### **CODDINGTON PARISH COUNCIL - CHAIRMAN'S REPORT**

You will have seen on the front page (more details inside), that the 'Carols Around the Tree' (and afterwards in the Community Centre) will take place on Wednesday 18 December at 6 pm. Once again Coddington Community Spirit has put much hard work into organising this annual village celebration and we all thank them for it. Come along and enjoy the evening, it is an occasion for all villagers! Please look also in this edition to see details of the Christmas services to be held in our village's All Saints' Church.

Many of you will have seen references in the local press, and on TV, to Nottingham County Council's proposed Minerals Plan. Specifically, you might have noted the proposal to extract sand and gravel from 2023, in Coddington, north of the A17 and to the east of Drove Lane. Your Parish Council will express their concerns with particular reference to noise, air and light pollution, to the effect on traffic congestion and road safety, and to the visual impact. After the current consultation phase, ending on 18 December, there will be a further consultation phase next year. Before the next phase we shall hold a meeting at which you can hear the potential contractor's proposals and put your views for the Parish Council to submit. However, until 18 December, you can also express your own views by visiting <a href="http://nottinghamshire.jdi-consult.net/ldf/index.php">http://nottinghamshire.jdi-consult.net/ldf/index.php</a>. Otherwise please write to Nottinghamshire Councy Council. We will keep you informed.

Since the last issue we have carried out a "walk-around" inspection of Beckingham and Newark Roads, and the C208, returning to the Plough junction via Brownlow's Hill and Main Street. We now have a considerable number of issues for the District and County Councils.

Finally, with the onset of darker mornings and evenings, concerns are again being expressed about cyclists riding without lights. If you do cycle please help yourselves and others by switching on!

We wish you all a happy and peaceful Christmas.

# On the Beat with PCSO 8128 Mike Munro Helping you to have a crime-free Christmas

We're working hard over Christmas to keep you and your family safe,

but there are steps you can take to help us.

#### When you're out shopping

Make sure your handbag, purse or wallet is secure and out of sight in a place where a pickpocket would find it difficult to reach without you knowing. Never leave your bag unattended and Never keep your pin number with your credit cards.

Pay on a debit card rather than carrying large amounts of cash. Consider buying high value items on a credit card as you may be insured if they're ever stolen.

Shield the keypad when typing in your pin number at a cash machine or in a shop.

When parking your car, close the windows, engage your steering lock, lock the doors and set alarms and immobilisers. Remove your satnav and take it with you.

Take the suction mounted fitting unit off the windscreen. This could tell a thief that a satnav could be in the car.

Try not to go back to your car to leave your shopping in it part-way through your shopping trip. Collect bulky items from stores when you have finished all your shopping or have them delivered to home. If you have to keep presents in the car, make sure they are in the boot and the car is locked.

Park in a well-lit area or an attended car park. Visit **www.parkmark.co.uk** for details of carparks that have achieved the Park Mark standard.

#### At cash machines

Visit cash machines with someone else. If you see someone suspicious hanging around, alert the bank or tell the police by calling 101. Use another one if in doubt.

Before inserting your card, have a look around the machine. Check that it appears normal and there is nothing attached. If in any doubt, don't use it and find another one.

Shield your pin number from anyone else's view when typing it in.

Only withdraw as much as you need and avoid carrying large amounts of cash. Put your money and cards away safely before leaving the machine.

#### At home

Don't leave presents under your Christmas tree if they are visible from windows or doors.

You may be lucky enough to receive a valuable gift for Christmas. If you do, mark it with your postcode. Permanent marking kits are inexpensive and could help you get your possessions back if they're lost or stolen.

If you love it, log it! Visit **www.immobilise.com** to register valuable items like computers, MP3 players, mobile phones, bikes, TVs and games consoles. It could help us return your items if they are ever stolen and later recovered.

Think before you throw. Dispose of packaging carefully. Empty boxes left outside can advertise that you have new and desirable goods at home.

Never keep large amounts of cash at home.

Lock up sheds and garages so thieves can't access ladders and tools that could be used in a burglary.

