CODDINGTON PARISH COUNCIL - CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

As I write this, on 4 August, commemorative activities are taking place across the nation to mark the centenary of the commencement of World War One (The Great War, WW1). Last night, here in Coddington's All Saints' Church, a moving WW1 Vigil Service was held, conducted by Lay Reader Mike Bache with great dignity and compassion. Mike's name also features as one of the contributors to our booklet "The Great War – *Coddington Remembers*". Produced for the Parish Council, a copy will have been delivered to every village household by today. We hope that you'll find it interesting.

The Notts County Council Minerals Plan, with its gravel pit proposal, continues to occupy our minds. A packed village meeting on 24 June gave us more thoughts for the Parish Council's latest response, which you can now read in the Parish Council section of the village website – http://village.coddington.org.uk. Most importantly, a separate Action Group has now been formed. Coddington Against Gravel Extraction (CAGE) will be developing arguments and actions against the proposal. Their own report can be seen further on in this edition of the Village News. There will be another opportunity for everyone to comment again during the autumn, so please keep an eye on both our and CAGE's websites. Your individual contributions will continue to be important and will all count!

It is good news to report, for those who don't know already, that our third interactive speed sign is now in operation on the C208, west of the Community Centre. We cannot install signs on every highway so please keep speeds down on all our village roads – it gets very crowded and hectic at busy periods, including school in/out times.

Finally, the Newark Advertiser this week reported Coddington's 1st place in the Notts 2014 Best Kept Village Competition (700 – 2000 population category). Well done, and thank you, everybody!

On the Beat with PCSO 8128 Mike Munro

Nottinghamshire Police Rural Crime update.

Crime across the County is reviewed every day by the senior management and the local Neighbourhood Policing Teams. What has become apparent recently is the number of offences that have occurred which could have been prevented by taking simple crime prevention measures.

There has recently been a spate of thefts from vehicles in the north of the county. A large number of the targeted vehicles had been left unlocked and with property left on display. Had the vehicles been locked then the offences would not have occurred and more importantly the owners would not have become the victims of crime. Other potentially avoidable crimes of note have been a 4 x 4 stolen from a drive because the keys had been left in the ignition and the theft of a van after the keys had been hooked off a table in an office through an open window.

Another issue which was recently highlighted to me whilst on patrol is the delayed reporting of suspicious incidents and crime to the police from our rural communities. On one morning in particular I was in a village North of Newark and in 15 minutes spoke to three people who had delayed reporting crimes and suspicious activity from the week before. Had we been made aware of these crimes at the time we would have been able to direct resources appropriately.

We rely on intelligence from you within the community to help target crime and reduce anti social behaviour. It is therefore vital that if you see anything untoward, out of place or suspicious that you report it to the control room calling 101 or if you suspect a crime is being committed or about to be ring 999, we will investigate. One member of the public did just that in the early hours recently on seeing three suspicious men and a vehicle in a village. Officers attended and stopped the vehicle arresting all three of the males for going equipped to steal.

Crime is continuing to fall within Nottinghamshire and our rural villages and rural areas remain safe places to live, work and enjoy. With your help we can make them even safer.

The Revd David writes....

ROOF REPAIR WORK BEGINS

The good news is that the church roof repair work starts on Monday 1st September and is expected to continue until 27th April 2015. During that time the Church will be open as normal with Sunday services continuing as usual. The works may cause some extra dust inside the building and for this reason we are taking and storing the soft furnishings away from church. Our thanks go to those who have volunteered space for this.

We hope people will be able to see the works close up with trips on to the roof while the scaffolding is in place. Watch out for these opportunities being advertised.

