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CODDINGTON PARISH COUNCIL - RETIRING CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

As you will see, from the list of Council Members on the back page, there have been changes to the Chairman and Vice Chairman positions. These have happened because I have now served my standard 3 year term as Chairman. Councillor Linda Cox was elected as the new Chairman at the Annual Parish Council Meeting on 14 May 2015. There were other changes which coincided with the national and local elections on 7 May. You may recall my previous remarks on changes to the District Council's ward electoral boundaries which, regrettably, included Coddington (and Barnby) being merged into a new 2 district-councillor ward with Balderton North. This has meant that with effect from 12 May 2015 our former District Councillor, Mrs Maureen Dobson, no longer represents us in that role, although she remains our County Councillor. We are grateful for her outstanding contribution and work as Coddington's District Councillor.

Looking back, many of the village's meetings have been very poorly attended – last month's Annual Parish Meeting especially so. However, on 30 April a large number of villagers attended Cllr Dobson's public meeting in the Village Hall, concerning footpaths at Beaconfield. Thank you. Further information is overleaf on page 4. There, you will also find comment on the need for volunteers to help manage village activities, or to serve on the Parish Council. This is so important not just for the regular activities, but also for long-term continuity and sustainability.

There have been several enquiries about the proposed gravel extraction. The County Council will consider all the evidence again, in September, prior to preparation of a final consultation document for Councils, and the public, to examine and make comment. This document will then be submitted, with all our responses, to the Planning Inspectorate in London.

Coddington has again been entered for the Best Kept Village competition. The judging will be through most of June. The village did very well last year – please support it again with your excellent gardens, in village tidiness generally, and by helping your Council with the continual litter problem.

Finally and very sadly, I must record the passing, on 18 April 2015, of David Hedge who was twice Chairman of this council before his retirement in 2011. David made a dedicated and exceptional contribution to this village over many years, as a parish councillor and in many other aspects of our community, including the Scout Group, Pages Wood and Village History.

FOOTPATHS AND TRACKS

The Parish Council has been asked to request that users of Footpath 5, which runs northwards from Parklands and through the wood, respect the surrounding properties by adhering to the designated route. There is no entitlement to create shortcuts, or fresh pathways, by crossing adjoining private land. Also, please help keep all our footpaths and tracks free from litter. Thank you for your assistance.

Transparency Code for Smaller Authorities.

In December 2014, the Department for Communities and Local Government (DCLG) issued the Transparency Code for Smaller Authorities which requires information to be made available for local people, to increase democratic accountability.

ALL SAINTS' CHURCH The Revel David writes....

As I write we are approaching the end of our Church Roof Repair Project. And I'd just like to express my thanks once again to all who have been involved in the project. To all who have given time effort and money to make the project possible. There are too many names to mention and if I tried I know I would miss someone out. But I hope you all know how grateful I and the church are. There is more work needed. The tower, north aisle and churchyard boundary wall on Chapel Lane all need major repairs. The tasks can seem unending.

But is is important to remember that the Church of Jesus Christ is not primarily about buildings - it is about people and it is about people getting together to Worship God and Celebrate being his people together. Festivals and feasting have always been a big part of church life. And as I write we are a week away from our Celebration Party when we will do just that. Jesus spent much of his time hanging out and eating with his friends. There is a story about two sisters Martha and Mary who were friends of Jesus and they invite him to their home to eat - Jesus comes and while Martha is busy cleaning the house and preparing food Mary sits and listens to what Jesus has to say. Martha gets angry with Mary - and she says to Jesus ' Lord, doesn't it bother you that my sister has left me to do all the work by myself? Tell her to come and help me!' But to her surprise Jesus replies 'Martha, Martha, you are worried and upsert about so many things, but only one thing is necessary. Mary has chosen what is best, and that can never be taken from her.' Sometimes it is right to put the business to one side and to spend time just being with others in the presence of Jesus.

How It Works?

- Local observers note details of vehicles that may be misusing the route
- Details can then handed to the Co-ordinator, Andrew Stokes, the parish clerk to report or can be sent direct through to Trading Standards online using Nottinghamshire County Council website which has a dedicated Lorry Watch section.

- Trading Standards enforce the weight restriction on behalf of Highways.
- Trading Standards will then use the information as intelligence and coordinate our future enforcement action accordingly.

Exemptions

Some vehicles are permitted to use weight-restricted routes and these may include:

- · Vehicles loading or unloading within the restricted area
- Emergency vehicles
- Vehicles in the service of the local authority in pursuance of its statutory powers or duties in connection with premises along the restricted route
- Building and industrial demolition operations
- Public utility services along the route

Dog Fouling

Dog mess is an eyesore and a health hazard. If you are a dog owner, you have a legal duty to clean up every time your dog messes in a public place, including public footpaths and any open land to which the public has access. Always carry a bag when dog walking, and place the used bag in a waste bin. DO NOT LEAVE THE BAG LITTERING A FOOTPATH as some people have been doing.

