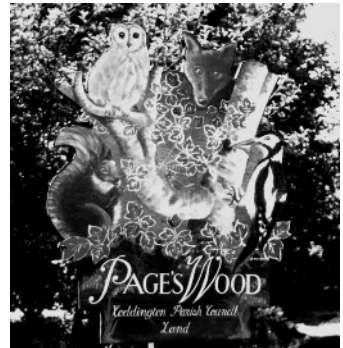
PAGE'S WOOD

Two issues ago it was reported that the Parish Council had taken over Pages Wood. This is a small area of land on the right hand side of Balderton Lane as you leave the village. Graham and June Page moved to Coddington in 1974 and noticed that just in front of their house was a small area of scrub land which had previously been a gravel pit.

Keen conservationists they saw not only the fact that it was valuable habitat for ever decreasing species of Butterflies and Birds but also its potential as an area of natural wild land unspoilt by pesticides. To commemorate the jubilee celebrations and deter people from dumping their rubbish there the Pages decided to have a go at transforming it into the village's own conservation area.

After gaining the approval of the Parish Council they started out on the project and planted more than 30 trees and over 100 shrubs, this resulted in butterflies and rare birds returning to the area.

Sadly both Graham and June Page have died in the last two years and the Parish Council has taken over the land which they have renamed PAGE'S WOOD. A new sign has been made and erected by Mr Barry King of Main St. The wood now stands as a tribute to Graham and June Page for all the hard work they put in over many years.

FIRSTLY, I must thank you for the feedback received following the first edition of my open letter.

This month I have taken on board a suggestion that I separate the content of my letters into Newark and Sherwood and Bassetlaw.

This way you receive news specifically about your area. I welcome your views and ideas so please keep them coming in.

This month I would like to share news about burglary reductions, violent crime and a deception scam.

Burglary reductions

We have recently seen some excellent results on the division.

Following our summer security campaign, shed burglaries dropped by a quarter compared with last year and from April to July there were 21% less house break-ins.

This is thanks to everyone working together to stop crime. Every person who locks their shed, uses an alarm and security lighting is making it more difficult for thieves to commit crime.

Information you have supplied to us about crime is also leading to more and more criminals being arrested.

In July we saw 757 prisoners through our custody system. This was our highest ever number of prisoners within a month.

The division was also acclaimed best in the force for acting on Crimestoppers information.

One in four calls to Crimestoppers from people in Bassetlaw, Newark and Sherwood result in an arrest.

In the first five months of the year we received 80 calls, which directly led to 19 arrests.

These offenders may not have been caught if you had not supplied information to us.

You will not be asked to give your name, make a statement or appear in court so please be assured that you won't be pressured into doing anything more than telling us what you know. The Crimestoppers number is 0800 555 111.

Violent crime

You may have read some recent articles in the local media about a rise in violent crime in Newark and Sherwood.

Yes, we are seeing more violence now than say six years ago but each year we are seeing fewer incidents. Newark and Sherwood is showing excellent performance in arresting offenders and most violence cases result in somebody being charged.

We recently attended a dispute in the Old Post Office Public House in Newark. Many people were charged with assault and public disorder following this and I would like to reassure you that, like many violent incidents, this was an isolated incident between two rival factions.

Most assaults occur between people who know one another and often involve alcohol – it is very rare for somebody to be the victim of a random attack.

The last thing I want is for people to stop enjoying nights out in Newark or visiting the town because they fear for their safety.

You can take simple steps to stay safe such as walking in a group, keeping to well-lit streets and carrying a personal alarm. More information is available on our website www.nottinghamshire.police.uk.

If you are suffering from domestic violence and need advice please call the 24 hour Domestic Violence help line on 0808 800 0340 (run by Women's Aid).

Since the tragic events of 7 July in London, officers have been carrying out extra patrols at Newark train station.

I am mindful that people want to feel safe and protected on public transport and hope the police presence will reassure visitors to Newark.

Deception scam

Four Polish people committing scams in and around Dunham-on-Trent and Southwell were arrested in Newark this month.

They were part of an organised crime team operating all over the country. These people pose as students whose family is dead and sell sketches for £10. This is a scam and the individuals have been charged with deception and remanded into custody.

Please check that all callers at your door are genuine by asking for identification and verifying it with the company they claim to be from.

These people were caught thanks to a call from a member of the public, another example that your information helps to stop crime.

Our third exhibition in June went well with lots of visitors to both the Scout Hall and Village Hall. With having both halls there was much more space and people also enjoyed the church being open for coffee etc in the morning.

Several people kindly searched out old photographs and documents and brought them along for us to copy for the archives with subjects ranging from letters regarding the new road past the Plough, through "Great Grandma" in typical Victorian dress to a postcard showing the Red Lion and children playing in the street outside. John Lukehurst brought his model traction engine and threshing machine, his grandfather used to live at Brownlow's House and had several engines.

We now have 10 sets of display boards which we revamped for the occasion, topics included the changes that came about with the opening of the A1, the Thorpe family of Coddington Hall and Ardbrecknish, oral histories, the old school and the Scout troop.

A PLEA TO ALL DOG OWNERS IN CODDINGTON

There has been a number of complaints about the increase of dog fouling that has not been cleared up by dog owners. In odd cases the mess has been collected and the plastic bag put on the side of the road. **Could all dog owners please respect the law and pick up and place any dog mess in the bins provided.**

There is within all the parishes in Newark and Sherwood District a byelaw dated 23rd October 1986 - made under Section 235 of the Local Government Act 1972. This makes it illegal for any person in charge of a dog to allow the dog to foul a footway or grass verge. It is as simple and clear as that with the only exception being the usual provision for guide dogs accompanying a registered blind person.

Please be a responsible owner.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH
