The Revd David writes....

CHRISTMAS AGAIN

I've had several conversations with people recently about how quickly this year seems to have passed for them. They can't believe that Christmas is just around the corner again. As we approach Christmas it is interesting to look back on the news this year. It seems to me three issues high on the list have been those of immigration and asylum seekers, (most recently with the news the Italian Navy is to stop its proactive rescuing of those attempting to cross the Mediterranean), radicalisation of some in the Islamic world (who of us had heard of ISIS a year ago?), and the abuse of children and the lack of response by institutions and society (and yes, the church too needs to repent of mistakes from the past).

If we look back 2000 years to the original Christmas it seems that things were ever thus. Jesus was born into what was known as Palestine, the land of the Jews, but a land that was under occupation - leading to the radicalisation of many Jews who sought to violently over throw the ruling Roman authorities. One of Jesus' own disciples, Simon the Zealot was one of these. And when he was born, Mary and Joseph had to flee with their baby as refugees, asylum seekers into Egypt. And the reason they had to do that? - Herod had decreed that all boys under the age of two should be slaughtered - child abuse at its extreme.

As we approach Christmas we can either roll out the saccharin sweet story of gentle Jesus. Or we can remember that Jesus came into the real world, the world full of pain and hatred. But that he came as its hope, its Salvation. He came to bring and to demonstrate God's love. That is something to celebrate. Joy to the world! But it is also a time to think about what follows on from that. Jesus calls us all to be peacemakers. To follow him and learn what it means to sacrifice our own selfish desires in order that his Kingdom may come. After the celebration the hard work begins.

COMMUNITY FIRST RESPONDERS SCHEME VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

The Parish Council is preparing the ground work for a possible Community First Responders Scheme in Coddington. The project will require funding for equipment and this aspect is being explored at present. The scheme will only be viable, however, if there are sufficient trained responders to man it. The Council is therefore seeking volunteers to form a Community First Responders group. First Responders are volunteer members of the community who are trained to respond to emergency calls through the 999 system in conjunction with the Ambulance Service. Responders provide immediate care to patients in their local areas where distance may delay the prompt arrival of an ambulance. They are trained to deliver Basic Life Support and defibrillation to patients in Cardiac Arrest, and appropriate assistance, including oxygen administration, to patients suffering from a range of conditions.

Volunteers will be fully trained by the East Midlands Ambulance Service and the group will be equipped with a defibrillator, oxygen masks and other equipment. We are seeking those aged 18 and over, who are in reasonably good health, want to learn life-saving skills and have a full, clean driving licence. Anyone able to give up some free time can volunteer.

Hunting, Shooting & Fishing in Coddington

Hunting: - Colonel Hugh Tallents was a keen horse rider since a very young boy and hunted regularly. From 1919 for nearly 35 years he was Hon. Secretary to the Blankney Hunt.

Christine Usher (nee Handbury) remembers the hunting on Rosevale Farm in the 1930's; as far as she was aware no person in the village had a riding horse other than Mr Rhodes from Balderton.

Alan Geeson says: - "He cannot remember any hunting in the village, Coddington was in the Blankney Country but it was war time and we were miles away from the kennels and I suppose with petrol rationing etc it was not practical until well after the war. However my father as a hunt supporter and farmer was always sent tickets to the annual point to point race meetings.

Note from Blankney Hunt: -Coddington is in the Blankney country - the boundary with the Belvoir follows the A17 (more or less) and that with the Grove & Rufford the Trent - but I don't recall hounds meeting there in recent years. The Blankney did meet at Barnby in the Willows until recently and met once at Balderton 7 or 8 years ago.

Fred Reed remembers the Hunt meeting at Fred Hollingworth's, Manor Dairy farm in 1979, his daughter Elizabeth attended riding "Tontin".

Shooting

Alan Geeson remembers: - "Hall farm, Manor Dairy farm and I think, Langford Moor farm were shot over by a syndicate of local business and professional men. I think Mr Fred Hollingworth was involved but I do not recall any other Coddington people as shooters although some including Reg Simpson may have acted as beaters. There were 2 keepers who also covered a large area including Stapleford Wood. The head keeper I remember was called Bredon and he lived in a house at the far end of Stapleford Woods where he did some rearing of pheasants. One under keeper was called Adams and he was single and lodged with Mrs Gibson, mother of Gordon Gibson. He was youngish and I suspect he might have been called up as it was in wartime. Another was Walter Greatbach, an elderly man but I cannot remember any more.

They had shoots on Saturdays alternating between our area and Stapleford.

The syndicate must have owned the shooting rights for game only.