Don't leave keys in your doors or lying around. But, you should be able to find them quickly in an emergency. Never leave your keys displayed on a hook, especially near an outside door or under a doormat.

When you go out at night, leave a light on with your curtains drawn. You could also leave the TV or radio on to look as if you are at home. You could use timer switches to turn your lights on at times when you're normally at home or when it gets dark.

A secure home will reduce the chance of you getting burgled. However, if you get home and notice signs of a break-in, don't go in or call out – the intruder could still be inside. Go to a neighbour's house to call the police on **999**. Don't touch anything or tidy up as this could destroy valuable forensic evidence.

If there's a stranger at your door – stop. Remember **SOS – STAY OUT STRANGER**. Keep your door locked and check who is outside through the spy hole or a window. Don't open the door to anybody you don't recognise. Remember, you are in control.

#### When you're out for the evening

Make sure someone knows where you're going and when you'll be home. Plan how you'll get home before going out. Never walk home alone or with someone you don't know well.

Don't hang bags over the back of your chair. Never leave your wallet, purse or phone on a table unattended.

Drink responsibly. Stay in your group and never accept a drink from a stranger or leave your drink unattended. Think! Don't drink and drive. Arrange for a member of your group to be a designated driver - some pubs do offers on soft drinks for designated drivers.

Check your taxi driver's ID and never get into an unlicensed taxi. Have your keys ready when you're arriving home in a taxi or friend's car.



#### The Revd David writes....

### POSADA – invite Mary and Joseph to stay

Christmas is coming all too quickly – where does the time go! The busyness of the season will I'm sure overtake us once again. But the season of Advent that runs up to Christmas Eve is a thinking season and in the church we use the colour purple to mark this. It is a time of watching and waiting. A time to take stock of life and prepare for the coming of God's Messiah - Emmanuel – God With Us.

At All Saints' this year we will be journeying with Mary and Joseph through Advent in a tradition called **POSADA.** This comes originally from Mexico - Posada is the Spanish for Inn. In the rural comunities a girl and a boy are chosen to play Mary and Joseph. From Advent Sunday they travel around the homes of their community staying a night at each journeying towards Bethlehem and the Midnight Mass service on Christmas Eve.

Many churches in the UK have adopted this tradition – BUT NOT WITH REAL CHILDREN! Instead we will use a set of Nativity figures.

Starting from the Advent Sunday service in 1<sup>st</sup> December they will set off around the community staying a night at different homes. They will also be visiting the school. Those who have given then hospitality will then travel with Mary and Joseph the next day to the next home.

Eventually they will come to Church for the Crib service in the 23<sup>rd</sup> December and Midnight Mass on Christmas Eve.

If you would like to offer hospitality to Mary and Joseph for one nightbetween the 1<sup>st</sup> and 23<sup>rd</sup> December then please contact my

administrator Laura (details below) with a few possible dates you could have the couple. She will then contact you with more details. May I and all at All Saints' wish you a blessed and joyful Christmas and a peaceful New Year.

Our August meeting always takes the form of an outing and this year we visited the Japanese gardens at North Clifton. Unfortunately the weather was not kind and while we were listening to an interesting talk on why and how the gardens were created, the heavens opened. Maitreya's explained that the main aim in creating the garden was to provide a peaceful, beautiful area which guests and visitors to the centre could enjoy. Fortunately, the weather did dry up for our leisurely amble around the gardens after the talk, so we could take in the serenity and peaceful feeling of the garden. We visited the ZEN garden, which is an expression of the beauty of nature and harmony of creation; mountains, a river, fields, and an ocean are created by countless crystals, gems and precious stones. Our visit ended with a delicious cream tea served in the Japanese style.

Our original speak for September was unable to come and the stand-in also let us down, so one of our members stood in. Lesley Walker spoke on 'Family History for Beginners'. Lesley outlined how to get started tracing your ancestors and how important it is to collect as much information from relatives as possible. Lesley handed out a fact sheet giving useful web addresses and showing examples of some of her searches on the census web site.

