CODDINGTON PARISH COUNCIL - CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Since March you will have seen our new inter-active road signs now in place, about 100 yards east of The Plough junction on the C208, and at the far end of Balderton Lane. The 3rd such sign will soon be sited on the C208 west of the Community Centre, just before the new 50 mph zone which extends to Beacon Heights. We shall continue, at every opportunity, to press for this 50 mph stretch to be reduced to a 40 mph limit.

As we write, a new consultation phase of the proposed Notts County Council Minerals Plan is about to commence – see their website. We will continue to resist plans for sand and gravel extraction north of the A17 and to the east of Drove Lane and can hold a public meeting – but there are no detailed plans for Coddington yet. You can also give your own views on the latest outline plans, by writing to Notts County Council direct or by visiting their consultation website, by 30 June 2014. We'll keep you advised on our website and notice boards.

The Annual Parish Meeting was held in the Village Hall on Thursday 17 April. There was an excellent presentation by members of the 'Say Yes to Newark Hospital Campaign Group' who explained the group's concerns for the lack of urgent and emergency care in Newark, with the continuing down-grading of Newark Hospital. Sadly, there was just one parishioner there to hear it. Villagers, we really do need steady and solid support for all our village events and causes!

With the centenary of the start of World War One approaching (4 August 1914 was the date of Great Britain's declaration of war) there will be several early events in the village. First, work is progressing to produce a booklet by August 1914, for each village household, commemorating the men of Coddington who fought and died, and those who served and survived, during the conflict. Next, at 6pm on Sunday 3 August 2014, there is to be a Commemorative Service in All Saints' Church, Coddington. Please come and join us; refreshments will be served after the service.

The Revd David writes....

'Good News - Could you help?'

The good news is that English Heritage / Heritage Lottery fund has confirmed a grant of £80,000 towards the repair of the church roof and this means that work will start later this year. We will still need to raise in excess of £50,000 on top of this towards the repairs not only of the roof but low level stone work to the building and the also to rebuild the churchyard wall to the west and north of the churchyard.

As part of the agreement with English Heritage we are required to have the church open for 6 hours on 40 days each year (not including days it is open for worship). To do this we intend to open on each first Saturday of the month and on Wednesdays from 1st April to 30th September. To do this we need to have two stewards in church while it is open. Could you help us with this? Even if you can only offer an hour once a month or even every other month every little helps. If you can offer or would like to know more before committing yourself then please contact either myself ot Hugh Daybell (Contact details below). Thank you in anticipation!

COMMUNITY GOVERNANCE REVIEW

In accordance with the Local Government and Public Involvement in Health Act 2007, Newark & Sherwood District Council has received a request from Newark Town Council for a Community Governance Review to be undertaken of Newark and the surrounding areas in light of the proposed development on land to the south and east of Newark.

Further details including the timetable and Terms of Reference for the Review are available on the District Council's website at: www.newark-sherwooddc.gov.uk

The review will specifically consider the following:

- (a) the land to the south of Newark which incorporates the proposed development of approximately 3,200 new homes and the possible revision of the Town Council boundary in view of the urban extension;
- (b) the land to the east of Newark and below Beacon Heights which incorporates the proposed development of approximately 1,600 new homes and the possible revision of the Town Council boundary in view of the urban extension; and
- (c) the boundaries of Newark Town Council in view of the urban extensions and the adjoining parishes (namely Hawton, Fernwood, Balderton, Farndon and Coddington); and
- (d) the boundary between Newark Town Council and Coddington Parish Council.

The first stage consultation, inviting initial submissions, will open on 30th April 2014 and will end on 20th June 2014.

Any representations need to be submitted to the District Council at the address below or via email at voting@nsdc.info by Friday 20th June 2014.



