CODDINGTON PARISH COUNCIL - CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Firstly, I would like to thank the Village Events Group for all their hard work to organise the Coronation 60th Anniversary Celebration, held at the Village Hall on Saturday 1 June. You can read the full report further on in this magazine.

As I write, work has started on the resurfacing of Main Street, Brownlow's Hill and Balderton Lane. The project also includes resurfacing and improvements to large lengths of the pavements. At the end of the work we should see the interactive road signs installed east of the Plough and at the top of Balderton Lane. The third such sign, on the C208 west of the Community Centre, will take longer. This installation is linked with a bid to reduce the speed limit along the C208, from the Community Centre to the Al Bridge, to 50 mph.

Following the Local Improvements Scheme meeting on 24 September we intend to hold a series of inspections across the village to identify points of concern. We need volunteers to help, and to give their thoughts. Please read our notice in this edition regarding our planned September survey and its aims. Come and join us!

We have been asked about broadband speeds in the village. Faster fibre optic cable is now linked to the BT cabinet near to the Post Office, and serves at least the western part of the village. BT, and probably other providers, can therefore offer an improved service – for an increased rental. Check with your provider to sign up. We know that BT will not connect the Drove Lane, Beckingham Road, The Green and Morgan's Close area's local cabinet to fibre optic cable (not enough users). This area will rely on the Notts County Council's project for faster broadband. Wooden Jigsaw Afternoon, Saturday 16th November, 1-4pm

Wooden jigsaws feel very different to cardboard puzzles and the piece shapes are more interesting and varied, so if you like puzzles and you've never tried wooden ones this is an opportunity not to be missed.

Come along to the Community Centre for an afternoon of fun doing wooden jigsaw puzzles. There will be about twenty five jigsaws for you to choose from, including both vintage (1920s to 1960s) and new wooden puzzles, in many styles. The puzzles are suitable for adults and teenagers, but not for younger children, and have been chosen so that you should be able to complete them in three hours or less.

Entry is Adults £5 and teenagers £3 (including tea and coffee). Profits will go to support the Community Centre.

Jigsaw puzzles were first made as 'dissected maps' in the middle of the 18thC, to help teach royal and aristocratic children about political boundaries and geography. One of the puzzles available will be a 500 piece jigsaw map of Coddington Village, from the 1918 Thorpe Estate Sale Catalogue.

There will also be several Wentworth jigsaws (with their fancy shapes or whimsies) the classic vintage hand-cut brands of Victory, Chad Valley and Ponda, some puzzles cut by amateurs and a puzzle by Artifact (extraordinary shapes demonstrating 4-colour map theory).



I hope you have been enjoying the best summer weather we have experienced for some years. It is wonderful to see the sun out for more than just a few hours, and it's presence seems to lift the spirits of most people. Of course with the highest temperatures we've had for some time we will complain a bit about the heat, and for some the heat can be a real and dangerous problem.

The heat reminds me of the story of the friends of Daniel - Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego who refused to deny their Lord God bow down to the idol god of King Nebuchadnezzar of Babylon. He ordered that they be thrown into a fiery furnace as punishment, but as he looked into the furnace, Nebuchadnezzar could see four figures walking around. The king deduced that their God had sent an angel to save them and they came out of the furnace unharmed.

I wonder what you think about that story of rescue. The Lord God that Daniel and his friends worshipped is the God who sent Jesus into the world to rescue it. He came to be with ordinary people, to show them the way to God's Kingdom, not a distant place, but a place that is here and now and that will come to completion at Christ's return. If you would like to explore more about that God then we are running a Alpha Course this autumn (see below for details). Oh and if you have children at Coddington School, see if they can remember the names of Daniel's three friends – we spoke about them in assembly.

Church Roof Project

Our roof project continues. In July investigation works were carried out to determine the extent of works required, and our Architect is now drawing up the schedule of works and completing the tender documents. A bat survey has been carried out and there seems we may have a larger number of bats using the church roof to roost than first thought, this may mean that the repair works will have to start later in 2014 that first thought.

Lynne had worked in intensive care and in the organ donation section of the NHS. Marilyn Membery talked about her grandchild's brain tumour and of the dedication and care she had received especially from Professor David Walker. Professor Walker had said that the only way to cure children's brain tumours is through research, and Marilyn had written several cookery books to sell to raise funds for this cause.

In July we were pleased to welcome back Mr John Whitfield to talk on 'New Light on Edward and Mrs Simpson'. It was a very interesting talk and John Whitfield held us spellbound as he told us about Wallace's life before she met the Prince of Wales. He included the early life of the Prince of Wales, the abdication and concluded with information about their life after the abdication. It seems amazing that after all this time there is still interest in the affair and books are still being written on the subject.

Our annual subscription entitles us to join in events organised by Nottinghamshire County WI so we have recently entered a team for the kurling competition. COMMUNITY FIRST RESPONDERS SCHEME VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

The Parish Council is preparing the ground work for a possible Community First Responders Scheme in Coddington. The project will require funding for equipment and this aspect is being explored at present. The scheme will only be viable, however, if there are sufficient trained responders to man it. The Council is therefore seeking volunteers to form a Community First Responders group. First Responders are volunteer members of the community who are trained to respond to emergency calls through the 999 system in conjunction with the Ambulance Service. Responders provide immediate care to patients in their local areas where distance may delay the prompt arrival of an ambulance. They are trained to deliver Basic Life Support and defibrillation to patients in Cardiac Arrest, and appropriate assistance, including oxygen administration, to patients suffering from a range of conditions.

Volunteers will be fully trained by the East Midlands Ambulance Service and the group will be equipped with a defibrillator, oxygen masks and other equipment. We are seeking those aged 18 and over, who are in reasonably good health, want to learn life-saving skills and have a full, clean driving licence. Anyone able to give up some free time can volunteer.

On the lovely sunny afternoon of June 1st, Coddington Events Group held a celebration to mark the 60th anniversary of the coronation of Queen Elizabeth II, in the Coronation Hall. The hall was decorated with bunting and pictures from the coronation. The village saluted their own queen and consort during the afternoon, which had a 1950s theme. However, help is needed to ensure that the community is kept informed during and after an event. It is suggested that a cascade system is used with named people taking responsibility for notifying others, who in turn notify further members of the community.

Five initial volunteers are needed, who would then contact five other people.

Improvements and Maintenance:

Plans are continuing for improvements at the village hall, the first phase will be work to insulate and upgrade the main hall - hopefully a new roof, double glazing, wall insulation and new environmentally friendly lighting to replace the somewhat elderly fluorescents– all dependent on a grant.

However, we do need **your support** to get our grant from WREN – they place great store on evidence of local support for schemes. We have already collected a lot of signatures backing up our bid but would greatly appreciate your signature or better still a letter of support to give weight to our application. We have already had a grant from Staythorpe Power Station to insulate the roof void over the small meeting room with British sheep's wool insulation which is very efficient and long lasting as well as supporting our farmers. This is due to be completed soon now the hall is less busy in the holidays.

We continue to have a maintenance morning each month (usually the first Monday) on which we attend to minor repairs, painting etc. – extra help is always appreciated, see contacts below for further information.

Donation of crockery:

We had noticed that the hall seemed to have rather less saucers than cups and were pondering on the best solution for this predicament when we spotted a notice on the Community board at ASDA saying "Cups and Saucers available for a community group". Enquiries were made and the result is over 60 cups and saucers added to our stocks - you will be able to spot the new ones since they say "Costa" on the side of them! Also included in the donation were a number of the Costa glass mugs that they use for hot chocolate.

Grateful thanks - and another request

Here we would like to thank Irene Bell for her years of help at the hall in lots of ways from being a Trustee and helping out with fundraising events, as our Village Venture Promoter, supporting the Film Group and latterly as one of our trusty volunteer cleaners. She has now decided to retire from cleaning duties so we are seeking a replacement volunteer cleaner. The cleaning is done every week on a rota basis (by four sets of people) so it requires a commitment of only $1 - 1\frac{1}{2}$ hrs once a month at a time to suit yourself. It is not arduous and can be done by one or two people together, the reward being all the compliments about how clean the hall is!

Village Ventures. For the winter season we have an unprecedented four Village Ventures for your entertainment. See the articles elsewhere in the newsletter for the first two (Trio Manouche and Great Expectations). How It Works?

* Local observers note details of vehicles that may be misusing the route

* Details are then handed to the parish co-ordinator for administration or can be sent direct through to Trading Standards online using Nottinghamshire County Council website which has a dedicated Lorry Watch section. http://www.nottinghamshire.gov.uk/home/businesseconomy/tradingstandards/lorrywatch.htm

* Trading Standards enforce the weight restriction on behalf of Highways.

* Trading Standards will then use the information as intelligence and coordinate our future Enforcement action accordingly. Exemptions

Some vehicles are permitted to use weight-restricted routes and these may include:

- * Vehicles loading or unloading within the restricted area
- * Emergency vehicles
- * Vehicles in the service of the local authority in pursuance of its statutory powers or duties in connection with premises along the restricted route
- Building and industrial demolition operations
 Public utility services along the route

CODDINGTON HISTORY GROUP

The Tallents Family of Coddington House

Godfrey Tallents (1848 – 1917) was the second son of Godfrey & Ellen Tallents, Godfrey was born 7th June 1848 in Newark. He was senior partner in Tallents & Co. Solicitors. Godfrey was solicitor to James Thorpe of Coddington Hall and when James Thorpe's mother Ann (who lived in Coddington House) died on the 22nd June 1877, Godfrey Tallents rented the property and shortly afterwards moved into the house. Godfrey had a distinguished military career and had the rank of Major of the 4th Battalion Sherwood Foresters. On the 7th June 1882 Godfrey married Eliza Caroline Pardoe Matthews and there was a major celebration in the village on the 28th July 1882 when the newly weds came to live in Coddington House. Coddington House and gardens were purchased from the executors of John Somerled Thorpe in 1918. The last member of the family to live in Coddington House was Eliza who died on the 20th August 1954 the house was then sold to John & Joyce Mumby.

Godfrey & Eliza had three children: -

Godfrey Edward born 31st July 1883, like his father he was a military man; he saw service with the Lancashire Fusiliers in the 1914 – 18 war. In 1916 Capt. Godfrey Edward was awarded the D.S.O. for gallantry during in the Gallipoli landing, where he was dangerously wounded. On the18th April 1923 he married Marjorie Peel Nuttall and they had two children. He retired from the army in 1951 with the rank of Colonel and came back to live in Coddington House before moving to the Old Vicarage on the junction of Main Street and Sleaford Road where he lived until his death on 22nd July 1967, aged 83. He was President of Coddington Cricket club for many years and an ardent supporter.

Dorothy Marion their third child was born on the 1st September 1888; on the 12th July 1909 she married **Harold Thorpe** at Coddington church. Dorothy and Harold had three daughters all born in Coddington:

- Margaret (Betty) Anne baptised Newark P.C. on 20-4-1911
- Joan born circa 1913
- Bridget Mary (Biddy) born 6th November 1915, she married Captain Michael Nicholson.

Biddy died on the 28th April 2007 and is buried in Coddington churchyard.

In World War 1 Harold saw service in Gallipoli, Palestine and Salonika. In 1914 he was in command of A-Squadron of the Sherwood Rangers Yeomanry. His second-in-command, brother-in-law Hugh Tallents, took over the squadron at Gallipoli when Harold was promoted. By November 1915 Harold had become temporary Lieut. Colonel and was Commanding Officer of the Sherwood Rangers Yeomanry.

In January 1917 Harold won the D.S.O. and in November was mentioned in despatches. He was then 'of Coddington Hall, and a member of the firm of J Thorpe & Sons, Maltsters'.

At the 1918 sale of his brother's estate (John Somerled):

Harold bought lots 26 and 27 (for £420, 12a of arable land where S Parkes was the tenant), which he transferred to his brother Gervase. Harold's seal and signature is on many of the conveyances of village properties sold in the 1918 Estate Sale, along with that of his brothers and sisters.

In 1923 Colonel Harold, J.P and Dorothy lived at Coddington Moor Estate, where they farmed.

For many Years, Harold was a Churchwarden at All Saints, Coddington P.C.

Harold was made a Magistrate in the early 1900's and on 12-4-1937 he was elected Chairman of the Newark [County] Quarter Sessions, and in 1940 he was Chairman of the Board of Magistrates. At an unknown time, he disposed of the family malting business and subsequently became a Director of Tully & Sons.