For rabbits, pigeons etc I think the farmers held the rights and the rabbitting on Hall farm was let to Reg Simpson. In the war the rabbit was a public enemy and a good supplement to the meat ration".

Christine Usher says: - "On the Daybell/Handbury farmers in the 1930's, 40's and 50's the only member of the families who shot was her father Harold Handbury. One of Harold's saying was if you had a gun you could always eat meat (pheasants, rabbits, pigeon's). In the depression of the 1920's/30's when farming was very bad most farmers supplemented their income by snaring rabbits and selling them in Newark".

Fishing

Alan Geeson says: - "In my youth the fishpond was in the hands of a Dr Kinmont from Newark, I think that Dr Goldsmith was also involved, the Doctors rented the fishing.

A little aside, many older Coddingtonians will remember the Beet family, their son Stanley was a very large and substantial policeman and was fond of ice skating. One winter, 1947 I think, he appeared and was skating in full uniform when he got too near the spring and went straight through the ice, fortunately no damage was done.

Some locals went to fish for coarse fish in the Witham at Barnby or Beckingham including Tom Walster and John Ingram, he ate the fish he caught".

Christine Usher said: - "Her father Harold was a "Fenman" and the majority of people who lived on the fens learnt to skate on the dykes. Harold taught Christine to skate on wooden skates on Coddington "Moat" in those days it flooded on 3 sides. Christine often skated on Coddington fish pond along with: - Harold Handbury, Tony Hallam & Pat Hough". Fred Tomlinson said the skaters also included: - "The Campions", Harold Tarlin, John Walster & Roy Simpson.

Fred also says that there was a trout hatchery near the Moat (receiving water from the Moat & an outflow into the dyke. The trout produced were then transferred into the fishpond".

Spencer Mumby purchased the fish pond in 1925 when he purchased a piece of land in Newark Road, he then built his house on it. (the house was not named until Dickie Lowe purchased all the property in 1955. Dr Kinmount from Newark rented the fishpond for fishing, when Dickey Lowe owned the fishpond it was leased to "Nicholson's". Later after Dickie died his children John & Ann Lowe inherited the fishpond and eventually they leased it to Cliff Stevenson & then to a syndicate:

- Gavin Driscol, Bill Jarmen & Peter? Currently it is leased by??

The fishpond is not on the 1824 Coddington map, this map shows the Moat and a stream running off from it going north across the road & on towards Winthorpe. Fred Reed June 2010.

WW2: - Coddington History Group are endeavouring to write an article on WW2, currently we are aware of a few men who were in the Armed forces. Please could you help us my giving details of what Coddington men & women did in WW2, what life was like then (living conditions, food, etc), how farming changed (I think the first tractor in the village was purchased by the Daybell family in 1940). Transport, cars, Lorries, buses, motorbikes, bicycles (numbers, makes, who owned them etc). How did life change between 1945 to 1950? Your kind help would be gratefully appreciated.

Village Hall News


The refurbishment has proceeded apace, volunteers had a busy 3 weeks in August stripping the cladding then replacing a few rotten timbers before applying 100mm insulation and attaching enough new cedar cladding to allow the roof to be replaced but not to get in the way of the new windows. The volunteers then took a break while contractors replaced the old roof with a new well insulated one complete with gutters etc. After that more contractors fitted new LED lights in the main hall – marvellous, unlike the old fluorescents they come on straight away when you press the switch! Finally new double glazed windows have been fitted and are being painted as I write, so the volunteer force can now continue with the cladding when the weather permits.

The next **Village Ventures** is in December and the third will be in March – see the separate notices. The first is selling well so ring for tickets promptly if you have not already done so. You will be pleased to hear that the committee resolved that this season the proceeds would go towards buying new **padded chairs** – so please support us by coming along and also by buying lots of raffle tickets. In the meantime borrow one of our cushions or bring your own!

Our plea in the September newsletter for help with the cleaning rota was answered – thank you Julie - so we are pleased to be up to full strength with four teams, we are very grateful to them all for keeping the hall spick and span – we get many compliments.

The monthly maintenance mornings have moved to the second Monday of the month and the team usually numbers seven or more. We have insulated above the small meeting room with sheep's wool insulation and done a considerable number of minor tasks such as installing fittings for a backdrop curtain for use during performances, replacing broken castors on the piano, clearing leaves from gutters etc. Do come and join us!

- * Trading Standards will then use the information as intelligence and coordinate our future Enforcement action accordingly.

Exemptions

Some vehicles are permitted to use weight-restricted routes and these may include:

- * Vehicles loading or unloading within the restricted area * Emergency vehicles
- * Vehicles in the service of the local authority in pursuance of its statutory powers or duties in connection with premises along the restricted route
- Building and industrial demolition operations
 Public utility services along the route

Helping you to have a crime-free Christmas.