Not only is dog mess unsightly and unpleasant, it can lead to toxocariasis in humans, which can cause serious illness and even blindness, particularly affecting young children. Dog mess on grass paths and open spaces is even worse than on the pavement as it often can't be seen until stepped in, or is spread around over a wider area by a mower, and the parasite eggs in the faeces which cause toxocariasis can survive for many months in the soil.

The Parish Council would like to make it clear that anyone seen not clearing up after their dog will be reported to the District Council or the police. In February Andy Gaunt of Mercian Archaeology told us about surviving life in Medieval England, in March a packed village hall enjoyed Michael Constantine telling us the story of Newark's new National Civil War Centre and in April we learnt how the Ordnance Survey came about, the accurate maps were measured from an initial accurate 5 mile straight line set up using standard glass rods encased in wooden boxes – these original "trig points" were marked with redundant cannons set in the ground and are still there today! Having run out of cannons, we were shown how the modern ones were constructed very sturdily of concrete. No more talks until 17th September – details in the September newsletter.

Regarding our graveyard recording project, we have now received the plans etc from Notts CC Community Archaeologists so at last we are now able to finalise how we are to make the information available. This will be on display at the open day.

Coddington History Group

Rev. John Maximilian Dolphin (1837-1899)

JMD was the vicar of Coddington from 1863-1890 and thus witnessed the upheaval that must have occurred during the refurbishment of the church that happened 150 years ago. He also left his mark in the form of his initials that you can see when leaving the church - carved in a stone high in the gable of the porch. He and his wife Rose had a large family, 11 of whom he baptised himself here at Coddington. Not all survived, Charlotte Elizabeth lived for just 3 days after baptism in 1882, and sadly Maximilian did the same in 1883.

Recently Coddington History Group was contacted by his great grand daughter, Clare Jakeman who kindly gave us photos of John and Rose, a simplified Dolphin family tree and a copy of her essay entitled "FOUR DOLPHIN CLERGYMEN 1774 – 1957". Below is an extract from it (just slightly edited in places for clarity or brevity) that relates to 'our' Dolphin clergyman. The full essay is available on request and will be on our website.

JMD's grandfather Rev. John (1774-1830) came from a respected Gloucestershire family who owned a large estate Eyford near Upper Slaughter (purchased ten years before John was born). Sadly his kinsman Vernon, the last Dolphin owner, spent the family wealth in its entirety

JMD's father, also John (1804-1889) had the usual education befitting a clergyman and a gentleman, Eton and Trinity College Cambridge. In the year 1827 he played as an old Etonian captain for Cambridge in the first Oxford and Cambridge match wearing a top hat. He was a member of the Norfolk County XI from 1828 to 1842. He was ordained in 1828 and shortly afterwards became Rector of Antingham where he remained as Rector for sixty one years till he died aged eight five. In 1833 he married Mary Western, an Essex girl, and they had four children. His obituary mentions that he was a J.P. and Poor Law guardian and when he became Rural Dean he had thirty churches under his care. The church at Antingham was restored under his auspices by public subscription and to celebrate the fiftieth year of his incumbency he paid for the rebuilding of the porch.

JMD himself (1837-1899) was John's eldest son. Educated at Marlborough and Oriel College Oxford, he was also a talented cricketer. He was in the school eleven and Dolphin's hit for 10 (all run out) was mentioned in the Daily Telegraph years later but he couldn't recollect anything of it himself! He captained Oxford in 1860 and was the first person to bind his bat. He was

curate at North Charlton in Lincolnshire from 1860-63. He was Vicar of Coddington near Newark for twenty seven years and his obituary in the Pioneer (the account of his death and funeral extended to three and a half columns) states:-

"During his long residence at Coddington he won universal esteem for his geniality, his kindliness of heart and activity in the promotion of good works. Whilst he was Vicar the Church was restored, and the new Vicarage house built."

He continued to play cricket there being captain of the Newark eleven and "a tower of strength" both to the town and village teams. It was while he was at Coddington that he married Rose Byron, a Lincolnshire girl, in 1866 and they had eleven children; six boys all six foot tall and five girls so they needed the new large vicarage but it is a pity it is guite so ugly the postcard in my possession shows a stark irregular brick building bare of all interest save the decoration on the enormous chimneys. Arthur was the fourth son. None of his brothers became clergymen but two of his sisters married their father's curates. John Maximilian was vicar of the Church of St Lawrence at Long Eaton for nine years, exchanging a small village for a rapidly growing township. Seeing the green fields being replaced by houses and factories he conceived the idea of a mission church St John's (which was erected as a memorial to him). He became a canon in 1891. He was also organising secretary of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel. He was a High Churchman and a tractarian and he wore a biretta but only outdoors when the weather was inclement. A "tall man of fine physique, robust health and commanding presence" with great energy and ability he was rarely ill but never recovered from a fall from a trap some months before he died, from a bronchial cold, which developed rapidly into pneumonia, at the relatively young age of sixty one.