September was also the month for our Nottinghamshire Autumn meeting. All Nottinghamshire WIs are invited and, as well as reports from the various county subgroups, and displays during the second half of the meeting we are entertained in some way. This year John White depicted King Henry VIII, aged in his early 50s. He appeared in the most splendid bejewelled and golden costume; a near replica of the famous Holbein portrait. The talk was in the form of an 'audience' with the King, who recounts his life telling of his wives, children, and the events of his long reign in a most forceful fashion. This new take on historical information proved very entertaining.

We are now planning for Christmas. Our December meeting takes the form of a faith supper, so members are signing up to provide a plate of food, and we are again wrapping parcels of sweets to be sent to the Newark women's refuge.

#### COMMUNITY FIRST RESPONDERS SCHEME VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

The Parish Council is preparing the ground work for a possible Community First Responders Scheme in Coddington. The project will require funding for equipment and this aspect is being explored at present. The scheme will only be viable, however, if there are sufficient trained responders to man it. The Council is therefore seeking volunteers to form a Community First Responders group. First Responders are volunteer members of the community who are trained to respond to emergency calls through the 999 system in conjunction with the Ambulance Service. Responders provide immediate care to patients in their local areas where distance may delay the prompt arrival of an ambulance. They are trained to deliver Basic Life Support and defibrillation to patients in Cardiac Arrest, and appropriate assistance, including oxygen administration, to patients suffering from a range of conditions.

Volunteers will be fully trained by the East Midlands Ambulance Service and the group will be equipped with a defibrillator, oxygen masks and other equipment. We are seeking those aged 18 and over, who are in reasonably good health, want to learn life-saving skills and have a full, clean driving licence. Anyone able to give up some free time can volunteer.

# Village Hall News

Many of you will have noticed small but significant improvements to the Village Hall over the last few years but the major problem area requiring attention remains the lack of insulation in the Coronation or Main Hall section. Subject to the success of a major grant application that we have made with the financial backing from the Parish Council this situation should change with our project to insulate the roof and walls, to provide double glazed windows and replace the obsolete lighting units.

The project involves the complete replacement of the roof with modern structural panels complete with bonded insulation. The cost of this part of the project alone is around £13,000. To insulate the walls we plan to remove the cedar cladding and fill the wall voids with proprietary foil backed insulation before refitting/replacing the timber. This part of the project will involve a significant amount of volunteer work in order to provide a part at least of the match funding required by the potential main grant giver. It will also have to be scheduled to dovetail with the replacement of the windows. Replacing the strip lighting is the last part of the project and is necessary as the tubes are no longer manufactured.

Unfortunately the decision on our application will not be made until next year and so we cannot start work before the winter.

We assure everyone that the work will be completed with minimal interruption to hirers and with minimal visual impact. However, it will make a significant difference to the warmth on those cold winter days as well as providing savings on heating costs.

### **CODDINGTON HISTORY GROUP**

Our member Mick Lord has done a considerable amount of research about Constance Penswick Smith, the reviver of the Mothering Sunday tradition and has uncovered much information. Constance had six siblings amongst whom was Rev. Cecil Smith whose daughter Brenda Penswick Smith wrote a memoir which included this charming account of Christmas at the Coddington vicarage in the 1890s as was recounted to her by her Uncle Charlie - Constance's brother.

Memories of a Vicarage Christmas in the 1890's

Perhaps this is the place to tell the reader a little about the Vicarage family. Uncle Charlie was the youngest child of a family of seven children - four boys and three girls. There was a difference of fourteen years between the eldest and the youngest, with the result that by the time Charlie reached the advanced age of six years his eldest brother Frank was away at school and the other elder children were busy about their own occupations.

The two younger girls, Connie (*Constance*) and Peggy, were naturally very attached to their younger brothers - Cecil and Charlie, and did quite a lot to amuse them.

We encouraged our Uncle (the young Charlie) to tell us about those Christmases of long ago, and it went something like this:-

On Christmas Eve the house was decorated ready for the Festal Day. Every room was festooned with holly and other gay trimmings.