We are continuing to raise funds towards paying for the work. The total we need for all the work we would like to do is £164,530. As well as the £80,000 English Heritage/Heritage Lottery Grant, we have raised a total of £24,458 from other trust funds, donations, the Buy-a-Tile scheme and other fundraising. This leaves us £60,072 short of our target. While there are some reserves in church funds and we have some promised money from other grant awarding bodies depending on completion of the project, we need to continue our push on fundraising. We have other fundraising events going on (see below) and the Buy-a Tile scheme is still open. If you have any other ideas of how we might raise funds please let us know.

Other Things....

I hope you have been able to take time to relax over the summer period. It is important to take time for breaks and to have a rhythm of rest and work. Jesus himself modelled this in his own ministry. In the gospels we read he took time to remove himself from the crowds who sought his help and to be alone with his father in heaven. In busy lives it can be hard to find time to take out in the day for that reflection and prayer. Over the summer Emma Martha and I attended the New Wine Christian holiday/conference and there I was challenged about the way that time has been squeezed in my own life - but also about its importance. Without making time with God a priority all else we do can be as nothing. I hope you are able to find time. I would remind you to that on Monday mornings at 9.15am in church we have a short service of Morning Prayer. All are welcome to join us then.



CODDINGTON HISTORY GROUP

It has been an eventful summer for the History Group; you will have received the WWI commemoration book through your door and hopefully been as impressed as I was when I saw the finished article. I am sure you will realise it represents a lot of effort by those that contributed to it.

The one aspect of the summer we regretted sincerely was the untimely death of our founder member Mick Lord. We will miss him very much in many ways; he was always coming across interesting information and photos and was excellent at digging into his various chosen subjects.

The graveyard recording project is gradually coming to a close (we hope!); all the data from the stones has been "digitised" – a posh term which actually means they were typed in by a few history group volunteers! Many thanks are due to them. Yet to be done is checking of the data and of the few gaps we have where we cannot read the stone or there is no stone. There are some 474 memorials, John Langley is the earliest stone dating from 1730; we have about 740 names and only about 23 unknown ones.

We have some interesting and varied speakers for our next season beginning with the return of a favourite speaker, Margaret Harrison who is to tell us the history of Nottingham Goose Fair. If you have not seen her before, do come, it will be amusing and entertaining! Then we will get some help in dating houses, followed by an illustrated talk about Papplewick Pumping Station which is just north of Nottingham. If you have not been there then you have missed its stunning architecture and decoration, as well as a truly impressive brick built underground reservoir – come and see the talk.

A Message from the Prime Minister.

I ask all workers on the land to do their very utmost to help to grow more food.

There is a shortage of food all over the world, and we may have to feed our Army and Navy, as well as ourselves, on what we can grow at home. They cannot fight on unless they are properly fed.

Every full day's work that you do helps to shorten the war, and brings peace and victory nearer.

Every idle day and all loitering lengthen the war and lessen the chance of victory.

Your Comrades in the trenches are under fire every hour of the day and night. Will you not help them to win by working an extra hour each day?

That is the way in which you can beat the Germans!


As always happens we found information on another Coddington soldier just after we submitted our book for printing, the information is: - Frederick Henry Peter Tregidgo born 1886

Corps of Royal Engineers Killed in action Flanders

Fred was born in Falmouth, Cornwall in 1886, his parents were Thomas Henry Pritt Tregidgo (ships Carpenter) and Sarah Jane, brothers Thomas Henry, George, Claude Lever and sisters Sarah Ellen, Mary, Alice Maud, Violet, Robet Elizabeth, Clare Irene and Gladys May. By 1911 Fred was a butcher. In October 1915 he married Mary Ann (Polly) Bryan (born Coddington 30th September 1894) in Newark. Military Service record: - (number 86972) was a Pioneer in the Corps of Royal Engineers (82nd field Coy.R.E.) he was born and enlisted in Falmouth, Cornwall but his residence was stated in military records as Coddington. He was killed in action at Flanders on the 29th July 1916. He is remembered at Thiepval Memorial Northern, France panel reference: - Pier & Face 8A and 8D "Missing from the Somme". "The Major of the Regiment wrote to his widow Mary Ann, who lived at Muskham". "You will have received the official notification by this time re. the death of your husband, No. 86972 Pioneer F. Tregidgo. He was killed instantly on the night of the 29th July, while working prior to an attack on the enemy, at about 200 yards away from the enemy's trenches". Source: - Newark Advertiser

Medals: - British & Victory.

