CODDINGTON C OF E PRIMARY AND NURSERY SCHOOL

The school continues to grow at an unprecedented rate. This term has seen the creation of two new classes and the arrival of four new teachers. We are aware that many new houses are still to be built in the Coddington area but feel confident that we will be able to offer places to all children living in the school's catchment.

An excellent School Foundation service was held at All Saints' Church in the summer term. This was a 'first' for the school and proved so successful that we hope to make it an annual event.

Of considerable concern to the school and the residents of Coddington is the problem of parking around the school at particular times of the day. In view of this growing problem, the school organised a traffic survey and a meeting for parents and residents in September. A lively meeting was chaired by a representative from Nottinghamshire Environment Department and it was resolved that a steering committee should be formed as soon as possible. This committee will investigate, under the guidance of the Environment Department, ways of alleviating the problem.

On Friday 7th December the school Christmas fayre starts at 6.00 pm in the school hall. This event is, of course, open to all the resident of Coddington and every one will receive a warm welcome.

2002 – THE QUEEN'S GOLDEN JUBILEE

To enable bodies such as small parish councils to celebrate the Queen's Golden Jubilee, funds of up to £5,000 are available under the 'Awards for All' Scheme - through which some of the proceeds of the National Lottery are distributed. Coddington Parish Council feels that this represents an opportunity which the village should benefit from and is anxious to hear views of parishioners.

Of course there are criteria to be met if an application for funds for a Jubilee Project is to be successful. Any project would have to meet one or more of the following Golden Jubilee themes:

- involve all sections of the community;
- embrace the multicultural nature of society;
- encourage a sense of community spirit and wide community involvement;
- promote or provide service to others; and
- engage young people.


Funds are not available for:

- general running cost to sustain current activity;
- items which would only benefit an individual;
- activities promoting religious beliefs;
- activities that are part of statutory obligations or replace statutory funding;
- endowments, loan payments or second hand vehicles, foreign trips.

The Parish would be expected to contribute something towards project costs, but this could be in the form of cash, time, materials, premises or transport.

One idea already suggested is to plant fifty oak trees, as an avenue, along that part of Drove Lane from its junction with the A17 towards Main Street. But there must be other projects, which parishioners feel would be worth consideration. If you have any ideas for a Jubilee Project, please let Pam Hemphill, Clerk to the Parish Council, know before the next Parish Council meeting on January 3rd 2002.

CODDINGTON MILLENNIUM GARDEN

In the spring of 1998, Coddington Village Millennium Committee was formed from various groups within the village. Their brief was to investigate providing a living reminder of our time for the enjoyment of present and future generations. After considering many options, it was agreed a garden would fulfil these conditions.

Plans are now well advanced for installing a Millennium Garden at the junction of Old Newark road and the C208 road on slightly rising ground opposite the Village School. The land is owned by Nottinghamshire County Council who have given permission in principle for the garden to be constructed. We have the support of Brackenhurst College who have prepared the landscape design, and agreed to undertake the ground work and planting by students on a voluntary basis, forming part of an instructional course.

The Garden will take in the existing village sign, and cover the ground between Newark Road and the access to the fishing pond, featuring,

17 mixed trees

52 evergreen and deciduous plants

81 herbaceous perennials

25 grasses

Frost resistant limestone path with disabled wheelchair access at the pond end Bark mulch glade path

2 raised rest areas with hardwood benches

An application for a grant has been made to WREN, 'Waste Recycling Environmental' for the above sum, and a decision is expected before the end of the year. The garden has been designed to require minimum maintenance, and when this is necessary the Parish Council has agreed to undertake the maintenance.

SHOULD ALL OUR HOMES BE NUMBERED?

There was an occasion recently when a parishioner had to dial 999 to call an ambulance to take his spouse to hospital following an apparent heart attack. Their home was in one of the roads within the Parish where the properties are not numbered – but are identified by names only. It seems that, because of this, the ambulance crew spent what might have been vital time in driving up and down the road in question looking for the caller.

It seems that time, and even possibly a life, could have been saved had the properties in the road in question been sequentially numbered.

The lack of road numbers in some parts of the Parish present problems, especially at night, not just for the emergency services, but also for relief postmen/women and trades people. At the same time it has to be recognised that some parishioners are quite happy to rely on house names and might be resentful of numbers being 'imposed' upon them.

Responsibility for numbering within the Parish rests, ultimately, with the District Council which has powers in this area under the Public Health Act, 1925. That said, the District Council is unlikely to insist on any numbering arrangement without the consent of the majority of householders. The Parish Council, who would make any necessary formal approach to the District Council, needs to know what parishioners think about this.

If you have any views you would like represent, why not attend the Annual Parish Meeting on April 18th 2002 and let your Parish Councillors know what YOU think.

Our dedicated volunteers visited much of the parish to explain the scheme and 45 people have committed themselves to giving regular donations. A total of £6282 has been pledged so far.
