CHAIRMANS REPORT

A busy 3 months! The most notable event has been the Village's jubilee celebrations on Monday 5 June, when there was tremendous support (thank you all!) for the afternoon's Childrens' Parade and Games, and for the evening's celebrations and Beacon lighting at The Inn on the Green. Grateful thanks go to the team of volunteers who organised the afternoon events and decorations, to Reuben Singh for his generous hospitality at "The Inn", and to Allen Farms for donating the hog to roast. I shall leave the Revd David Anderton to report on All Saints' Summer Fair, but I'm pleased to say that it really did look very popular, despite the weather. The village was again entered into the Notts Best Kept Village Competition this year. Sadly, whilst we made it to the Final for the best 4 in our category, we weren't placed this time.

In recent months, the Parish Council has begun looking towards replacing the longest boundary fence at the allotments with a hawthorn hedge. We are also in negotiation with Notts County Council to improve the alignment of the public footpath across the fields from Drove Lane, for the benefit of both walkers and farmers - more news on both projects in the next CVN issue. The Council is also gearing up to submit a funding application to Notts CC in 2013, under the Local Improvement Scheme, to enhance some aspect of the village's infrastructure or amenities. We really would welcome your ideas, so please read the separate article in this issue.

Finally, and it might seem a little early, but all the organisers plan to build on last year's highly enjoyable evening Christmas Tree Carol Service at the Community Centre, so please keep Wednesday 19 December free for it in your diaries, now.

ON THE BEAT WITH PCSO MIKE MUNRO

Did you know up to 10,000 mobile phones are reported stolen in the UK every month?

Whatever you use your phone for, be it to keep in touch with family and friends, for taking photos and videos, using social media, or for business purposes, you won't want to lose your phone numbers and other data stored inside.

You must take steps to keep it safe - here we tell you how.

Securing your phone

- Never leave your mobile phone on show in your car, even if it's just for a moment. If you have to leave it, make sure it's secure, out of sight and can't be heard.
- Don't draw attention to your phone by leaving it on view on tables in pubs, cafes and restaurants. A tactic used by thieves is to place newspapers or other items over the phone and scoop it up. They sometimes distract phone owners by asking for directions and taking the phone when they are not looking.
- Don't leave your phone unattended in coat pockets or bags.
- Avoid using your mobile phone in the street. If you have to, be discreet.
- Lock the keypad using a PIN number or pattern code when you are not using your phone. This means it can't be used to make calls or access your personal data, such as emails and social media accounts, if it is stolen.
- Mark your phone, battery and accessories with your postcode using an ultraviolet marker pen/smartwater. If your phone is stolen and later recovered by police this will make it easier to reunite you with it.
- Regularly back up your data, contacts and photos in case your phone gets damaged, lost or stolen.
- Record your IMEI number (International Mobile Equipment Identity) somewhere safe. To find out what yours is dial *#06# on your phone or look in the settings on your smartphone.
- If your phone is stolen report it to the police immediately. Tell them your IMEI number, if you have any tracking apps installed or any markings on your phone. Tell your insurer and service provider too.

Smartphones

If you own a smartphone, activate the 'Find My Phone' app or install a free tracking app, such as PREY.

These apps provide a GPS location of the device when it is switched on. You can log in from a computer if your phone goes missing and locate your device.

The apps also allow you to instruct your phone to make a loud noise (to help you find it if it is lost) or to wipe the contents (if you believe it has

fallen into the wrong hands). Activating the app could also help police track your phone if it is stolen.

Register with Immobilise

Register your phone at property database **www.immobilise.com** for free.

Registering your details makes it more likely that you will be reunited with your phone if it is stolen and later recovered by the police.

Remember BE SAFE, BE SECURE.



Revd David Anderton, the Team Vicar writes...

As I write we have just come through Super Saturday and Super Sunday at the London Olympics with Team GB winning Gold through the efforts of Jessica Ennis, Mo Farah, Andy Murray, Ben Ainslie and others. There is an air of celebration around Britain, a sense of unity and togetherness. There is even talk that strangers on the London Underground are smiling and speaking to one another – whatever next! Despite the rain, the sun is shining. And yet today is also the anniversary of the start of the riots last summer in London and other of our major, and not so major, cities and towns. People certainly were not so forthcoming with strangers in their midst then. There was a very different feeling around the country.

It is heartening to see the inspiration that people are gaining from the achievements of our sports women and men. And it is important to remember that the success they have achieved has come from hours of hard work and determination and yes it has come out of the failures they will have endured. The times they have been well beaten by more able competitors, or when they have got their tactics wrong.

But they have not given up. Inspiration gets its energy not only from the beauty of success but also from the pain of struggle and failure. I have been moved with the honesty and grace of those athletes who have not won. On his own experiences in design, James Dyson recently commented, 'The keen sting of failure should not be shunned. It can spur on greatness'.