At the May meeting of Coddington WI the members discussed the resolution, which is voted for at the National General Meeting held in June. This year's resolution on organ donation was outlined by WI advisor Anne Marie Morley. The members unanimously supported the resolution. Our entry for the Newark show, depicting 'Inspiring Music', scored 75½ points and was awarded 8th place. Our entry featured 'Wherever You Are' by the Military Wives Choir. In the individual competitions Wendy Parrett came first with her beaded necklace and Marilyn Membery took a second and third place with her savoury and sweet biscuits. Wendy was also awarded the best in show for her necklace.

In the first week of June, Coddington took part in the WI baton relay.



The baton is travelling around the country to celebrate 100 years of the WI in 2015. The baton was handed over from Balderton WI who arrived at the village hall in a vintage bus. Everyone then sat down to a tea party, hosted by Coddington, before president Glen Sheppard and secretary Sue Sprigings took the baton, in a red sports car, down to Bridge WI to continue the relay. A rose,

The June meeting had local author, Stuart Townsend, telling us about a Psychiatric Case History. Stuart's book, Asylum Bound tells of the bizarre treatments to both patients and staff in the 1970s.

In July Coddington WI enjoyed a very interesting talk by Jo Carter. Jo, dressed as a ladies maid, likened the times to Downton Abbey and her 'Maid in England' told of the life of a ladies maid employed by Lady

Mary Curzon. Jo brought a variety of items from the period to illustrate her talk.

A trip to Waddesdon Manor, organised by the WI, also took place in July. Around 25 members and friends caught a Wrights bus from the village to the National Trust house in Buckinghamshire. The weather was perfect, so the party were able to explore the gardens in the sunshine as well as enjoying a visit to the house with all its treasures. COMMUNITY FIRST RESPONDERS SCHEME VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

The Parish Council is preparing the ground work for a possible Community First Responders Scheme in Coddington. The project will require funding for equipment and this aspect is being explored at present. The scheme will only be viable, however, if there are sufficient trained responders to man it. The Council is therefore seeking volunteers to form a Community First Responders group. First Responders are volunteer members of the community who are trained to respond to emergency calls through the 999 system in conjunction with the Ambulance Service. Responders provide immediate care to patients in their local areas where distance may delay the prompt arrival of an ambulance. They are trained to deliver Basic Life Support and defibrillation to patients in Cardiac Arrest, and appropriate assistance, including oxygen administration, to patients suffering from a range of conditions.

Volunteers will be fully trained by the East Midlands Ambulance Service and the group will be equipped with a defibrillator, oxygen masks and other equipment. We are seeking those aged 18 and over, who are in reasonably good health, want to learn life-saving skills and have a full, clean driving licence. Anyone able to give up some free time can volunteer.

- * Trading Standards enforce the weight restriction on behalf of Highways.
- * Trading Standards will then use the information as intelligence and coordinate our future Enforcement action accordingly.

Exemptions

Some vehicles are permitted to use weight-restricted routes and these may include:

- Vehicles loading or unloading within the restricted area
- * Emergency vehicles
- * Vehicles in the service of the local authority in pursuance of its statutory powers or duties in connection with premises along the restricted route
- * Building and industrial demolition operations

CODDINGTON NEWS ARTICLE

Nottinghamshire County Council is proposing to develop a massive 300 acre quarry near to Coddington (just across the A17 bypass, off Drove Lane, and stretching from Stapleford Woods to The Air Museum). The purpose is to extract sand and gravel as part of the latest Local Minerals Plan- this would be the largest new sand and gravel quarry in the county for decades.