John Maximilian had the advantage of being the eldest son and having an exceptionally charismatic appearance and personality. His talent as a cricketer endeared him to the whole community and enabled him to make friends of all classes.

His obituary in The Church Times recorded:-

"Since his ordination he has been widely known for his activity in all matters connected with the Church... In 1890 and from the highest motives he undertook the charge of the huge parish of Long Eaton, where for nine years he has been untiring in his efforts for the spiritual welfare of the parish... and where he has won the esteem of all and the love of very

many... His utterances were always marked by deep learning and full knowledge of the subject".

He died on a Friday and at evensong at Long Eaton on the Sunday the preacher declared to a "vast congregation";

"Those earnest tones, that vigorous intellect, that kindly cheering voice which so long has guided, rebuked, consoled and encouraged you will be heard in God's earthly house no more."

The Interment took place at Coddington churchyard, where the flag floated at half mast, on the Monday amidst falling snow and there was a bitterly cold February wind. A "sextet of watchers" had taken turns to guard the coffin from the close of evensong through the entirety of the night. On Friday a dumb peal had been rung on the bells.

Many mourners from Long Eaton were unable to attend due to the inclemency of the weather. However at the same time as the funeral service at Coddington, according to the Pioneer, the church at Long Eaton: "was densely crowded for the memorial service... the large number of Nonconformist as well as Church people being particularly noticeable. The Union Jack floated half mast from the Conservative Club and from the Parish Church from the time of the Canon's death until after the funeral."

Numerous resolutions of sympathy were listed in the Pioneer including one from members of Mrs Dolphin's Young Men's Bible Class. The people of Long Eaton were not going to allow the Coddington parishioners to outdo them in their mourning but they also appreciated the integrity of the man who only three years before had turned down the valuable living of Rivenhall in Essex to stay with them.

Footnote – after discovering 3 generations of clergymen named John Dolphin, you will be pleased to know they also named a son John and a daughter Rose; also that another son (Clare's grandfather) Arthur joined the clergy.

On The Beat with PCSO Mike Munro

Anti Social Behaviour (ASB)

The term anti-social behaviour covers a wide range of unacceptable activity that blights the lives of many people on a daily basis. It often leaves victims feeling helpless, desperate and with a seriously reduced quality of life. Terms such as 'nuisance', 'disorder' and 'harassment' are also often used to describe this type of behaviour.

ASB is defined as "Behaviour by a person or persons which causes or is likely to cause harassment, alarm or distress to one or more persons not of the same household as the person".

(Antisocial Behaviour Act 2003 & Police Reform and Social Responsibility Act 2011).

Why is tackling ASB important?

- ASB is a key driver for public confidence in the police.
- Failure to tackle ASB could lead to increased crime, especially criminal damage.

Categories of ASB

Personal - ASB is perceived to be targeted at an individual or group rather than the community at large

Nuisance - ASB is causing trouble, annoyance or suffering to the community at large rather than an individual or group.

Environmental - The incident is not aimed at an individual or group but targets the wider environment, e.g. public spaces/buildings.

How to report ASB

Anti-social behaviour can be reported in a number of ways and not just to the Police. Your Local Authority will have a dedicated department that deals with community safety issues including ASB.

Reporting ASB to the Police can be done in a number of ways, either via 101 or by contacting your local Neighbourhood Policing Teams. You can also report incidents at your nearest Police Station. Where there is a potential danger to life or property you should dial 999.

All reports of ongoing ASB situations made to the Police will be forwarded to your relevant Neighbourhood Policing Team for follow-up contact. Listed below is just a brief description of some of the categories relating to ASB. It will also give you an indication as to who is the best organisation to contact to report any such instance.

Vehicle Abandoned (not stolen): this will include vehicles damaged after a road traffic collision that are abandoned at the scene and not awaiting recovery, scrap or 'end of life' vehicles.

In the first instance you should contact your local authority regarding an abandoned vehicle however, if your local authority are unwilling to deal with the vehicle you should contact the **Police** using **101**.

Vehicle Nuisance/inappropriate use: this relates to vehicles being used in acts such as street cruising (driving up and down the street causing annoyance and bothering other road users), vehicle convoys and associated behaviour, riding/driving on land other than a road as well as the misuse of go-peds, motorised skateboards and electric propelled cycles etc.