And the Christian gospel too recognises that that which is worthwhile comes often from a place of pain. To many it seemed that Jesus failed in his task on earth. They wanted him to become the leader of a great nation. Instead he suffered the indignity and the pain of crucifixion. And yet out of what seemed failure he brought with the greatest prize all. Through his death he paved the way for all who follow him to receive life in all its fullness. But to follow him is not the easy path. It will bring with it its own struggle and pain, its own feelings of helplessness and loss. But for those who succeed the prize is far greater than Gold medals.



THE EMERGENCY PLAN

Nottinghamshire County Council has requested that Parish Councils should compile a Community Emergency Plan.

This plan helps the community prepare for an emergency and minimize any impact. Sometimes the initial response may have to rely on local people.

The CEP(Community Emergency Plan) is confidential and stored in a secure location. It covers resources and skills in the community, temporary places of safety and supporting organisations contact details.

However, help is needed to ensure that the community is kept informed during and after an event. It is suggested that a cascade system is used with named people taking responsibility for notifying others, who in turn notify further members of the community.

Five initial volunteers are needed, who would then contact five other people.

VILLAGE IMPROVEMENTS – GIVES US YOUR IDEAS

The Parish Council is starting to prepare the ground work for an application, in 2013, under Notts County Council's Local Improvement Scheme. The Scheme is an annual programme of improvements intended to enhance the quality of local life and add value to the existing environment. It enables local communities to undertake a wide range of projects – it is up to us to produce a worthwhile scheme which enjoys wide local support. The County Council do not anticipate that any proposal would exceed £50,000, with many considerably less than that.

The key to a successful application is thorough preparation, over time, so the Parish Council will hold an open initial meeting in the Community Centre at 7.45pm on **Tuesday 2 October 2012.** Please come along and give us your thoughts. Coupled with the Sports Leaders course some of them have been doing at school, some of the Scouts have achieved an Instructor Badge.

The Scouts enjoyed a Mountain Biking experience covering 14 miles across varying terrains, a team building games night, a BBQ, a bowling night and a DIY evening where they learnt some plumbing skills and how to wire an electrical plug.

CODDINGTON HISTORY GROUP

Coddington Windmills

There is no record of a mill being situated at Coddington before the middle of the 16th century and so it was a surprise when it was discovered that a mill had been installed as late as 1579.

The question was, if there had been no need for a mill before this time, how did the milling get done before 1579 and why there was a need for change.

According to Cornelius Brown in his book entitled 'The History of Newark', in 1576 there were 'formerly 9 mills at Newark and now 7' all of them in a 'ruinous state and great decay' All the mills were in the tenure of William, Earl of Rutland.

The Sutton family of Kelham diverted the water from Newark to go through Kelham and were forced to build and maintain forever a weir at Farndon

Not only were the mills in poor condition, the 7 flud gates were also in decay. Since the milling for an area of 12 miles around Newark was done in Newark, there was a grave concern by the people and an Inquisition formed with a jury. The Queen granted timber from Sherwood Forest and large sums of money were spent renewing the castle and the mills. Bridges and the causeway were also repaired by 1597.

During this period a number of windmills were built. Mills were built at:

Beacon Hill, Balderton, Barnby, Coddington, Girton, North Scarle & South Scarle

Due to the parlous state of the Newark mills and the time to repair them plus the possibility of drought, all these mills to the east of Newark were constructed plus others in villages to the west of Newark.

Anthony Burke of Balderton, ropemaker of 60yrs agreed that the six water mills of Newark were sufficient to grind the "griste" for people of Newark but not in the time of drought. "The towns of Balderton, Barnbey, Coddington, Girton, North and South Scarle have commonlie used to grind their corn at ye mills.

About 40 past years or more there was a wind mill built by Mr Anthonye fforster which is still standing and continewed within fields of Newark called the Beacon Mill.

About 20 years past there was another mill builded within the fields of Coddington by Thomas Leonard, alias Pocklington, continued to this day." This letter continues to support the Queens' mills. Dated around 1600

This information comes from 'History of Newark' by Cornelius Brown. The alias 'Pocklington' could be due to inheritance laws of the period. The Pocklington's at that time were very wealthy and due to the law, their surname had to be incorporated to allow transfer of property etc. 1579 The Post Mill: -

The type of mill being built around this period was the Post mill probably of the type that still exists at Bourn in Cambridgeshire and has been preserved by Cambridgeshire Preservation Trust. This mill has proved to be pre 1636 & therefore probably very similar to the original post mill at Coddington as the same design was used over a wide area.



Post mills are so called because a central post supported the whole structure and the whole mill revolved around it.

The central post is held upright by the cross members & the angled braces. The whole mill was mounted on stone or brick plinths to try to prevent rot of the base timbers. Note that the sails could be reached at ground level. The mill was manually turned into wind by the long timber running at an angle from the back. Some mills attached the entry stairs directly onto this wood, but here the stair swings upward and is hooked onto a yoke on the timber. The timber used was mainly oak. Bourn Mill is open to tourists & is situated between the A14 & A1 in the Huntingdon St Neots area.