Coddington's Action Group, to be known as C.A.G.E. – (Coddington Against Gravel Extraction) is now working to raise awareness and have set up a petition to collect signatures from everyone in the village and the local area. People in the group will be calling to ask for your support. You can also sign online at change.org via the web site www.coddingtonactiongroup.org. The petition will form part of a submission by our local County Councillor Maureen Dobson at a meeting of the full County Council in September to try and have the proposal removed from the Minerals Plan.

The Action Group's concerns range from the risks of increasing traffic congestion leading to accidents, health hazards from dust and airborne pollution, noise and damage to the village's tranquil landscape setting and nearby leisure businesses. \There could also be to wildlife and ancient woodland (Stapleford Woods), and the loss of valuable agricultural land.

The gravel pit is not only a threat to Coddington – the proposed Mineral Plan places 70% of the County's sand and gravel extraction in the Newark Area, overloading it's infrastructure and affecting the attractiveness and prosperity of the town.

The quarry will ship sand and gravel to South Yorkshire and South Nottinghamshire by HGV's using the A17/A46 and A1. At least 180 HGV movements per day (+ additional staff and maintenance vehicles), along already congested roads, putting road users and pedestrians at increased risk of serious accidents. Traffic on these

roads increases heavily in the holiday period as they are main routes for tourists to the East Coast, and in the Sugar Beet Campaign period between September and February. Details of how the quarry would connect to the A17(or/and the A46) are not yet known, but the A17 has a poor accident record and the Drove Lane /A17 crossroads is already dangerous for pedestrians, cyclists and traffic attempting to turn right from the A17 in both directions.

We are especially worried about the effects of dust on our children, the elderly, and those with asthma and other existing conditions.

Dust and airborne particulate matter (PM) varies in size. Lots of dust is likely from blasting, crushing and moving sand and gravel about the site. The Canadian Web Site "Gravel Watch" (www.gravelwatch.org/dust.htm) claims that – "Fine dust particulate matter, 10 microns or less in diameter can be inhaled and are considered toxic. Smaller respirable particulate matter with a diameter of 2.5 microns (PM 2.5) or less is even more dangerous. There is incontrovertible evidence that increased PM 10 is related to increased risk of cardiopulmonary disease, asthma, bronchitis, emphysema, pneumoconiosis, and premature death in those with existing conditions. Crystalline silica dust is common from processing sand and gravel and is a carcinogen."

The British Columbia official web-site also states that "particulate matter (dust) that is less than 2.5 microns in diameter (PM2.5) can remain in the air for days to weeks. It can penetrate deep into our lungs, collecting in tiny air sacs (alveoli) where oxygen enters the bloodstream. Health problems begin when the body starts to react to these foreign invaders. Another danger is that PM2.5 can contain a number of other harmful substances, such as cancer causing chemicals. (http://www.bcairquality.ca/health/air-quality-and-health.html)

As well as increases in noise there are real threats to the setting of the" Coddington Conservation Area "amenities such as the ancient woodland areas of "Stapleford Wood", used as a recreational and educational resource by many from the village, Newark area and beyond. The threat to wildlife, trees woodland and farm land is significant with local attractions such as The Newark Showground, Newark Air Museum, local football club, Newark Car Auctions, The Newark Golf Club and a number of pubs/restaurants will also be badly affected. Coddington Moor was also the site of a fight during the English Civil War and the location of Coddington Races, an historic annual horse race that ran c1612 – 1877.

The County Council's own report admits that" this quarry would have a negative impact on noise, dust, traffic, risk of flooding, bio-diversity, landscape and agricultural land."


This will not be a temporary inconvenience and will go on for at least twenty years.

A lower quality of environment could also make it harder to sell houses/businesses and leave the village vulnerable to future unwelcome industrial development of the "safeguarded" sand and gravel and adjacent land. The whole landscape of the Trent Washlands and The East Nottinghamshire Sandlands is under threat from the Nottinghamshire Minerals Plan – with parallel activity just over the Lincolnshire border.