In the 1950 Lt. Colonel Harold D.S.O. T.D. J.P. had moved from Coddington Moor to The Old Vicarage, and his telephone number was 28. (Later his brother-in-law Godfrey Edward Tallents also moved to The Old Vicarage.) Dorothy died in July 1965 in Wales but is buried in the "Thorpe" tomb in Coddington churchyard.

The second son **Hugh** was born on the 2nd July 1885; he was

educated at Preparatory School, Eton & New College Oxford, he joined the family firm of solicitors. Having graduated at Hythe, he served in the Sherwood Rangers Yeomanry and in August 1914 he was promoted to Captain. In the 1814 – 18 war he saw service in Egypt, Gallipoli, Macedonia & Palestine. In August 1914 he was second in command of a Squadron, and in Gallipoli was placed in command of it on the promotion of Colonel Harold Thorpe (who later married his sister Dorothy).

D.S.O. for Major Hugh Tallents

"Major Hugh Tallents, who has been awarded the D.S.O.; is the second son of Mrs Tallents and the late Mr Godfrey Tallents, of Coddington. For many years past he has held a commission in the Sherwood Rangers Yeomanry. He came up with the regiment on embodiment in August 1914, and took part in Dardenelles campaign, the evacuation and the subsequent operations on Eastern battlefields. Although his many friends in Newark will regret the cause of his present stay in the town (the death of his respected father), they will be pleased to be able to personally congratulate him on his well merited honour. It will be remembered that Major Tallents, at a recent function in the Town Hall, made a very favourable impression when he addressed a few words to the company at the invitation of the Mayor. Major Talent's elder brother (Major G. Tallents, Lancashire Fusiliers) and his brother in law (Liet-Colonel H. Thorpe) had previously been awarded the D.S.O.". Copy of an article in the Newark advertiser 13th February 1918 In February 1918 he was released from the army and elected Town Clerk of Newark on the death of his uncle William Edward Tallents on the 11 February 1918. Capt. Hugh Tallents M.A. B.C.L. D.S.O. Solicitor & Commissioner for Oaths, Town Clerk, Clerk for the Borough of Newark, Registrar of the Borough Court of record, Clerk to the Commissioners of Taxes, of the Magnus Charity, The Newark Navigation Commissioners & the Commissioners for Sewers. Steward of the Manors of Crowle. Edwinstowe & Ilkeston. The London Gazette of 4th Jan. 1924 includes the award of the T.D. to Major Hugh Tallents D.S.O. of the Sherwood Rangers Yeomanry.

In October 1928 he was promoted to Lt. Colonel. In April 1939 for World War 11 he was Food Executive Officer, Fuel Controller for Newark & District.

On the 4th February 1946 at Farndon Parish Church he married Nancy Elizabeth Beevor and they had a son John Richard who lives in Farndon in the family house.

On the 1st January 1970, at the age of 84 Hugh retired from Tallents & Co. and in the following May also resigned as Clerk to the Newark Navigation Commissioners, a post he held for 52 years. The Tallents had been Clerk to the Commissioners for 156 years: - William Edward Tallents 1814 – 1835, Godfrey Tallents 1835 – 1877, William Edward Tallents 1877 – 1918 & Hugh Tallents 1918 – 1970.

Town Clerk duties: - One of the duties of the Town Clerk is to proclaim the new monarch

to the people of Newark. The Proclamation Stool is in Newark Town Hall museum it has Brass engravings; the Town Clerk proclaimed the new King/Queen at the Town Hall, Beaumont Cross and the top of "Beast Hill" outside the Ossington. The proclamations by the Tallents family were: -

William Edward Tallents: - George 1V, 11 February 1820 & William

V1 on the 9th July 1830

Godfrey Tallents: - Edward VII on the 26th January 1901, & George V. 10th May 1911

Hugh Tallents: - Edward VIII on the 23 January 1936, & George VI, 14th February 1936.

Hugh Tallents also escorted King George V and Queen Mary on the Royal visit to Newark on the 9th July 1928.

Hugh's recreations were: -

Hunting: - Since a very young boy he was a keen horse rider and from 1919 for nearly 35 years he was Hon. Secretary to the Blankney Hunt.

