A NEW COMMUNITY CENTRE FOR CODDINGTON

On 26a September a public meeting was held at the Village Hall to discuss the provision of a new community centre/multi sports hall at Coddington. The meeting was very well attended and a report has been prepared by the District Council setting out the outcome of the Meeting and the results of the leaflet/questionnaire that had been given to every home in the village prior to the meeting. Copies of this report can be obtained from Mr Kerr, Strategic Director (Ops) at Newark & Sherwood District Council. The majority view was in support of siting the new facility next to the School. If that proved impossible, then the favoured solution was a new facility at Beaconsfield Drive.

After the meeting, the owners of the land adjoining the School were approached again to see if the land could be bought at an affordable price. This did not prove possible and the parish Council voted at its meeting of 7th November to support, with one abstention, the provision of a new Community Facility at Beaconsfield Drive.

The District Council will now proceed to draw up more detailed proposals leading to the submission of a planning application early in the New Year.

Metamorphosis

Around £19,500 raised by July 2002.

The latest additions to the grounds include:

Infant outdoor musical instruments The class sculpture in the pond; The outdoor drawing boards; The nursery activity boards; The nursery weather mural.

During the coming months we hope to:

Plant the willow tunnel; Install some of the buddy benches; Erect the junior outdoor gymnasium; Install the junior outdoor musical instruments.

Match Funding:

The School was successful in a bid for Local Education Authority funding. Nottinghamshire LEA have agreed to <u>match</u> the money raised by the School for the grounds project. We have now raised almost £40,000!.

After School Clubs:

Full details of all extra curricular have been sent home with the children. In brief, that clubs are: gardening, netball, gymnastics, sign language, football (2 clubs), music (2 clubs), reading and writing.

Book Week:

The autumn term book week proved to be yet another success. £700 worth of books sold! £420 raised for the School!!!

Newark and District Athletics:

The School enjoyed considerable success. A large number of our athletics made it through to the finals where several 1_{st} , 2_{nd} and 3_{rds} were recorded.

School Travel Plan:

Several meetings have been held this year and various projects have been discussed. The relevant bodies are looking into the possibility of a cycle track from the School to Beacon Heights. The steering committee is also hoping to get a 'walking bus' scheme underway in the near future. The exciting times continue at Coddington School. We are still welcoming new children to the school, with many more still to arrive.

The school project (metamorphosis) is gathering pace, with several sections of the project completed ahead of schedule, most noticeably the outdoor infant play equipment, which was installed by a group of parents, teachers and children. This was a massive team effort, involving many hours of backbreaking effort during a weekend in April. Our attention is now turning towards the pond and the wild life area.

WE NEED YOUR HELP!

We are trying to reroute Footpath No. 4


Our intention is to start at DROVE LANE and for the footpath to go around the field (presently worked by Allen Farms who are in agreement) to the stile. It will then continue in a straight line to join the trees on the edge of Price's field and onto the track that runs at the back of the Yew Wood (known as the yellow brick road)

Have you walked around Mr Allen's field, across Mr Hounsfield to join the track? We need as many people as possible who can confirm this has been walked for more than 20 years. Please contact Mrs Parrett Tel: 672687 or any Parish Councillor as soon as possible. We may be able to adopt this through use.

It would then join with the track and new road to come out onto Newark Road, then onto C208 and join Footpath No. 3A near to the Plough Inn to form a circle.

The old Footpath is marked by a dotted line on the plan. The new proposed route is shown by a solid line.



CODDINGTON CHURCH BELLRINGERS

The church held its Harvest Festival on Sunday 6 ± 0 Cotober 2003. Congratulations goes to one of our ringers, Assistant Tower Captain, Mr Derick Kirton, as it is fifty years ago since he rang for his very first service, which was coincidentally also for a Harvest Festival.

Well done Derick, from all the tower ringers.

The Coddington Church Bellringers have rang for two weddings in the summer this year.

The practice night is still on a Friday evening but the practice time has been reduced from one and a half hours down to just one hour, due to other commitments of some of the ringers.

A visiting band of ringers have been using All Saints', Coddington at two monthly intervals throughout the year to try on each occasion to achieve appeal, (that's approximately two and a half hours of continuous ringing of one or more methods)

The Southwell Diocese Guild of Bellringers, held there meeting at Coddington in July, with afternoon ringing the church, followed by a meeting and tea in the village hall. The day was completed with an evening of further ringing back in the church.

Their has been three visiting bands coming from different parts of the country to ring at Coddington this year. Another outing arranged by the former Tower Captain of Barnby in the Willows, Mr Tim Carter, now living in Gloustershire, will hopefully be ringing here at Coddington at the end of October.

This year Coddington ringers together with their families and friends had the annual outing to Suffolk, with five churches and their towers visited for ringing. The first tower was at Lakenheath, followed by the tower of West Stow. Lunch was taken at Bury St. Edmunds. The afternoons' ringing was at the tower of Rougham, Rattlesden and Wetherden. The weather was very kind to us again this year, and the outing went off extremely well.

ITS NOT ONLY ATHLETE'S WHO SUFFER FROM ATHLETE'S FOOT

About 190 million people in Europe suffer from athlete's foot, which is approximately 26% of the population. It is more common in men that than in women and becomes more common with age. It is not only athletes who suffer from the skin infection as its name implies. Taking an active part in sports does make you more susceptible as your feet are likely to become hot and damp in training shoes and other forms of sports shoes.

Athlete's foot is a fungal infection, which thrives in a hot damp environment and usually starts between your fifth and fourth toes but will spread to the rest of your foot if not treated. A very unpleasant fungal infection of the nails can occur if the fungus that causes athlete's foot is not treated on a regular basis. Symptoms of athlete's foot are itchiness, a burning or stinging sensation and often redness and swelling. In severe cases the skin may become cracked, flake and bleed and the condition can be quite painful.

The fungal infection is highly contagious and is readily spread on the floors of a swimming pool or sports changing rooms. The body's reaction to the fungal infection is to shed skin from the affected area, but often this is not sufficient to rid the skin of the infection. To reduce the chance of fungal infection, it is important to keep your feet as clean and dry as much as possible.