We believe Nottinghamshire County Council needs to rethink its spatial strategy to find sites in more sustainable locations, closer to the markets. The Newark Area will be exporting 30-45% of Nottinghamshire's output to Yorkshire, and minerals operators, closer to Nottingham have already suggested the Coddington site is not needed.

CODDINGTON TRUST FUND

The earliest recorded fund for the village of Coddington goes back to 1532 when Robert Brown left 15 acres 33 poles of land to Newark Corporation for the poor of Coddington

In 1738 Joseph Birch left 90 acres of agricultural land for a Trust fund to be started and the Trustees to distribute £90 to the poor of Coddington

In 1760 The Enclosure Act allocated 86 acres33 poles to John Ashwell and John Cooper in trust for the poor of Coddington In1832 The Birch Charity land and farm were raising £140 per year In 1928 The rent on the farm and land raised £138,£55of which was put aside for the building of the Almshouses These were build in 1941

The present trust fund was originally registered in 1995 as the Coddington United charity and has subsequently been changed to the Coddington Trust Fund

The fund is there to help the residents of Coddington of any age in times of need and can also make financial contributions to local organizations for special or one off projects

The trustees would like to see more use made of the fund

The Trust is now in place to help the residents of Coddington in times of need and is open to help all age groups

Help can be given with expenses due to illness or lack of mobility or with household repairs or replacements.

Parents can apply for help with the cost of school uniforms or outings.

Students can apply for a grant towards the cost of textbooks and/or field trips.

All applications will be considered in the strictest confidence

The Great War Coddington Remembers

I am sure that by now you have read our book "The Great War Coddington Remembers" and I hope you found it of interest. When compiling the book we endeavoured to make sure all the information was correct, however should this not be the case please advise me as soon as possible. Whilst we have traced 86 men who had connections with Coddington we are bound to have missed some, if this is the case please advise me. You can contact Coddington History Group with corrections, additions or comments, and find extra content on our website www.coddington.org.uk

As always happens we found information on another Coddington soldier just after we submitted our book for printing, the information is: -

Frederick Henry Peter Tregidgo born 1886 Corps of Royal Engineers

Killed in action Flanders

Fred was born in Falmouth, Cornwall in 1886, his parents were Thomas Henry Pritt Tregidgo (ships Carpenter) and Sarah Jane, brothers Thomas Henry, George, Claude Lever and sisters Sarah Ellen, Mary, Alice Maud, Violet, Robet Elizabeth, Clare Irene and Gladys May. By 1911 Fred was a butcher. In October 1915 he married Mary Ann (Polly) Bryan (born Coddington 30th September 1894) in Newark.

Military Service record: - (number 86972) was a Pioneer in the Corps of Royal Engineers (82nd field Coy.R.E.) he was born and enlisted in Falmouth, Cornwall but his residence was stated in military records as Coddington. He was killed in action at Flanders on the 29th July 1916. He is remembered at Thiepval Memorial Northern, France panel reference: - Pier & Face 8A and 8D "Missing from the Somme". "The Major of the Regiment wrote to his widow Mary Ann,who lived at Muskham". "You will have received the official notification by this time re. the death of your husband, No. 86972 Pioneer F. Tregidgo . He was killed instantly on the night of the 29th July, while working prior to an attack on the enemy, at about 200 yards away from the enemy's trenches". Source: - Newark Advertiser Medals: - British & Victory.