Good News to share — English Heritage have approved our Stage 1 submission which means that they will release their share of costs — towards 50% of the total outlay. COMMUNITY FIRST RESPONDERS SCHEME VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

The Parish Council is preparing the ground work for a possible Community First Responders Scheme in Coddington. The project will require funding for equipment and this aspect is being explored at present. The scheme will only be viable, however, if there are sufficient trained responders to man it. The Council is therefore seeking volunteers to form a Community First Responders group. First Responders are volunteer members of the community who are trained to respond to emergency calls through the 999 system in conjunction with the Ambulance Service. Responders provide immediate care to patients in their local areas where distance may delay the prompt arrival of an ambulance. They are trained to deliver Basic Life Support and defibrillation to patients in Cardiac Arrest, and appropriate assistance, including oxygen administration, to patients suffering from a range of conditions.

Volunteers will be fully trained by the East Midlands Ambulance Service and the group will be equipped with a defibrillator, oxygen masks and other equipment. We are seeking those aged 18 and over, who are in reasonably good health, want to learn life-saving skills and have a full, clean driving licence. Anyone able to give up some free time can volunteer.

CODDINGTON TRUST FUND

The earliest recorded fund for the village of Coddington goes back to 1532 when Robert Brown left 15 acres 33 poles of land to Newark Corporation for the poor of Coddington

In 1738 Joseph Birch left 90 acres of agricultural land for a Trust fund to be started and the Trustees to distribute £90 to the poor of Coddington

In 1760 The Enclosure Act allocated 86 acres33 poles to John Ashwell and John Cooper in trust for the poor of Coddington In1832 The Birch Charity land and farm were raising £140 per year In 1928 The rent on the farm and land raised £138,£55of which was put aside for the building of the Almshouses These were build in 1941

The present trust fund was originally registered in 1995 as the Coddington United charity and has subsequently been changed to the Coddington Trust Fund

The fund is there to help the residents of Coddington of any age in times of need and can also make financial contributions to local organizations for special or one off projects

The trustees would like to see more use made of the fund

The Trust is now in place to help the residents of Coddington in times of need and is open to help all age groups

Help can be given with expenses due to illness or lack of mobility or with household repairs or replacements.

Parents can apply for help with the cost of school uniforms or outings.

Students can apply for a grant towards the cost of textbooks and/or field trips.

All applications will be considered in the strictest confidence

Applications should be made in writing to the Clerk, Mr Alasdair Morrison, 26 Kirkgate, Newark, NG24 1AB or to any Trustee. A list of Trustees is printed in every issue of the Coddington Newsletter

In 2013 the fund gave £3650 to relief in need It received £16398.50 in rents from land and the almshouses

CODDINGTON HISTORY GROUP -

Coddington 1939 - 45

The 4th August this year is the centenary of the commencement of WW1, however it is 75 years ago since WW2 started on the 3rd September 1939. With this in mind Coddington History Group feel it is time that we had more information about the village, its occupants, how they lived, employment, farming, how the village changed in these years & who joined the Armed Forces.

Coddington was much smaller at the time no Thorpe Oak Estate, Morgan's Close, Valley View and only a very few houses on Newark Road & Balderton Lane, there were very old houses on The Green. Mains Electricity, water, sewage, gas were available; very few houses had all these services 16 people had telephones

Population: - It is impossible to give an accurate figure for the population in 1939 as the last available census was 1911 when there were 112 properties, 165 men, 165 women & 146 children. Like all small villagers everyone knew each other. The Christmas presents for children were an apple, orange, a new penny a doll for girls and a cowboy & Indian outfit for boys. At the beginning of the war major changes were made, everyone including children was given an identity card which had to be carried at all times. In 1939 - 38 Million gas masks, where distributed to every person in the UK including children (thank heavens they were never needed). Petrol/food & clothing rationing was introduced in early 1940 until 4th July 1954, ration books were distributed to everyone, the foods rationed were tea, sugar, bacon, ham, butter, cheese, fats, eggs, meat & sweets, but to be realistic country people did not suffer compared with those living in towns as they could produce their own fruit & vegetables, eggs, some would have a pig and most could obtain rabbits etc.

