1ST CODDINGTON SCOUT GROUP:

CODDINGTON NURSERY:

We are very pleased to be able to say that Coddington Nursery is now open and that all fifty places have been filled. The children are settling in well and are enjoying the educational opportunities which are being provided for them.

Mrs Morris and Miss Kirkbride have worked extremely hard and have created a bright, welcoming, ordered environment in which the children can take advantage of the six areas of learning, which cover their personal and social development, language and literacy, mathematics, physical and creative development and their knowledge and understanding of the world.

HARVEST FESTIVAL:

On Thursday 26th September the main school held their Harvest Festival Service in All Saints' Church, Coddington. Each class had learnt a song, recited a poem or took part in a drama production and the whole school shared in the singing of harvest hymns and songs. It was a very successful occasion and much enjoyed by pupils, staff, governors and the Reverend Wright!

The Nursery had their own harvest celebration which took place in school. Parent and friends were invited to attend, and again the event was appreciated and enjoyed by all who came.

BRAMLEY APPLE COMPETITION:

CHRISTMAS PUDDING

12 oz White breadcrumbs

8 oz sultanas

8 oz chopped mixed peel

6 oz grated carrot

1/2 tsp each cinnamon, ground nutmeg

and allspice

2-3 tbsps treacle

1 wine glass of Brandy, Port, Rum,

Brown Ale or Stout.

1 lb raisins

8 oz currants

4 oz soft brown sugar

6 oz grated apple

4 eggs (whites only)

grated rind one lemon

METHOD: Mix all ingredients together in a large bowl, stir well (if possible leave mixture overnight, in cool place, to help the spicy flavour develop) If before cooking the mixture seems dry add the juice of an orange or increase the beer to 1/4 of a pint. Spoon the mixture in a greased 4 pt basin or 2 x 2 pt basins. Cover and steam, 4 pt for 9 hours, 2pt for 4 1/2 hours. Store in a cool place, on Christmas Day, steam for 3 hours.

This is an old war-time recipe and is less rich than the "normal" recipe, and is often liked better by children as it is not so heavy.

FLAPJACK

8 oz margarine

2 tbs golden syrup

4 oz soft brown sugar

4 oz sultanas

8 oz oats

6 oz wholemeal self raising flour

METHOD: Pre-heat oven to 160oC (325oF)

Melt margarine, syrup, sugar and sultanas over a low heat.

Stir in oats and sieved flour and mix well. pread in to greased 8" x 12" tin and smooth top with a knife. Cook for 15-20 minutes. When cooked cut in to squares. Leave to cool in tin before removing.
