

TRAFFIC PROBLEMS IN CODDINGTON

A well attended public meeting at Coddington Village Hall on Wednesday 24th July 1991 was called by Coddington Parish Council. Present County Councillor Mrs Ann Yates & District Councillor Ridge, Mr Hart and Mr Blore from County Planning & Transportation Department, Miss Armstrong from NASDC Housing & Environmental Health Department. Police could not be present due to shortage of staff. Balderton Parish Council was also represented at the meeting.

Five main issues were discussed.

i. Laybys- residents referred to problems created by HGVs parking over night - noise from refigeration motors, litter, use of laybys as lavatories, danger to children and security of houses backing onto laybys. Wish to see laybys removed- no longer appropriate with AI7 bypass - through traffic should not be coming through Coddington - lorries should use laybys on new AI7 or lorry park provided by Council at considrable expense.

County response- expensive to remove laybys- no money, Facility for road users. Sleaford Road is to be improved by resurfacing in Feb March 1992-laybys will be resurfaced.

997

Suggested by residents that money to be used on resurfacing be put to closing laybys plus ongoing costs of maintaining laybys. County reps said they would look at this but considered that cost of resurfacing would be fraction of cost of closing.

 Old Newark Road particularly in front of Post Office is a danger point. Residents referred to speeding and congestion at this locality. Urged that Traffic Calming measures be taken - Speed bumps and road narrowing. Fears for safety of children and OAPs. Police share concern.

No response to this from County Council.

3. Considerable concern at traffic speeding along Harvey Avenue, Suggest "Sleeping Policemen" be provided as part of joint improvement works being undertaken by County and District Councils.

County response was that no money had been allocated for this purpose but that they would look into including such works though not hopeful.

4 Residents referred to problems of HGVs still using the old A17, Balderton Lane and Main Street. Two measures suggested . Weight restrictions and mini roundabout at Plough Crossroads.

County response. Coddington not on list of 100 villages requesting weight restrictions .Only three Orders done a year due to staff shortoges. Therefore no chance at present. Do intend to carry out surveys of traffic in village in Autumn. Thought that mini roundabout was a good idea but no money.

Meeting expressed emezement that Coddington is not on list since the Perish has been asking for weight restrictions for years. Urged that it be placed on list. Also asked that surveys commence no later than 6am to catch lorries and that Parish be consulted on survey points. County also asked to provide Parish with the criteria on which schemes are assessed. County agreed to these requests.

5. Parish very concerned at speeding traffic on Sleaford Road and urge that 40 mph be extended through the village. School crossing point particularly dangerous. Also that road be narrowed as at Rainworth and Balderton to slow down traffic

County said that road did not meet DOT criteria for extension of speed limit. County are proposing to increase the width of the centre reservation at the crossing to give greater protection as part of Sleaford Road improvement.

It was concluded that the imposition of weight restrictions or access only controls on Sleaford Road and Balderton Lane and the provision of speed bumps on Harvey avenue and old Newark Road would resolve the majority of problems. The money to be spent on resurfacing and subsequently maintaining the laybys on Sleaford Road could be used to close the laybys. County urged to take note of the great concerns expressed and to make every effort to meet them.

6. County were able to say that a footpath would be provided in this financial year on the inside of the right angle bend on Main Street near Wellgreen. This is greatly welcomed.

Parish Council Chairman Jo Molloson promised that the Parish Council would press hard for these traffic measures to be carried out urgently. He asked residents of Coddington continue to support the Parish Council in its efforts to make progress.


Dear Reader,,