War Effort: As materials were in very short supply nothing was wasted or thrown away, everything was recycled, paper, glass bottles, scrap metal (even metal railings at the front of expensive houses were removed), hessian sacks, flour bags were washed and used for clothing & ladies longed to obtain silk from parachutes. The cubs collected paper & old books.

The **WI** President Mrs Mary Handbury and her team of ladies (eg. Helena Ashton, Mrs Beet, Lillian Burgess, Annie Dernie, Mary Geeson, Dorothy Hollingworth, Mrs Frank Hough, Minnie Simpson) worked exceptional hard eg: a letter of sympathy was sent to Mrs Albert Thompson after her husband was killed & a floral gift to his mother. The knitting team donated 3lbs wool [this was still on coupons] to knit shawls for persons in occupied countries.1 1/2 skeins of wool [coupon free] to knit garments to go to Coddington Service men. £5 to each of the mothers whose son's were P.O.Ws. In 1944 the WI

were asked to send knitting needles, crochet hooks etc for P.O.Ws. Fruit juice and cod liver oil distributed to children in the village.10/- (50p) donated to Kenneth Town who had joined the Forces. In 1943 £10 to Newark department for the Prisoners of War Fund. Mr W.O.Taylor gave a talk on the method of disposing of new explosive incendiary bombs. Mr Arthur Geeson had some of his fields seconded to the military. Every week school children bought Government saving stamps at the school and some parents also purchased them. They were generally told it was to buy "Spitfires". In the "War Weapons Week" over £300,000 was saved in the Newark District, by the end of the war Newark had saved over £4 million. Some children wore "rope shoes".

Coddington Hall and woodland: were requisitioned by the RAF, it was the officer's mess and sleeping accommodation. Nissan huts were built for the other ranks, stores, ammunition dumps, bunkers, air raid shelters and even a tennis court.

Transportation: - There was a bus service to Newark by Lincolnshire Road Co. every day and Wednesday & Saturday by Mr Cave from Brant Broughton. We estimate that only a 14 people had cars (business men & farmers), a few men had motorcycles but bicycles & walking were the main means of getting about with trains for long distance travel. Mr Hugh Tallents a solicitor cycled to his office in Newark.

Employment: - We have no factual information of where the village men were employed. The best guess is agricultural labourer, or cycling to Newark to work at Ransome & Marles Bearing Co.) they employed Charles Campion, Jack Hallam, Charlie Henton, Mr Rawlinson, Tom Robinson, Worthington Simpsons Ltd (pumps), employed Fred Fixter, Jack Kelham during the war both these companies expanded and needed extra staff. Other companies in Newark were: boiler makers Abbott & Co., Farrar's, Agricultural Machinery manufactures Nicholson's, Stevenson's, Sheet metal Blagg & Johnsons (made parts for Bailey & Pontoon bridges), Cafferata brick & plaster works. Newark was a major Malting town for the UK: Branston's, (ABM), R. Peache & Co Ltd, Warwick & Richardsons' Gilstrap Earp brewery, Holes Brewery. When girls left school at 14 they went to work mainly in Newark at eg Mumby's making military uniforms, or Cooper's making parachutes. We were still in an era when the majority of married women did not go out to work their household chores kept them fully occupied, they did casual work on farms (hoeing sugar beet, turnips, mangels & potatoes, hay, cereal & potato harvest) (older children worked on farms). In the 1930's when women married she was not allowed to work for the government, Insurance Companies, Banks etc. How did this change in WW2? We know some girls joined the Land Army eg Marjory Raynor, Edna Wheat at Daybell's, the government requisitioned Coddington Moor House for Land Girls & Timber Jills accommodation. We know women joined the

armed services, became mechanics, engineers, worked in ammunition/tank & aircraft factories, fire service, plumbers, nurses, volunteers with the WVS. Where did Coddington women go to work?? Men who did not join the forces had to enrol as fireman, ARP Wardens (Air Raid Precautions, making sure all houses had their "Black out curtains drawn at night showing no light) or join the Home Guard.