When you're out shopping

Don't be an easy target - keep an eye on your personal belongings and Christmas shopping at all times

Christmas is a busy period, and in the run up to the big day, towns are bustling with shoppers buying festive gifts.

We advise people to take extra care when out and about, as it is easy to get distracted at this time of year.

We wouldn't want thieves to steal your Christmas, so please keep vehicles and belongings secure by following our crime prevention advice:

Parking

- Park in a busy, well lit area or secure car park if possible.
- Close windows, sunroof, lock doors & activate security alarms when
- leaving your car.
- Do not leave valuables or shopping on display in your car.
- Take valuables with you when you leave your car, eg: cash, credit cards, mobile phones, sat nav systems etc.
- If you have no choice, make sure valuables and shopping are locked in the boot; taking care no-one is watching you.
- On cold days, don't leave your car unattended with the engine running while it warms up.

Shopping

- Never keep pin numbers with bank cards.
- Keep wallets, purses, mobile phones and iPods out of sight and bags secure, especially in crowded places.
- Avoid carrying large amounts of cash, and be vigilant when drawing money from ATMs.

- Before inserting your card have a look at the machine to check it looks normal.
- Keep your PIN number safe, do not disclose to anyone or carry with your card.
- Try to pay for items on a debit card rather than carrying large amounts of cash or keep the amount you carry to a minimum.
- Think about the item you are buying someone. Are there any security products you could purchase to help them keep them safe/secure.i.e. if buying a bike think about also giving a decent 'D' lock.
- Stay safe online.

At home

Don't let thieves steal your Christmas - take steps to secure your home

Most homes are stocked full of Christmas goodies and gifts at this time of year, which can prove an attractive prospect for thieves, particularly if people don't take steps to secure their property.

Top tips for protecting your property:

- Don't leave presents and valuables on view it's a temptation for opportunist thieves.
- Get valuable items of property security marked and keep detailed records of them - take photographs of jewellery and list make, model and serial number for electrical items for example. Register them for free at Immobilise
- Don't leave keys in locks. This can make a burglar's job easier.
 Keep your keys in a safe place that is not on view/ easily accessible near the door.
- Close and lock all windows and doors when you leave the house.
 A walk-in burglar may try several homes before finding one that is unlocked you don't want it to be yours.
- If you're out during the hours of darkness take steps to make your home appear occupied. If you're out for the evening leave a light or two on. If it's for longer get a timer to switch a light on automatically at dusk - for about £5 you'll take another step towards making your home less likely to be targeted.
- Enlist the help of neighbours if you are going away. Get them to close curtains, remove post and put the bins out. Also, make sure you cancel newspapers, milk etc.

- Look out for your neighbour's property.
- Make sure callers to your home are genuine, always ask for ID.
- Refrain from keeping large amounts of cash at home.
- Dispose of gift packaging carefully. Make sure you only put your rubbish out just before your rubbish is due for collection and do your best to fold boxes so that they do not advertise your new contents of your home to burglars.
- Use exterior lighting. Good outdoor lighting can put off a burglar as they are more likely to be spotted in the act. The most appropriate is high-efficiency low energy lighting on a dusk to dawn switch. If you have motion sensor activated lights make sure they are directed downward - and fit them out of easy reach.
- Maintain door and window frames to ensure they are strong and secure - and prevent intruders at the back and sides of your home by using strong, high, fencing with trellis or Prikkastrip on top. Secure gates with a mortise lock or padlock bolts to prevent them from being slid open.
- Never leave spare keys in a hiding place such as under a doormat, in a flowerpot or inside the letterbox.
- Fit secure locks to all doors and fit a door chain or bar.
- Visible burglar alarms make burglars think twice; get specialist advice and consult your insurance company.
- Fit visible window locks, including rear or side windows and those above a low roof.

If you are planning a night out, read out our top tips on celebrating safely:

- Stick with friends, look out for one another and make sure you all get home safely.
- Arrange a meeting point and rendezvous times incase you get separated from friends.
- Pre-book safe transport home and do not accept lifts from strangers.
- Save the number of a licensed taxi firm in your mobile phone.
 Always check the driver's identification and never get into an unlicensed taxi.
- Avoid walking alone and never take short cuts through dark alleys or large open spaces.
- Stash some cash in case you lose your purse or wallet.
- Don't make yourself vulnerable by getting too drunk know your limits. See our section on alcohol related crimes.
- Store an ICE (in case of emergency) number in your phone.
- Think: Keys, money, phone, plans to get home.
- Keep an eye on your drinks and never leave them unattended.
 Even soft drinks could get spiked.