It also includes the unlicensed dealing of vehicles where a person has 2 or more vehicles on the same road within 500 metres of each other.

You should contact Police regarding the inappropriate use of vehicles and your local authority where you believe unlicensed dealing is the issue at hand.

Rowdy or Inconsiderate Behaviour: this category refers to general nuisance behaviour in a public place or a place to which the public have access (e.g. private clubs). It does not include domestic related behaviour or public disorder which would be reported/recorded as crimes.

You should contact the Police via 101 to report any general nuisance behaviour.

Rowdy/Nuisance Neighbours: this refers to rowdy behaviour and general nuisance caused by neighbours and includes neighbour disputes over boundaries, parking etc, as well as noise nuisance from parties or playing loud music etc. It does not refer to raves or businesses which are covered elsewhere.

Where the issue is solely noise related and is a one-off incident you should contact your Local Authority's Noise Team. If you are experiencing any sort of rowdy/nuisance behaviour from your neighbours on an ongoing basis please contact Police via 101 and the information will be passed to your Local Policing Team to make follow-up contact with you

Littering/Fly Tipping: this includes depositing of litter or rubbish, fly posting, dumping or anything discarded in any public place.

You should contact your local authority who can arrange for the rubbish/drugs paraphernalia to be removed.

Animal Problems: this refers to any incident whereby animals are creating a nuisance or people's behaviour associated with the use of animals is deemed as anti-social. This would include uncontrolled animals, stray dogs, barking, fouling, and intimidation by an animal etc.

In the first instance you should contact your local authority however for animals dangerously out of control you should contact Police.

Trespass: this covers those situations where people have entered land (including water) or premises without lawful authority or permission. This would include taking unauthorised short cuts through a garden or building through to those setting up unauthorised campsites. It also includes people trespassing on railways etc.

You should contact Police regarding any incident of trespass.

Nuisance Calls: this category covers all types of communication by phone that is not indecent, threatening or offensive but rather causes anxiety and annoyance. It also includes silent calls and intrusive cold calling e.g. late night calls from double glazing or insurance companies etc.

You should contact your phone provider in the first instance and if the problem persists then contact Police. Where calls become offensive or abusive then contact Police.

Street Drinking: this covers incidents of unlicensed drinking in public spaces where the behaviour of the persons involved is deemed as anti-social. This can also include unplanned and spontaneous street parties which, literally, encroach onto the street.

You should contact Police regarding any street drinking where the behaviour is deemed as anti-social.

Noise: this relates to all incidents of noise nuisance that do not involve neighbours.

You should contact your local authority noise nuisance team in the first instance otherwise contact the **Police** via **101**.

Begging/Vagrancy: this includes all persons begging or asking for charitable donations in any public place or encouraging a child to do so. It also includes people sleeping rough in the open air, shop doorways, communal areas etc. Unlicensed ticket sellers at or near public transport hubs may also falls into this category. It does not involve licensed charitable collections.

You should contact Police to report any issues of begging or vagrancy.

Fireworks: this will include the inappropriate use of fireworks, the unlawful sale or possession of fireworks and noise created by fireworks.

You should contact Police regarding this issue.

In all cases where you feel threatened or intimidated and fear for your or another persons safety contact Police immediately using 999.

If you do need any further advice please contact your Local Safer Neighbourhood Team at Newark Police Station.

Victory Days preparations underway

Museum staff and volunteers are currently making plans for Victory Days 2015; a two day event in July (Saturday 25th & Sunday 26th 2015) that will commemorate the 70th Anniversary of VE and VJ Day at the Newark Air Museum.

Our organisers are keen to hear from any veterans of any of the military or civilian forces during World War II, as the museum is keen to invite these veterans along to the event as its special guest. Details of a former service number or membership of an appropriate armed forces veteran's organisation can secure them free entry to the event at the museum's site in eastern Nottinghamshire, close to the border with Lincolnshire.

For the younger visitors the museum is planning to operate a World War II style sweet shop in the Dambusters Hut, where visiting children will be able to collect their free World War II sweet ration. To collect their ration they will need to bring along some pre-decimal coinage – so parents and grandparents will need to look out for those sixpences, three-penny bits, pennies, half-pennies or even farthings – and make sure that they bring them along. Visitors should not worry too much if they cannot find suitable coinage as the museum will have some available to make sure that everyone gets their ration!

Throughout the two days there will be a host of World War II related activities and entertainment taking place around the site, including alongside its famous Anderson Shelter and Dig for Victory Garden. Visitors will also be able to sample some examples of wartime food delights, such as bread & dripping, spam, corned beef and jam sandwiches.

Everyone at the museum is looking forward to two days of nostalgia and commemorations.