Houses: - Only a few very large houses and properties built in the 1930's were connected to all the services (only 14 had a telephone), the majority of houses would have only electric lights in perhaps 2 rooms (candles and paraffin lamps were still in use) and no "plugs", the kitchen range was still very important providing the cooking, heat and hot water. Only a few houses had a flush toilet with the majority having a "privy" at the bottom of the garden. Most houses would only have one cold tap in the kitchen. Bath night was once a week in a tin bath in front of the fire. There were a few electrical domestic appliances, so for example Monday was wash day, at 6:00am the copper had to be lit (coal), only a few modern houses had a gas or electric boiler, washing took all day using a peggy stick, washing board etc, ironing on a Tuesday using an iron heated on the kitchen range or the modern houses had an electric iron which was plugged into an adaptor which fitted next to the light bulb. Most houses would have a wireless mainly powered by an "accumulator" (rechargeable battery). There were no dustbins the only household waste was tin cans which were thrown on the village dump.

School: - This was the Old School on Main Street which is now the Scout Hall which had approximately 70 children. The headmaster was Mr John Fordham who taught the seniors, Miss Elizabeth Gomer "Middle School" and Miss Thacker who married and was Mrs Edwards then replaced by Miss Rhodes taught the juniors. Higher education children could leave Coddington school at 11 if they passed the entrance exams and funded by their parents or could win scholarship, girls to Lilley & Stone High School and boys to the Magnus Grammar School; at 13 and 14 several boys/girls went to the technical college before starting an apprenticeship. The school minimum leaving age was 14. Several children walked 2 miles to school. Some children from Sheffield, Worthing & Great Yarmouth were evacuated to the village and attended the village school. We know of Diana & Kathleen Cannon, June Ollie & Jessie Philpot. Many only stayed for a few days as they were "homesick" & returned to their parents.

Shops: - The baker was John William Knott & his wife ran the shop which was a general store selling everything from bread, sweets to paraffin for the oil lamps. The Post Office in Post Office Row run by Mrs Sharpe & her daughter Molly, Mrs Parkes had a very small shop attached to The Red Lion Pub, Harold Simpson was the butcher he lived at Hall Farm where he had a

slaughter house. The main meat being sausages, pork, beef, lamb & rabbit no chicken as they were too expensive! Coal was the main source of fuel delivered to your door by Mr Harold Taylor; milk delivered by Mr Fryer who had a fixed wheel bicycle as he had an artificial leg and carried his milk churns on the handlebars. The Holligworth Family at Manor Dairy farm bottled their milk in the dairy & they employed Tommy & Jim Wright & Bob Checkley to deliver milk with a horse and trap or wagon in the village and surrounding areas including Newark. Fred Black at Catch Inn farm delivered milk on a horse & cart in Newark. Mr Lund from Farndon came round the village once a week with his horse & wagon selling, hardware, paraffin, tools etc. Mr Loftus collected papers from Newark & delivered them to Coddington, Beckingham, and his village of Brant Broughton.

Gardens /allotments: families grew their own vegetables & had a few chickens for eggs and perhaps a pig.

Church & Chapel: this was an era when most people went to church or chapel on a Sunday with children attending Sunday school. Outings were arranged to the coast in summer. Rev Sydney Cyril Bully MA at the church and was extremely popular; he started a drama group and the "Cubs". he was followed by Rev. Basil A Whitworth, Mr Downham was Church Warden, William Arthur Richards was the "sides man" before becoming Church Warden for many years. Church Fetes were held by Mrs Tallents at "Coddington House" to raise money for the troops. The person most involved with the Chapel was Harold Taylor.

Sport: - In 1939 there were very active, clubs, tennis (Ashton, Dernie & Walster families, Peter Campion, John Knott, R Hammond, K & M Rawlinson, P Sleight, Fred Theakston, Fred Tomlinson. Cricket team: - H Barber, E Barks, Arthur Beaumount, Bert Coddington, Peter Campion, Frank & Ted Daybell, Fred Fixter, Harold Handbury, Charlie Henton, Pat Hough, Robert Kelham, Reg Leader, Herbert Maltby, Bill Phillips, John Naylor, Owen Taylor, Frank, Eddie & Harold Thompson, Thomas Vasy, Tommy Ward, Jimmy Wright. Football team: Peter Campion, Slug Taylor, Frank & Harold Thompson +?? Table tennis was played in the granary at Vale farm. There was a darts team at the pub.

