council is still greatly involved in the fight to stop the proposed extraction of gravel from Stapleford Woods. Coddington entered the Best kept Village Competition but unfortunately was unplaced. Will 1994 be our Year?! Thanks to Mr Hessey (Village Handyman) and parishioners for all their efforts at keeping Coddington tidier - Our aim is to make Coddington a "Litter Free Zone".

The Parish Council purchased three floor mounted litter bins from Newark Town Council. One of these has been sited and secured on the corner of Harvey Avenue by a nearby resident. The second is to be placed between the electricity sub-station and bus stop on Newark Road. The third litter bin has yet to be sited - any suggestions?!

#### BROWNIES and RAINBOWS

Coddington Brownies have always been busy. A First Aid course was run by the St John's Ambulance Brigade over 12 weeks enabled all the girls to pass and collect their Brownie First Aid badge.

Two day trips were organised way back in the summer, when all the Brownies went to the White Post Farm, near Farnsfield, and then a couple of weeks later they all went to "Glenbrook", Derbyshire, which is the Guides' Association Camp Site. The Self Help Team provides information about and services for self help groups in Nottingham. It also holds a database of groups in the Trent Regional Health Authority area on behalf of Trent Healthline.

But what are self help groups? They are made up of people 'in the same boat' - people with the same problems, illness or disability, or who have experienced the same life situation. They come together for mutual support, to share information on their situation, and how to cope with it or overcome it. Members run the group, and they decide who can join and what the group will do. Most groups share experiences and information, aiming to break down feelings of isolation.

If you are looking for a self help group to help with the situation you are facing, then contact the Team on Nottingham 691212. If there is no local group, the Team has details of national organisations and a library of literature, written from the patient's point of view.

If you are involved with a local group, please contact the Self Help Team and let mem know about your activities so that they can put you on their database. Your group could be oust what their next caller is looking for. #### Dog Fouling

The Parish Council has received complaints from Parishioners about the amount of dog fouling in the village. This is caused by thoughtless dog owners allowing their animals to use footpaths and grass verges as "conveniences". This is very unpleasant for pedestrians and for those residents who take the trouble to cut the grass verges outside their homes. Children are arriving at School with dog muck on their shoes!

Newark and Sherwood District Council employ a Dog Warden who visits the village regularly. He has asked us to point out that he is empowered to fine anyone he sees allowing their dog to foul a public "Poop place. Scoops" are now available at pet shops and cost only a few pence each. Flease take one with you (and a plastic bag!) when you exercise your dog and be prepared to use it.

Signs reminding dog owners of their responsibilities in this regard will shortly appear around the village. Please, do not ignore them.