Our mill of this type is known to have survived into the late 18th century as there are records of a Post mill [on Balderton Lane] & a Smock mill [junction of C208 & A1slip road] in 1818. The Post mill at this time was jointly owned by Mr Valentine Farmorice 'miller and proprietor' & a Mr William Beedham of Newark 'victualler and mortgagee'



Smock mills

Our smock mill existed around 1800 on a different site, now occupied by Greenways, and operated along with the post mill. We have seen a Fire Insurance Document dated 1789 which insures a wooden mill for a period of 1 year. The fee was 10 shillings paid for £200 covering mill and utensils plus stock but we don't know which mill it

referred to. Mills were susceptible to both fire and explosion.

Smock Mills were built with 4 to 8 flat sides depending on the number of timbers used to form the skeleton of the mill.

The sides were then covered in weatherboarding. The strength of the mill was in the framework. This type & the post mills were capable of being dismantled & moved to a different site. Later mills were bricked up part way to protect the main support timbers from the weather & to provide valuable storage space. The sails can still be reached from the ground.

The mill size increased dramatically from the post mill days. Technology improved and the mills took advantage of it. The wind is now utilised to turn the mill into wind by having a Fan Tail [small wind mill set at right angles to the main mill]. If the mill was not fully into the wind the Fan Tail would catch the wind and, through gearing would turn the mill until the Fan Tail was no longer caught by the wind.

The increase in sail size means that more pairs of grinding stones can operate. The stones were either imported from the continent or made of gritstone from Derbyshire.

Note that with increased height, a balcony was added. This is to gain access to the sails, not because it increases the retail value of the property or to avoid paying for a patio.



Tower Mill

This is Tuxford mill, it is fully functional and open to the public.

The mill in Coddington was built in 1835/6 looked very similar to this not so long ago. Owned by William Lee who in 1838 was rated for a tower mill at £16:0s:0d.

Steam power was added as an alternative power source for 'no wind' conditions in 1862. William Lee was again rated for the mill, engine & land in 1849 at a cost of £28:11:6p. [Coddington Valuation Lists of 1849]

The Tower mill was described in 'Windmills of Derbyshire, Leicestershire & Nottinghamshire' by PHJ Baker & Rex Wailes read at the Science Museum 7th March 1962. Its description is as follows: -

Tower & Cap

The tower is described as being flared at the base in a most attractive manner, the cap as being ogee in shape and painted black - most windmills have a white painted cap.

Curbs It was noted that Coddington and Tuxford mills were the only two with live curbs, the remainder were shot or dead curbs.

Sails

It had two single and two double patent anti-clockwise sails. The bull-nose front striking gear that had a plate instead of a spider.

Windshafts

The windshaft has an iron neck-breaking with no brass and a 9 inch diameter neck.

Brake wheels, brakes and wallowers

Details of the gearing of three mills are given as follows:

Mill Pitch Brake wheel No. of cogs Great Spur wheel of cogs in wallower

Bolsover 3 in 120 wood 48 iron 66 wood

Heage 4.75in 60 wood 45 iron 70 wood

Coddington 4 in 80 wood 32 wood 64 wood

Most mills had iron wallowers but Coddington had a solid wood built up in four parts.

Great Spur Wheel and Stone Nuts

The survey showed equal numbers of wood clasp arm wheels and iron wheels but Coddington and Arnesby were the only two in which mortise wheels were recorded. The cap of the top bearing of the quant was removed; one quant was of wrought iron and 3in by 1in section. Stones and Governors

The many-height was called a "Nick Bates"

Sack hoists and Dressing Machines

A large boulter was driven from a down-turned bevel ring on the underside of the great spur wheel and there was a subsidiary belt to a crank-driven shaker at the upper end of the boulter to ensure a regular feed.

Auxiliary Power: - A 15hp Crossley gas engine was used. Miscellaneous Details: -The mill was built in 1859 [was actually built earlier] on the site of a post mill and is said to have given 40hp under good conditions; she went out of use after damage by a blast from a land mine during the last war. [no records of such a blast have come to light].

On the boulter was inscribed the following:

"Brush me well and keep me clean

the work I'll do will soon be seen But I am like ladies fair I love to dress I do declare"



1579

Discussion: - Mr Sanders said that some windmill sails appear to be dished - Coddington is a good example of this. These mills were the last major development of the mill structure and were permanent mills committed to serving the needs of a specific area.

The buildings around the mill have either gone or have been modernised. In 1916 the mill was powered by either wind or

steam. Sails were still there in 1936.

Thomas Leonard

The mill with only three sails left. This looks very sad but milling continued as diesel engines took over from steam in around 1941. The last milling was done in 1944 and the sails eventually fell off in 1958. List of known millers [so far]