Shooting: - From a very young age he had a gun and even at the age of 88 he was shooting at Ossington Estate.

Fishing:

Cycling: - As a child he had several bicycles and rather than using a motor cycle or car he would cycle to work in Newark originally from Coddington then Farndon.

Motor Vehicles: - In about 1900 he had his first motorcycle and by the time all vehicles had to have a licence on the 1st January 1904 he was on to his third motorcycle registration AL 32 (the 32nd vehicle licensed in Notts.). He was a very avid motorist and his first car was a ???? Eventually he purchased a Bentley; which he kept for many years.

On the 3rd August 1978 he died at home Farndon Lodge aged 93, having been a solicitor for 60 years. Hugh was buried in the family grave at Coddington.



Coddington Men who served in World War 1

World War I (WWI) was a global war centred in Europe that began on 28 July 1914 and lasted until 11 November 1918. It involved all the world's great powers, which were assembled in two opposing alliances: the Allies of the United Kingdom, their colonies, France and the Russian Empire; the Central Powers of Germany, their colonies and Austria-Hungary. Italy (initially backed Germany changed sides and then supported the allies), Japan and the United States joined the Allies, and the Ottoman Empire and Bulgaria the Central Powers. Ultimately, more than 70 million military personnel, including 60 million Europeans, were mobilised in one of the largest wars in history. More than 9 million combatants were killed, largely because of technological advancements that led to enormous increases in the lethality of weapons without corresponding improvements in protection or mobility, causing both sides to resort to large-scale human wave attacks, which proved extremely costly in terms of casualties. It was the fifth-deadliest conflict in world history, subsequently paving the way for various political changes, such as revolutions in many of the nations involved. In the

UK in August 1914; 300,000 men volunteered to fight; conscription was not introduced until January 1916. Lord Kitchener was in charge of recruitment. The men at the front had to struggle with supply problems; the shortage of food and disease was rife in the damp, rat-infested conditions. Along with enemy action, many troops had to contend with new diseases: trench foot, trench fever and trench nephritis became common place. When the war ended in 1918, British Army casualties, as the result of enemy action and disease, were recorded as 673,375 dead and missing, with another 1,643,469 wounded. The rush to demobilise at the end of the war substantially decreased the strength of the army, from its peak of 4,000,000 men in 1918 to 370,000 men by 1920. Source Wikipedia.

From the attached "Roll of Honour" we can see that 72 men from Coddington were involved in this war and it would seem fitting that these men be remembered.

This year we have modified our approach to maintenance, aiming to reduce costs to both improve our financial position and reduce the grant given towards maintenance by our landlord, the Parish Council.

Nevertheless, we still expect to continue to eat into our small, remaining reserves unless our income rises. The Trustees have reviewed usage, operating costs and charging structures and have agreed revised hourly rates from September 2013.

Regular community users' hourly rates (unchanged since September 2010) will rise but continue to be significantly lower than those of occasional and other users:

- Function Room $\pounds 7$ (was $\pounds 6$)

- Whole Building $\pounds 16$ (was $\pounds 12$)

Similar price rises have been agreed for occasional users of the Centre and for commercial organisations.

To help improve the finances, the Trustees are organising several fund raising events, which this winter will include a jigsaw event, and in the spring a jazz evening with wine and cheese and a Village Ventures drama event. We hope that everyone will enjoy and support these events – along with those run by other village amenities, like the Village Hall, the Scout Hall and the Church. Some of our regular users require large amounts of equipment and our on-site storage is limited. We are working closely with Newark & Sherwood District Council to see if we can provide more, at an acceptable cost. We have also checked that all spaces used for storage are being used as agreed, and have asked that any equipment being stored unauthorised is removed from the site. This is necessary for the safe, efficient and fair running of the centre.

The Trustees are grateful for the invaluable work of Angela Hardwick and Anne Powell in managing bookings and invoicing, and to Ian Lawson who assists our users and manages day to day operations and maintenance with flexibility and grace.

Trustee meetings are held every two months, with our Annual General Meeting planned for Tuesday 1st October at 19:45 at Coddington Community Centre, during which Trustees are elected for the coming year.