Then, in good time, the two little boys were sent to bed (I should say that in 1892 Charlie was six years old and Cecil would be eight), each boy clutching one of brother Frank's football stockings.

Round about midnight the little boys awoke to find that Father Christmas had truly been, and they unpinned their stockings from the bedrail and carried them into the girls' bedroom. Here they discovered a blazing fire burning in the grate and chairs had been placed ready for the occasion round the fire so that they could open their stockings by the firelight.

Each child (girls as well) would in turn take a dip in his or her stocking and pass it round to be admired by all. When finally the last mysterious gift had been revealed and all stockings were quite empty, the midnight feast would begin. This was comprised of cake, cocoa or tea and anything else they had managed to scrounge. The kettle was boiled on the bedroom fire. Finally, when all was finished, two very sleepy little boys returned to their room, hugging their new toys now safely stored away again in the stockings.

We remember at this point rather a touching story related to us many years ago by our Aunt Connie. She told us how one Christmas Eve the bedroom fire burnt rather too quickly and was in danger of going out before the ceremony had finished. She suddenly remembered one of her precious wooden dolls, and decided that it must be sacrificed on the fire in order to give warmth and light for her brothers. The little girl told the others to close their eyes and, while this was done, she cast her doll to the flames. Once the fire had devoured the offering beyond all recognition, she allowed them all to open their eyes again and enjoy the light and warmth once more.

On Christmas morning, their Father and Mother, and senior members of the family went to the 8.00 am Communion Service at the village church, and when they returned family prayers took place (as indeed they did every morning and evening). Then came breakfast - boiled eggs, but we were told most emphatically that the pile of presents and cards which were heaped up in each person's place and neatly covered with a table napkin were unwrapped before a crumb of breakfast was eaten. I dread to think how hard-boiled those eggs must have been!

Later in the morning, the family went off to church. Uncle Charlie did not tell us much about the Christmas dinner, but I gather this was eaten at mid-day, nor did he relate what the children did in the afternoons. After tea there was a special Christmas Evensong in church, when carols were sung from A Book of Twenty Carols. Each Christmas, Uncle Charlie carefully copied out all the carols from the book in an exercise book and his copies were taken down to the service and used to supplement those belonging to the church. He did this for twelve years, and to this day he can remember the actual numbers of some of the carols!

During the Christmas period, Mummers from the village visited the Vicarage and performed their weird plays, each receiving an orange as he left. On Boxing Day the church carol singers arrived, and after their singing they were given mince pies and other refreshments in the hall.

### **CODDINGTON HISTORY GROUP**

Our Open Day in early September went well with lots of visitors from near and far. Impressively the most distant was from west of Glasgow – and amazingly they did come south specifically because of our event! The previous month a lady was delivered to my door - John Black's great great grand-daughter – she was en route from the west of Scotland to London and came in search of his grave. Thanks to our graveyard survey it was an easy request to fulfill! At the open day she brought a family tree with her and when she showed it to me I was able to introduce her to a relative by marriage who happened to be standing nearby! I was also able to scan some photos that people had brought – including the Coddington and Town families and some more photos have arrived electronically afterwards.

We have yet another project under way - in association with the Parish Council - to publish a record of the endeavours of Coddington people in the first world war.

We also had a very nice and well-attended walk led by Bernard Allan over some of his and neighbouring farmland, the weather was kind and we enjoyed Sunday lunch at the Inn on the Green afterwards.

Our "speaker season" got off to a good start in September with a wonderful slide show of Railways in a Yorkshire Landscape by Steven Gay – stunning photographs - amazingly taken on slides not digital. He must have spent a long time in getting the place and light just right and they were expertly threaded together with an interesting narrative. The record attendance thoroughly enjoyed it – ladies as well as men!

October was equally interesting in a very different way as our "local member" Mike Cox introduced us to the commemorative plaques that NALHS have installed in Newark over the years as well as some that pre-date the society, I think we all learned some new information about Newark and its people and places.

This press date is before the November meeting, so I hope you came and enjoyed it!