CODDINGTON CORONATION HALL

Opening Ceremony

Saturday 6th March 1954

4pm

This year is the 60th anniversary of the opening of our village hall [Coronation Hall] on Main Street. The people of the village decided in the late 1930's to raise funds for the building of a village hall next to the Reading Room that had been provided by Mrs James Thorpe for the men of the Village. We know from the records of the Women's Institute that they had started running Whist Drives and Dances, in the Old School, during the run up to the start of the Second World War. After the war they continued Fund raising activities. They raised over £300. We also know that after the war there were other fundraising events, but we have no record at present of who actually ran them. There were Collecting boxes at both the Plough and the Red Lion on Main Street.

During the early years, the only meeting places for groups of people, the Old school [now The Scout Hall] the Methodist chapel school [it was attached to the rear of the Chapel on Chapel Lane] and the Reading Room, the Green corrugated part of the present Hall. During the Second World War the Fire Watch took their shifts in there waiting to be called out. The Rev. Bully and Walter Hall were two of the regular watchers. The room was used for villagers to play darts, dominoes and billiards but with the introduction of T.V. less and less people came, the billiard table was sold and a table tennis table was supplied instead.

This was run by the Men's Institution under the Chairmanship of Col. Tallents. When the village hall was built it was connected to the Reading room by a short passage, which is reported to have quite a few leaks!

The Reading Room was then redesigned to accommodate the toilets and kitchen. Groups, like the W.I and Mother's Union met at member's homes for committee meetings and their monthly meetings moved between the school, the Plough Inn and the Methodist Chapel School. Scouts met at Rosevale Farm, in the late 1940's, not moving to the school permanently until the mid 1960's

The Institute was incorporated with the Coddington Village Hall Charities. The main trustees were Owen Taylor, E.C. Daybell, F.R. Daybell, B.N. Simpson. Arthur Geeson. The first Meeting held on 10th September 1957.

The Chapel school room was used by the youth club groups to put on Pantomimes etc.

The opening of the hall was performed by Mrs Hugh Tallents. A token key was given to the Chairman of Coddington Parish Council Mr E.C.Daybell.

The Hall committee had user group representatives, Trustees and Officials.

Since the beginning the committees have worked hard to keep the building in good order, which was difficult at times. Payment for use of the hall was needed and was introduced when heating was to be provided.

There have been many inside alterations over the years but the biggest change will be taking place over the next few months with the Award of a grant from WREN for the new roof, Insulation of the Building and new double glazed windows. We can thank the present committee for their persistence; it has been a lot of hard work.

So we look forward to a warm and cosy meeting place.

Village Hall News

We were pleased to have had a response to our plea for volunteer cleaners to help on our monthly rota but still need one more set! Ideally suited to two people sharing, it only requires a commitment of 1-2 hours a month at a time to suit you – please consider joining our cheerful band on this easy task.

The monthly maintenance mornings have moved to the second Monday of the month and the team often numbers six – more biscuits/cake/tea and coffee is now required! Even so we have not run out of jobs to do and recent improvements such as extra kitchen cupboards, kitchen extractor fan and a baby change facility have been welcomed by users.

A year after our initial application we have recently received the go ahead from WREN to begin major renovation work to the Coronation (main) hall. Volunteers have begun removing the external shiplap cladding from the building and replacing any of the structural timbers found to be affected by rot. The cavity will then be filled with insulation before nailing on new Western Red Cedar cladding to retain the external appearance of the hall. This work has to be completed by the August bank holiday after which contractors from Stormseal Roofing of Leicester will be replacing the old roof with a structurally sound and thermally insulated modern one. Following on from the roof new main hall lights will be fitted by Viking Electrical of Newark and MCR Joinery based in Southwell and Coddington will be replacing the windows. This work should be well advanced by the time you receive this newsletter.

Age Concern Newark distribute a newsletter every month and the village hall is one of their outlets. You may like to pick up a copy especially if you'd like to go to the newly reopened Robin Hood Theatre at Averham because you can get a lift (no membership necessary) to most performances - with a pickup from your door. It seems to be a popular trip for Coddington residents as some 8 people from the village went to see 'Yes Minister', several people come on their own for a pleasant night out in company.