The "Reading Room" (now the Village Hall, the first room before you go into the main hall) Whist Drives were arranged by Mary Handbury every fortnight. There was also a billiard table; Mr Knott was one of the main players. Amateur dramatics & the RAF held dances there.

Public Houses: The Plough (landlord Arthur Henton) & the Red Lion (Landlord Sam Parkes) it had an indoor bowling alley.

Garage & Cafe in Newark Road: Mr Larkin

Farmers: - The larger farmers in the village were The Hollingworth Family at Manor Dairy Farm, The Daybell's at Hill Farm, Harold Handbury at Vale Farm, Mr Arthur Geeson, Hall Farm (owned by George Allan Ross), Harold Simpson, Manor Farm, Harry Walster, Charity Farm, John Smith, Sunnyside Farm & The Clark family at Beaconfield Farm. The main crops grown were grass, turnips & mangels for animal feed, wheat for milling or feed, barley for malting or feed, oats for animal feed, potatoes & sugar beet. The Daybell & Hollingworth families both purchased their first tractor around 1940 followed by the required implements. George Hough the local agricultural contractor was still using steam engines. The government formed the "War AG" to educate farmers to produce more food, ploughing up grassland, reduce fallow and generally modernise, in fact in Britain from 1939 until 1945 farm production nearly doubled.

Military activity near the village: Due to the location of Balderton, Winthorpe & Swinderby Airfields most days' planes were seen over the village, unfortunately a bomber crashed on Drove Lane & one on Beacon Hill. Incendiary bombs were dropped all over the village. The worst local tragedy was on the 7th March 1941 when a German Heinkel bomber dropped its bombs on Ransome & Marle's factory in Newark killing 41 (non lived in Coddington) & injuring 165. Did any of the injured live in Coddington? Several villagers saw the raid.

Polish Airman: Polish Airmen were billeted in 39 Nissan Huts in Parklands Close in 1939 before Winthorpe Airfield opened in September 1940 as accommodation for the two Polish bomber Squadrons (No 300 & 301).

Italian Prisoners of War: Hugh Daybell tells us that the mains water pipe to Hill Farm was laid by Italian Prisoners of war; some worked at Harold Simpson's farm, did they work on other farms in the village? Where were they billeted?

German Prisoners of War: Were any billeted nearby and if so did they work on farms?

Coddington Men who served in the Armed Forces in WW2:

We have some information on the following men but we would like more + photographs: -

Albert Thompson the only Coddington man that was killed in the war. **Harold Thompson** met his to be wife Edith when he was stationed in Wales. He was the brother of Albert and Edwin. We are told he may have been in a "Special" unit in the UK who was involved in Camouflage (erecting mock buildings away from towns, to fool the German bombers).

James H (Jim) Dernie he fought in the Middle East & was a prisoner of war.

Frank Draycott: all we know is that he in the air force.

Captain Pat Hough DSO fought in Africa & Italy. He returned from Italy with an Italian bride Sylvia.

Donald Walster he was one of the first members of the SAS & joined in Italy, he was taken prisoner at the same time as Col. Stirling during the final push up the desert near Tripoli.

We have names of the following people but no information:-

Herbert Barrett: Royal Navy. Did he go on Arctic convoys?

Dick Hall; he was in the Welch Regiment of the British Army.

3 other names, not Coddington men, who were later, associated with Coddington and served at the Drove Lane searchlight unit or in the RAF and married local girls were **Fred Tysoe**, **Bill Phillips** and **Johnny Barton**

There must have been many more Coddington Men who served in WW2.

This is the first attempt by CHG to consider the effect of WW2 on the village and its residents. Our information is very limited and we would therefore appreciate details such as photographs, documents and reminisces of the village in 1939 – 1945.
